Slim Skirts With Pleats Win Favor As Newest Fashions

On behalf of fashions favored easy-going silhouette, spring suits present a diversity of jacket styles, united with slender-looking skirts. Main point of agreement, here as everywhere in fashion, is on the importance of lively colors and eye-appealing, drapable fabrics.

Boxed, bloused, loosely belted, free-flowing or fitted at the hip a la chemise, barrel curved, semi-fitted, midgy-look, bolero—these are just some of the jacket shapes that make the season's new suits look very new indeed.

Suppleness at the waistline is the general rule. Where jackets are fitted, they create excitement with dramatic neckline and sleeve treatments—decollate necklines or lantern sleeves, for example.

Jacket lengths as well as styles vary. The hipbone or shorter jacket is liked for its youthfulness and seems to dominate. Most frequently seen among longer jackets is the tunic length, which can double as a separate coat.

Away from the neck and toward the back is the way collars are moving. Bibs, fur ascots, jewelry or blouses—often provided with the suit—fill in the open necklines attractively.

Fur trims, a fall favorite, take on new importance.

Interesting button and pocket placements, bows and fringe details further accent the new

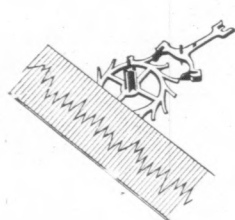

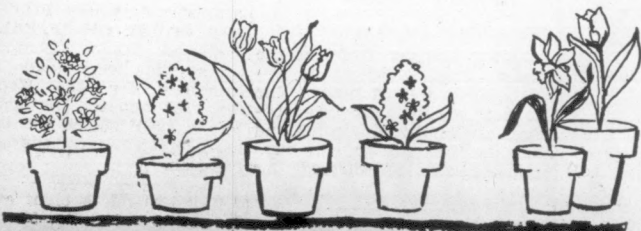

CLASSES

SECTION 1, HORTICULTURE—African violets, foliage, planters, blooming house plants, Iris, peonies, roses, tulips, narcissi and other blooms.

SECTION 2—ARTISTIC ARRANGEMENTS—Mass arrangement, line arrangement, foliage arrangement, arrangement using antique container, coffee table arrangement, arrangement for special occasion table miniatures, novelty table.

SECTION 3—JUNIOR DIVISION—Up to 18 years of age, from 5 to 12 years of age, teenage.

RULES

All entries must be in by 11 a.m. Tuesday, May 6. Entries accepted from 9 a.m. and may not be removed before 9:30 p.m. Must be removed the same day.

Exhibitor is responsible for removing own exhibit.

Entries not limited to Garden Club members. All gardeners (except professionals) are invited.

All entries will be limited to one each, except horticulture class.

All entries must be placed by exhibitor, accompanied by committee.

Material used in arrangement need not be grown by exhibitor, but must be arranged by exhibitor.

Foliage allowed in all arrangement classes.

Potted plants must have been owned by exhibitor 60 days.

Other entries in horticulture classes must be grown by exhibitor, to be exhibited in bottles furnished by club.

Entries from Section 2, numbers 5 and 6 are to be staged on tables furnished by exhibitor.

Committee will make every effort to protect exhibits, but will not be responsible for damage or loss.

Judges' decision final. Only Flower Show chairman, judges and clerks allowed on floor during judging.

No artificial coloring or plant shine to be used.

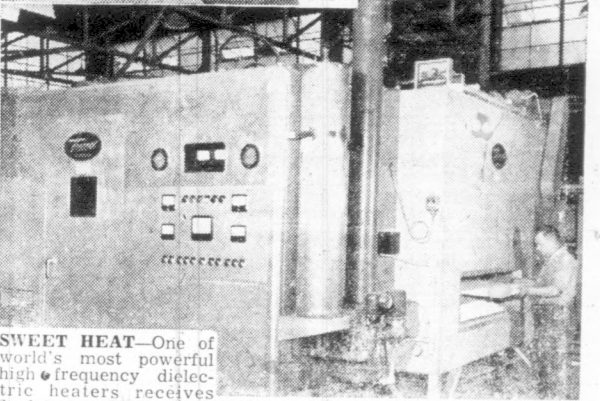



GROWTH OF WHITE PRINT COPY PROCESS



LA HABRA, CALIF., APRIL 2nd, 1958—This new million dollar sensitized materials manufacturing plant on Imperial Highway was opened here today by the Ozalid Division of General Aniline & Film Corporation. The coated paper supplies and other materials to be produced here are used in the white print direct copying process, a business that has grown tremendously in the past decade. An exact copy of any printed matter on a translucent original can be printed by an Ozalid machine in a matter of seconds.

Walter G. Hensel, Vice President of General Aniline & Film Corporation and General Manager of the Ozalid Division, said that in the territory to be serviced by the new plant, Ozalid product sales have increased by over 500% in the past ten years. Mr. Hensel presided at the opening ceremonies today. Also participating were local officials including the Mayors of La Habra, Fullerton, Brea and Buena Park, executives of the Chamber of Commerce, and other representatives of the Ozalid management.

The new plant will provide paper and other coated materials for customers in eleven western states and part of Texas, also Alaska, Western Canada and Hawaii. The eleven states to be covered fully are Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

The Ozalid process was first discovered by a Franciscan monk in Germany in 1918. Reverend Gustave Raphael Koegel, a chemist, had been experimenting with various means of transferring printed images from one source to another through chemistry when he hit upon the Ozalid process—now the fastest growing direct copy process in use in the business world today.
