## 3 Major Accidents In County

Three major traffic accidents occurred in the county over the weekend and Monday, and all of the accidents were blamed on rain-slick highways.

A three-car crash Monday afternoon one mile east of Fairdealing on Highway 68 slightly injured Mrs. Lucille Downing. She suffered a bruised knee and shock.

Cars involved were driven by Raymond Downing, James H. Norworthy and Carl E. Sirls. Downing was attempting a left turn into a driveway. Norworthy attempted to pass the car and pulled into the path of a car driven by Sirls. The Downing car was only slightly damaged; the other two had greater damage. State Trooper Thurtell investigated the accident.

Mrs. Juanita Inman of Calvert City drove her car into a ditch on U. S. 641 a mile east of Benton last Friday afternoon at 4:15 to avoid a collision with a car driven by Gary E. Cron of Paducah. Cron's car did not leave the highway. The Inman car was not damaged. Constable Joe Carl Wyatt investigated the accident.

Bobby Henson, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Henson of Benton Route 5, wrecked his father's car to avoid hitting a car that had stopped suddenly on the highway.

The accident happened early Saturday night this side of Clark's River bridge on State Highway 408 between the Henson home and Benton.

The Henson car, a 1956 Chevrolet, left the highway, rolled over one time and landed on its wheels in a nearby field. James Henson had traded for the car only the day before the accident. Damage amounted to about \$500, only partly covered by insurance.

Three youths were in the car with Bobby Henson. One of the boys, Billy Myers, suffered a cut on the head and was treated at McClain's Clinic in Benton.

George H. Dodd, who was passing at the time of the accident, took the injured boy to the clinic.

Driver of the car that caused the accident by stopping on the highway was not known. He sped from the scene when the Henson car crashed.

## Street Numbering Plan Pushed at Calvert City

The Calvert City Planning Commission, in session Tuesday night, heard its street naming and property numbering committee report that it is making every effort to complete the numbering in time for inclusion in the new telephone directory due next month.

Chairman M. J. Nelson appointed a committee to consider a major street plan for a five-mile area around Calvert City.

The Planning Commission voted to recommend an outline survey be made. Such a survey will be necessary for tax assessment purposes and definite judicial areas; it is a requisite for getting city boundaries properly situated on U. S. geological maps being prepared; it will materially benefit in the economic program and development of Calvert City; and it is a requisite toward participating in any state and federal programs.

Projects suggested to City Council for completion in the event of a federal aid program include, new school, storm sewer, street paving, extension of water and sewer system, a municipal building, medical clinic, library and city park.

A public hearing on the revised sub-division regulations was set for Tuesday, April 22. Final approval of plans for the development of Rolling Hills was granted.

## Fairdealing Grade School Holds Food Experiment

On Jan. 8, two little white rats only 28 days old came to live at Fairdealing Elementary School in Marshall County, and were under the classroom supervision of Mrs. Viola Means, 4th and 5th grade teacher.

"Will" and "Won't," as they have been named, lived in separate cages and were given separate diets. "Will" was fed daily a balanced diet which consisted of meat, vegetables, fruit, milk and bread and was identical to the lunches served in the cafeteria. "Won't" was fed a diet consisting of candy, soft drinks, popcorn, potato chips, and cookies. A daily record was kept of diet and weekly record of weight. After 9 weeks, a weight chart kept by the students revealed the following results:

"Won't" in the beginning weighed 70 grams. "Will" in the beginning weighed 64 grams.

After 9 weeks "Won't" weighed 133.5 grams and "Will" weighed 326.9 grams. Will gained 262 grams, while Won't, heavier to start with, gained only 63.5 grams.

After 9 weeks the children wanted to reverse the diets, and this they did for one week. In one week the difference in weight revealed: Won't weighed 216.7 grams and Will weighed 318.2 grams.

The children wrote stories about the rats and listed things they had learned from the experiment. The following are comments made by the children:

1. I learned that the food we eat is important. We should eat better for you than soft drinks and candy.

2. I have learned to eat very little "junk," such as candy and soft drinks.

3. Will has proved to me the proper foods are right for growing boys and girls.

4. I have learned if you eat the wrong foods, your eyes will be sore and your stomach will hurt.

5. Will has taught me to drink milk.

6. They taught me that if you don't eat the proper foods you are cross and irritable.

7. They taught me even if you like snack food it doesn't do your body any good.

8. If you don't eat the right kind of food, you will be skinny.

9. "Will" has taught me to eat everything I have on my plate at lunch.

10. They taught me to try Briensburg's Calvert City and Brewers.

Briensburg has named their rats: "Lottie" on good diet, "Leslie" on snack diet.

Brewers: "Ample" on good diet, "Empty" on snack diet.

## Widow Fined for Not Sending Tots to School

Mrs. Lorene Timmons, a widow residing in the Altoona community, was fined \$20 and court costs last Saturday by County Judge Haltom for failure to send her children to school. The costs brought the fine to \$37.50.

Mrs. Timmons is the mother of eight children, who are supposed to attend the Calvert City Grade School.

Mrs. Timmons did not pay the fine and was held in the county jail Saturday night. However, friends appeared Sunday and paid the fine.

Judge Haltom said it was the first time in his four years as county judge that he had fined anyone for failure to send children to school. He said county and school officials had pleaded with Mrs. Timmons on several occasions to send her children to school.

