Benton's City Council Monday night adopted an ordinance regulating the installation of gas lines and appliances by plumbers.

The ordinance calls for \$10 license fee, a bond of \$1,000 and ample liability insurance for each plumber who wishes to install gas lines and appliances in Benton.

Each plumber also will be required to pass an examination. The Council also set a fee of \$7.50 for gas customers to have service re-connected after the service has been disconnected.

## Crowd Here For Tater Day Despite Chill

Benton's 116th annual Tater Day drew a better than average crowd Monday in spite of a chilly 46-degree temperature most of the day.

Officials estimated the crowd at from 2,000 to 3,000 persons, with the peak being reached in the early afternoon. Probably 80 percent of the crowd was young people of school age.

No water pistols (banned a couple of years ago) were seen, but a few pea-shooters were used by the youngsters.

At least one truckload of sweet potatoes was on the Court Square. Tater Day got its name from the sale of seed taters. Several commercial and carnival exhibits also were on the Court Square, but did a poor business.

Benton school was dismissed for the day. County schools were in session, but many of the students "played hooky" to attend Tater Day.

The "swapping ring" had a big crowd and a good business all day.

## Inquest Monday Into Drownings

An inquest into the drownings of Ollie Gene Brown of Symsonia Route 1 and Miss June Manley of Paducah Route 4 will be held in the Marshall County Circuit Courtroom on Monday morning, April 14, at 10 o'clock.

This was announced Wednesday by Deputy County Coroner Otto Cann.

Brown, age 25, Miss Manley, 15, and Billy Peck, 21, were drowned early last Saturday morning in the beach area of Ky. Dam Village when their johnboat sprang a leak.

The body of Peck has not been recovered. Richard Rudolph, leader of the Marshall County Rescue Squad, said Wednesday the squad is keeping a patrol at the lake waiting for the body to come to the surface.

Members of the Rescue Squad recovered the bodies of Brown and Miss Manley last Saturday morning.

The fourth member of the party, Miss Carol Flint, 17, of Paducah, was the only survivor of the tragedy. She swam to the lake shore and gave the first alarm of the drownings.

The four young people found the flat-bottom johnboat on the lakeshore about midnight Saturday and decided to go for a boat ride. When the boat started leaking, the youngsters apparently became panicky and the drownings resulted. The boat, almost filled with water, was found afloat Saturday morning near the shore between Shedd Creek and Ky. Dam Village.

Funeral services for Brown were held Sunday afternoon at the Symsonia Route 1 home of his mother, Mrs. Audie Brown. Louis Douthett officiated at the funeral and burial, by Filbeck-Cann, was in the Symsonia Cemetery.

## Benton Main St. Widening Topic Of C. C. Meeting

Roads were the big topic of discussion at a Marshall County Chamber of Commerce meeting held Monday night at C. C. headquarters in Draffenville. The C. of C. committee that went to Frankfort last Thursday,

April 3, reported that state officials indicated that this county might get some long-sought roads leading to lake resorts.

The local delegation was told that Marshall County had received very few road allotments, and that the county was due some consideration on its roads.

The delegation was composed of Ralph Moore, Earl St. Marie, Ryan King, Robert Ross and Ollie James Houser.

The chamber meeting also discussed a plan to cut back the courthouse yard and remove all parking from Main Street as a means to get the government to straighten and widen Highway 641 through Benton.

The plan calls for widening of Main Street from the north end to the south end. Proponents of the plan think the state will prefer to widen and resurface 641 through Benton with a small expenditure of money rather than build a new highway that would bypass Benton's business district. A new highway would cost a great deal more than the widening of 641, the proponents say, and the widening plan will keep 641 running through the business district.

Proponents also say that if a new highway is constructed, the present 641 running through Benton will then become a city street and its widening and upkeep will also become a problem for the local city government.

A committee was appointed to take this problem to Benton's three civic clubs. On the committee are Dr. H. L. Carpenter for the Lions Club, Earl St. Marie for the Kiwanis and Bill Tanner for Rotary.

The Benton Lions Club Tuesday night appointed John Clay Lovett and Curt Holmes as a committee to study the Highway 641 proposal.

The Benton Kiwanis Club, in session Wednesday noon, appointed Earl Osborne and Pete Gunn on a committee to study the road problem.

If the people are in favor of the project, the matter will be taken before Fiscal Court and it will be asked to help on cutting back the courthouse yard.

If parking is banned on Main Street, the establishment of off-street parking lots will be necessary. This could be done by individuals or by the City of Benton.

If the courthouse yard is cut back on Main Street, space would be provided for a "parking island" where trucks could be unloaded.

