Benton Ball Team, Fans Leave For State Tournament

City Turns Down Bid On Garbage

Benton's City Council, in session Monday night at City Hall, rejected a bid of Charles Lents to install a garbage collection system in Benton.

The Council also voted NOT to re-advertise for bids on a city garbage franchise.

Mr. Lents' garbage proposal called for residential rates of \$1 a month and business rates of \$2 to \$10 a month. A deposit of \$2 to subscribe to the service also was sought. Another stipulation was the closing of the present city dump six months after the private system is started.

Mr. Lents' proposal would have given the city 5 percent of the system's receipts. The franchise would be on a one-year basis with option of renewal each year for 20 years.

Councilmen opposed the parts of the proposal calling for a \$2 deposit fee and the closing of the city dump on the grounds that they were not to the best interests of the citizens. In rejecting the plan, however, the council left the door open for Mr. Lents to revise his proposal and appear at the April 7 meeting of the Council if he so desires.

AN EDITORIAL

Benton and all Marshall County are enjoying this week state-wide attention in the field of sports.

The Benton Indians have not had this honor since 1943, and the team, the school, the town and the whole county are naturally beaming with pride.

Marshall County has been in the basketball spotlight all season by reason of having three of the best teams in this area — the South Marshall Rebels, the North Marshall Jets and the Benton Indians.

North Marshall won the district championship by defeating Benton, and then Benton turned around and won the regional championship by defeating North Marshall.

And now the entire county is united in pulling for Benton to win the state championship. The same feeling would have existed if North Marshall or South Marshall had entered the state tournament.

The Courier joins with the citizens of Marshall County in saying:

"Good shooting, Indians. We are for you, win or lose."

Dillard Baker, formerly of Benton and old Birmingham, died March 13 in San Diego, Calif., at a heart attack. He was 41 years of age.

Mr. Baker is survived by his wife, Alberta, and one son, Phillip, both of San Diego.

Other survivors are two sisters, Mrs. Willard Travis and Mrs. Elmer Lindsey, both of Paducah; a half sister, Mrs. L. T. Bowman of Benton; a brother, Lawrence Baker of Detroit and a half brother, Milburn Baker of Benton; and his step-mother, Mrs. Phillip Baker of Benton.

245 Sign As Customers For Gas System

Bill Holland, public relations executive for the Union Gas Co., is optimistic about the natural gas system being installed in Benton.

He so informed the City Council Monday night.

Mr. Holland reported that 245 persons now have been signed up for natural gas service. He also said he had signed up the new Starbrite factory, and that the factory plans to install large ovens for baking enamel on the aluminum chairs made at the plant.

Mr. Holland said he was confident he could sign up a total of 400 customers by May 1.

Installation of the system by the L. & M. Construction Co. of Dumas, Texas, sub-contractor on the project, is proceeding according to plans, he reported. Completion of the system is scheduled by July 1 of this year.

Two Men Jailed After Thefts From Plants at Calvert

Two men are in Marshall County jail accused of taking thousands of dollars worth of materials from Pittsburgh Metallurgical plant and Miller-Johnson Co. at Calvert City.

The accused men are Charles (Bulldog) Carter and Jesse Phelps, both of Altoona.

The suspects were arrested after extensive investigation by State Trooper Brown and Sheriff George Little.

Copper, brass and stainless steel have been taken from the plants over a three-year period, the officers said. They also said \$3,000 in checks written as payment for the stolen materials have been located.

Herman (Kitty) Creason, a retired civil engineer, was employed by the Benton City Council Monday night as city water and sewer engineer.

Mr. Creason's pay was fixed by the council at \$200 per month. The pay will come from water department funds.

Duties of the new water department engineer will be to maintain in good condition the city's water and sewer lines. He also will assist the Union Gas Co. engineers in laying of the gas lines that cross city water and sewer lines.

Mr. Creason also will determine locations of all water and sewer lines and draw blueprints showing exact locations of these lines. The city has very few records of the locations of its water and sewer lines. The new engineer will provide the city with complete records of all its water lines.

Imitation burial wreaths were placed on the doors of Little and Rose together with signs stating "Moving to Basement." The pranksters signed "Big Chief" to the burial wreaths.