Judge Haltom said he was going to "crack down" on all persons who fail to send their children to school.

The thieves attempted to break into Solon Hendricks' store at Brewers shortly after midnight. They smashed a door glass and the noise aroused Mr. Hendricks. He shouted and the burglars fled without entering the store.

Thieves took the cash register from the Ashland Service Station at the 4-way stop in Hardin. The register contained only pennies. The register was found later near Sink Hole hill by the driver of a bread truck. The pennies had been taken but the register was not damaged.

The Fox Gulf Service Station at Draffenville was entered and the thieves hauled away the cigarette machine. The machine was found later near the Access Road. The money had been taken from the machine, but no cigarettes were taken.

The Melody Drive-In Service Station, located near the old Ky. Lake Drive-In Theatre, also was entered. The thieves took the money box from the pinball machine.

State Trooper Brown and Sheriff Little's office arrested three Graves County youths as suspects in the series of break-ins. One of the youths was released on bond, and the other two are held in the Marshall County jail. Each of the youths is 18 years old.

## Gas Prices Cut Nickel Per Gallon

You can buy automobile gasoline almost a nickel a gallon cheaper today than you could Tuesday.

Gasoline prices were reduced 4.9 cents per gallon Wednesday at all filling stations in Benton and throughout Marshall County.

Regular gasoline now sells for 26.9 cents per gallon and ethyl gasoline sells for 29.9 cents.

Joe Darnall, local agent for Standard Oil Co., said home offices of all the major oil companies ordered the reduction of gasoline prices in Marshall County.

He said the new prices are in line with prices in Paducah. All gasoline distributors and retailers in the county are charging the new low prices, he said, and the retail prices presumably are the same all over the county.

Major oil companies operating in this county are Standard, Shell, Phillips Petroleum, Gulf, and Sunray-DX.

Off-brand gasolines were not involved in the new price schedule. The off-brand gasolines usually are cheaper than the gasoline sold by the major companies.

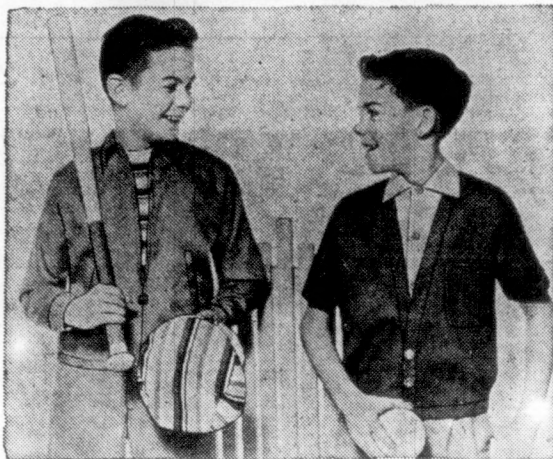

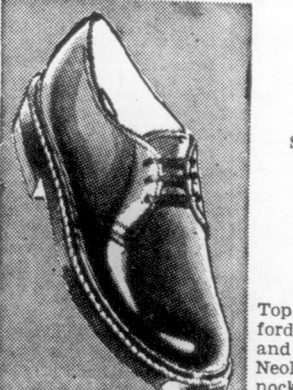

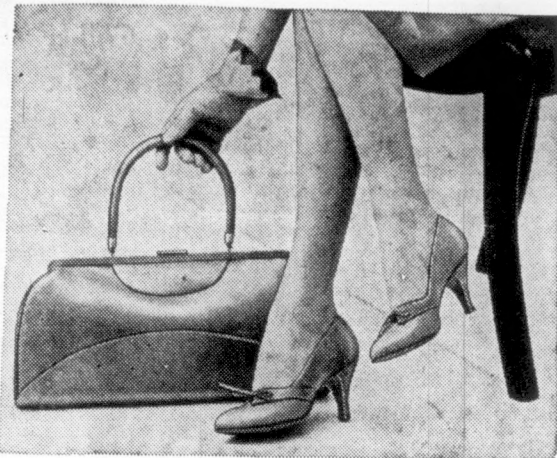

## State Farm Still Top Company For Insurance on Cars

State Farm Mutual nearly doubled its margin of leadership in the U. S. auto insurance industry during 1957, according to year-end figures announced by Homer Solomon, local agent for State Farm.

Total 1957 earned auto premiums were \$318,093,359, which led the second-place carrier by \$33,700,000. State Farm's underwriting gain was \$1,165,852, and surplus to protect policyholders was increased by \$6,700,335. Total earned premiums amounted to \$326,133,601 reflecting a 20 percent increase over 1956. The Bloomington, Ill., firm is in its sixteenth year as the number one U. S. auto insurer.

The year's highest accident rate boosted State Farm claims and claim expenses 17.4 per-

cent to \$254,048,706. At year-end, assets stood at \$416,493,926, up 13 percent, and surplus was at \$117,639,494, a six percent increase. Federal income taxes totaled \$3,522,820. Net yield from investments was \$11,034,944.

State Farm added \$26,755,000 to loss and loss expense reserves, which totaled \$149,904,236 at year-end.

State Farm Mutual's two subsidiaries both showed gains. State Farm Life Insurance Company reported its biggest year in paid-for life of \$264,185,692 for a record net gain of \$145,576,612. It ended the year with \$12 billion ordinary life insurance in force. State Farm Fire and Casualty Company reached a new high in gross earned premiums of \$18,241,883.
