This may be expressed through back blousing only, but all-around blousing sometimes on a curving line that's up in front, down in back, is winning increasing approval.

Another relaxed silhouette features the overblouse—a lightly fitted, hipbone length top above, again, a slim skirt. The overblouse silhouette appears in two-piece and two-piece look dresses, in suits and separates. In the case of coats, the same effect is often created by hip-level detailing.

Gracefully Shaped

Oval shaping goes its graceful way in coats and suit jackets, with softly rounded backs widest at the shoulders and tapered to the hem. This is the same shape seen in chemise dresses with fitted-look fronts.

Relaxed, too, are the lines of boxy coats and slim coats—the latter often loosely belted at the hipline.

Suits make their fashion stand on a variety of easy jackets combined with simple skirts. The little jacket barely covering the waistline is a distinctive entrant. Slightly longer jackets, fitted at the hip, free-flowing from the shoulder or easily belted, are other important suit components.

In most cases, suit skirts are slim and eased with a pleat at side or back. All-around knife





Medical Milestones

Should You Take A Tranquilizer?

In recent months there has been considerable excitement about the tranquilizing drugs. Most medical men agree that these agents are of value in treating mentally and emotionally disturbed people, but they also warn that they should not be used indiscriminately.

The use of drugs for treating the mentally ill is not a new concept, although only since the development of the tranquilizing drugs has this form of therapy gained wide usage. Previously the most widely used drugs for this purpose were the barbiturates and bromides, which are actually depressants and not ideal. The difficulty is they tend to keep the patient in a profound state of sedation that often renders him helpless.

The tranquilizers, on the other hand, tend to lessen fears and anxieties that bother the patient, bringing him to a more calm state, without clouding the consciousness. The patient in this state is far more receptive to other therapy necessary for effecting a cure. Medical science, however, still has a lot to learn about tranquilizers—exactly how they work and on what part of the brain.

The tranquilizing drugs have fallen into two widely accepted classifications: 1) those more effective in major psychiatric disorders for which the patient is usually institutionalized, and 2) those useful mainly in neuroses and minor functional disturbances, such as everyday tensions and anxieties. The latter are treated by a physician or psychiatrist while the patient continues his normal activities.

Trilafon, a new and extremely versatile tranquilizer, was recently introduced by Schering Corporation. By varying the dosage of this potent drug the doctor



can treat any degree of emotional or mental disturbance, thus permitting use of one drug for the full-range of therapeutic indications. Schering warns, however, that you should not take any tranquilizer except on specific orders of a doctor or psychiatrist. Aside from the mental and emotional conditions cited above, many doctors successfully use tranquilizers in the treatment of epilepsy, alcoholism, mental problems of the aged, disturbed children, surgical shock, nausea and vomiting, heart disease, high blood pressure, among other conditions.

Your doctor or psychiatrist can determine by careful examination whether you should be taking a tranquilizer. Your problem may best be remedied by other types of therapy.

Home Economics Is Beneficial To Students

The vocational home economics program is training youth to improve personal, home, and family living. Most of the high schools in Kentucky provide three years of home economics training for girls interested in this field. Youth who take home economics are laying foundations for the future when they will be leaders of homes. They learn to do various things by studying the seven areas of homemaking—home management, foods, clothing, housing, health, child care, and personal and family relationship.

In the foods area the girls learn to select the right kind of foods, prepare and serve wholesome meals, and conserve foods for family use.

In the clothing area the girls learn to plan their clothing wardrobe, select and buy clothing, and make garments. They also learn to alter ready-made garments and care for their clothing. Home economics girls are always neat and attractive.

The housing area helps the girls to make the home attractive, convenient and safe. They learn to care for the furniture and also remodel it. Housing also helps them learn to make plans to meet the needs of their families.

The girls study home care of the sick in the health area. They learn safety and first aid and how to standards of health.

Personal and family relationship is a very important phase of home economics. It enables the girls to work for happy home relationships. They learn to be socially accepted and to entertain with ease. This area helps them to develop a pleasing personality.

Child care and guidance is another important area. In this the girls learn to be baby-sitters, to care for children, and to understand and get along well with children.

In the home management area the girls learn to be good managers of time, money and energy in the home. They learn to plan sufficient budgets for their families.

All of these areas provide helpful instructions to youth. Home economics also provides practical instruction and experiences through home visits, home experiences, and community activities.

The home economics program also provides leadership training through the organization, the Future Farmers of America. This organization strives to build homes where living will be the expression of everything that is good and fair. All of these activities contribute to the development of homemakers.



Richard Collins One Famous Sons of Ky.

He was editor of the Maysville Eagle for ten years and, later, the founder of the Danville Review. He practiced law in Maysville and Cincinnati and lived the last twenty-five years of his life in Covington and Louisville. On New Years Day of 1898, he died suddenly in Maysville, Missouri, while visiting one of his daughters, Mrs. Silas Crag of that city. Richard Collins published in 1874 the monumental two-volume work known as Collins' History of Kentucky, based on his father's historical sketches, issued some twenty-seven years earlier. This work, executed with great care, consists of an annuals sections, a short history of the Commonwealth, a history of Kentucky by counties, and a wealth of statistical, biographical, and historical information, difficult, if not impossible, for later historians to find elsewhere. Shortly after his death, the Kentucky Legislature purchased the excellent library belonging to Richard Collins. That library today is a small but important part of the library of the Kentucky Historical Society.