The officials did not move to the basement, but the sheriff's secretary reported to work Monday wearing Indian feathers in her hair.

Fire Damages Edison Moore Car Body Shop

The Benton Fire Department was called out Friday night about midnight to the Edison Moore Body Shop in North Benton.

The fire was thought to have started from defective wiring as it caught near an electric fuse box.

Much damage was done to the ground floor and the upper part of the building, which once was used as living quarters. The Moores did not reside there.

The building is the one formerly known as the "Brown Gables," where J. D. Gammel started his automobile business in Benton.

Bids Asked On Surfacing Of Paducah Road

The state highway department has asked for bids on the surfacing of the Benton-Paducah Road from the N. C. & St. L. Railroad tracks to the junction of the Briensburg road.

Bids will be received in Frankfort until April 3.

The road will be given a bituminous concrete surface. Class 1, the highway department reports. Total length of the project is 3.403 miles.

This is the road that winds across Clark's River and up a hill toward Daffenville. Benton citizens have hoped for a long time that this road might be straightened, but apparently the state has no such plans in mind.

Fire Destroys 7-Room Frame House At Olive

A seven-room frame house where Mrs. Georgia Thompson lived at Olive was destroyed by fire just before church time on Sunday morning.

Mrs. Thompson discovered the fire, which caught around the stove in the living room, and she summoned help. Most of the household belongings were removed from the house.

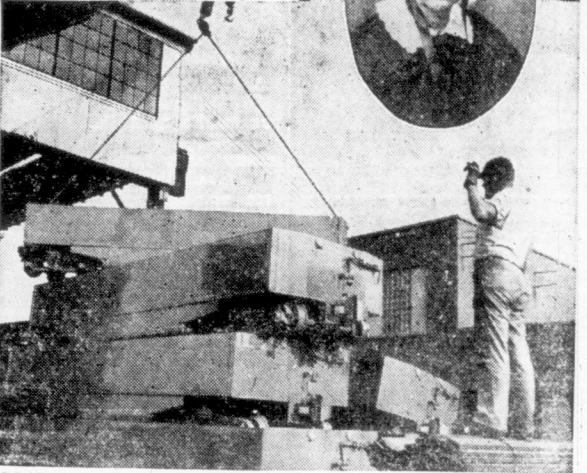

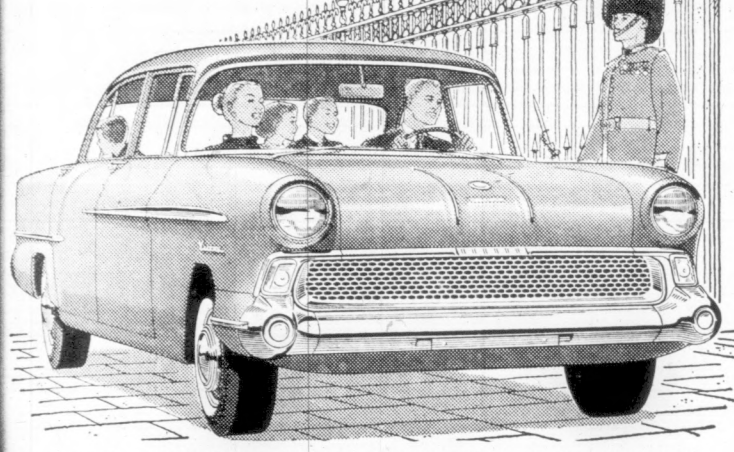



Continued From Page 1 reach. According to the borrower's register, it serves 429, the majority of whom are children and young people.

There are 283 borrowers in Benton; the rest are found on all seven mail routes in the county; in Hardin, Calvert, Gilbertsville, Sharpe, Brewers and on Symsonia Route 1; also from several homemaker clubs including Clark, Aurora, North Marshall. For the past 10 months the average monthly circulation has been 289.

SINCE THE FIRST of the year a story hour has been held at the library on Saturday afternoons, and there have been an average of 10 children each Saturday.

Much has been done to promote reading among adult groups, particularly through the homemaker clubs of the county whose reading chairman writes the weekly column, "Books and Bouquets." She deserves a very special bouquet in her labor of love telling first of

books on the Kentucky list, since that constitutes their reading program this year, and then, about any new books found at the library or on the Bookmobile. We need more like her in Marshall County to tell what "doors" reading may open to the individual.

