Truck Unloading Zones Established On Court Square

A new effort to solve the traffic problem on Benton's Court Square started this week by the City Council and the State Highway Department.

Loading zones for trucks were established on two sides of the Court Square—the west side and the south side.

Each loading zone is a half block long. Each zone is plainly labeled with signs stating: "RESERVED FOR TRANSPORT TRUCKS ONLY."

Both loading zones are on the part of the streets next to the courthouse. They are on the state highways that run through the business district on Main Street and 12th Street.

Parking meters in the new truck loading zones have been covered. These zones will NOT be used by private motorists any day of the week, except Sunday.

The loading zones are an experiment on the part of the City Council and the State Highway Department, but if the experiment is successful the meters will be removed from the zones and the plan will become a permanent law.

All trucks will be required to use the zones, or available alleys and private unloading docks. Double parking by trucks on the Court Square will be prohibited.

City police have been instructed to see that all trucks use the new loading zones.

Double parking by transport and other trucks on the Court Square streets had caused a serious traffic problem in Benton for many years. At one time, officials considered the idea of cutting back the courthouse lawn in order to widen the streets and make more room for handling the trucks and regular traffic.

Sweet Potatoes and Apples Are Jersey Blend

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

SWEET potatoes can be used in many delightful ways. Here are two recipes from New Jersey housewives who are proud of the sweet potatoes from their state.

Sweet Potato Topped Apples (Serves 6)

Three red apples, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 8 tablespoons brown sugar, 3 medium sweet potatoes, salt and pepper.

Slice apples in half crosswise. Cut stem and bottom ends. Core. Rub cut portions with lemon juice. Melt 3 tablespoons butter or margarine in skillet. Place apples in skillet; spoon 1 tablespoon sugar over each.

Cook very slowly over low heat for 10 minutes, turning occasionally. Carefully remove apples and syrup to shallow casserole.

Whip the cooked sweet potatoes with remaining butter until fluffy. Season with salt and pepper. Pile the whipped sweet potatoes over each apple slice.

Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 20 minutes. Serve on platter and spoon syrup remaining in casserole over them.

Sweet Potato Pie

One-half cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon allspice, 1/4 teaspoon mace, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs, slightly beaten; 1 cup

milk, 2 tablespoons table fat, melted; 9-inch unbaked pastry shell, 1 1/2 cups mashed sweet potatoes.

Mix sugar, cinnamon, allspice, mace and salt. Stir into mashed

sweet potatoes. Combine eggs, milk and fat. Add to sweet potato mixture. Pour into pastry shell. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) about 40 minutes or until filling is set.

Mary Flanery First Woman in Legislature

Frankfort -- The first woman elected to the Kentucky Legislature was Mary Elliott Flanery, a member of the House of Representatives from 1922 to 1924. She has also been called "the first woman elected to any legislature south of the Mason and Dixon line."

While feminist movements were not unknown prior to the Civil War, it was in the post-war period that women gained slowly equal rights with men. What chivalric American male could, in the end, withstand that strikingly cogent argument that if former slaves were entitled to the ballot, so were women?

The leaders of the woman suffrage movement on the national scene were Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton. In Kentucky, its champions were Miss Laura Clay and Mrs. Madeline McDowell Breckinridge.

Miss Clay was elected president of the Kentucky Equal Rights Association in 1887, despite the opposition of her father, old "Cash" Clay of White Hall, who, a few years later, predicted that women would fall like Icarus of old because the road to woman's suffrage led to atheism and to communism of the sexes.

Mrs. Breckinridge, daughter-in-law of W. C. B. Breckinridge and great granddaughter of Henry Clay, was also an indefatigable worker for woman's suffrage. Among her many friends and captains was Mrs. Flanery, an editorial writer for the Ashland Daily Independent and a prominent club woman from her section of the state.

The Nineteenth Amendment, ratified in 1920, gave the women the right to vote. Kentucky held its collective breath. Who would be the first Kentucky woman elected to the polls to a state office?

No one was probably more surprised than Mrs. Flanery when she drew first blood. Running as the Democratic candidate in the Republican district of Boyd County, she ousted the Republican incumbent by 250 votes in the November, 1921, election for the State House. She served the one term, and in 1924 was a delegate from Kentucky to the Democratic National Convention.

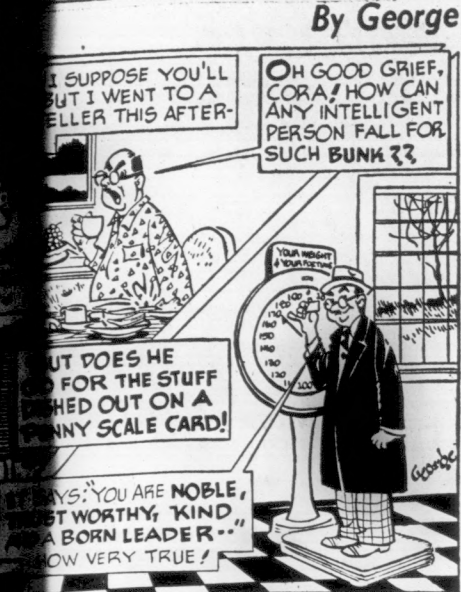
MARCH 1 IS DEADLINE TO BUY AUTO LICENSES