The Marshall County Public Library is observing Library Week with displays in several business places; by spot announcements on WCBL; and by cooperation of the local newspapers.

AS A PRELUDE to this observance, numbers of our citizens, both as individuals and as members of civic clubs, have responded to the plea made by the Library Extension Division to write members of the House of Representatives concerned with the House Appropriations Committee in the interest of a full appropriation for the Library Services Act.

This was an important civic action for if the appropriation is cut from 7,500,000 to \$3,000,000 for the United States Kentucky will be forced to:

1. Withdraw from three re-

gions now being developed. 2. Stop thinking about developing any new regions.

IF THE FULL appropriation continues to be made and if there are enough interested citizens in Marshall County to push this rural library program, we could at least become a participating library member of a nearby regional library with a much larger number of books for our use than we have at present.

Those of us who believe so strongly in the Bookmobile and the library program realize the service is limited as compared with what it should be. It would make us just as happy as you if we could cease to operate on "a shoestring" basis and have the library doors open all day six days a week and the Bookmobile serving additional communities.

We are grateful for the financial aid received from the state, the Fiscal Court, the county school board and the Benton Senior Woman's Club as well as help received from other civic organizations and individuals at the time of the opening of the library but much more is needed to put it on the proper basis.

IT IS OUR earnest desire that all citizens be informed as to what the program means and how it can become an integral part in the program of our county.

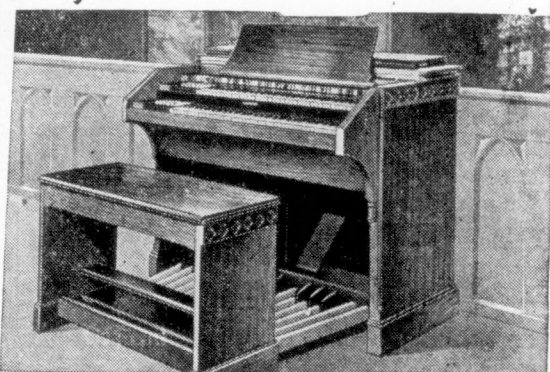

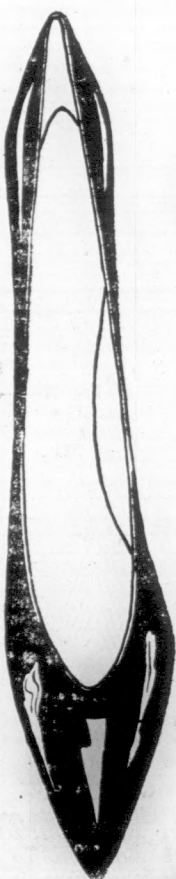

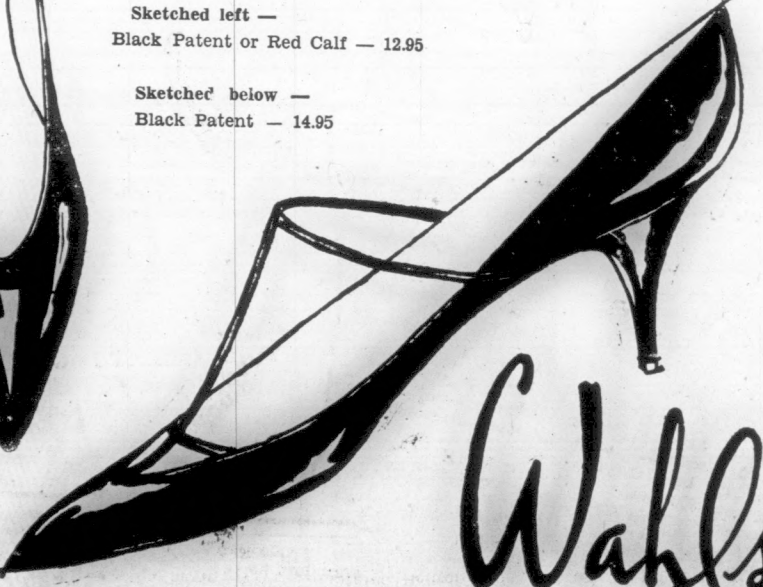