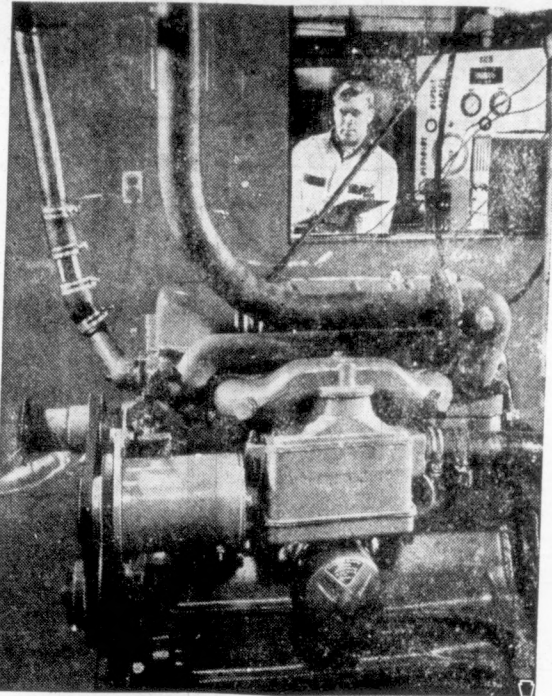

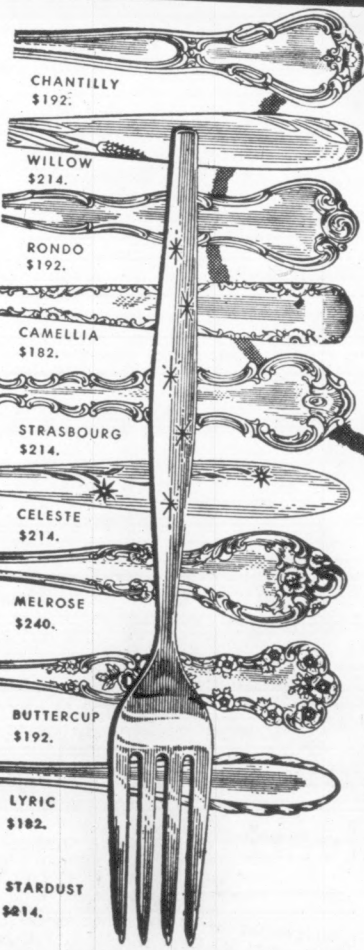

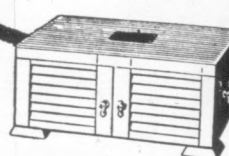

# Gen. Morgan Hero in Central Ky.

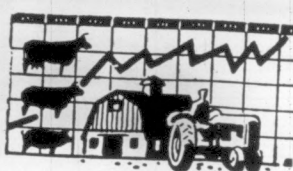

Frankfort, - In 1943 the state Legislature dissolved the Kentucky Confederate Home at Peabody, Valley, which had been established in 1902 for the care of Confederate veterans. Among books, records, and portraits consigned for safekeeping to the Kentucky Historical Society from the home a large painting of Gen. John Hunt Morgan by the artist, Miss Laura Spurr.

This painting now hangs in a conspicuous place in the Confederate Room of the old State House.  
Morgan is a controversial figure in Civil War history, but not in Kentucky and, especially, not in Central Kentucky. There he is a hero to rank with "Old Jack," "Marse Robert," and "Beauty Stuart." While some outsiders have accused Morgan of having demonstrated little

strategic and tactical sense, to say so in the blue grass is to invite tar and feathers and the rail.  
The blue grass view of Morgan's outstanding ability as a military figure is, undoubtedly, closer to the truth. His critics fail to see that while the three basic principles of horse or armored cavalry units—reconnaissance, security, and shock action—have not changed in

centuries of warfare, the ratio of these principles to each other has varied with time.  
When some authors criticize Morgan for working independently of, instead of in concert with, General Bragg, they fail to weigh effectively the ratio of the principles of cavalry as understood in the Civil War with a more recent view. Cavalry in the Civil War—whether Ashby's, Stuart's, or Morgan's—was expected to provide, first, reconnaissance and shock action and, to a far less extent, security for marching units.

Cavalry reconnaissance on the other hand in World War II operated primarily, under ideal conditions, as security reconnaissance and rare shock troops.  
If this interpretation of use of cavalry in the Civil War be accepted, the failures of by, Stuart, and Dorgan can be seen as failures in terms of mechanized-cavalry hindrances in the light of their own time. Morgan and his cavalry troopers were far from being strategists and tacticians.

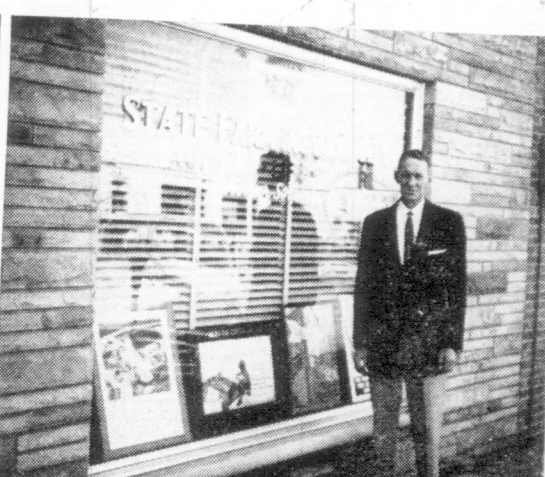

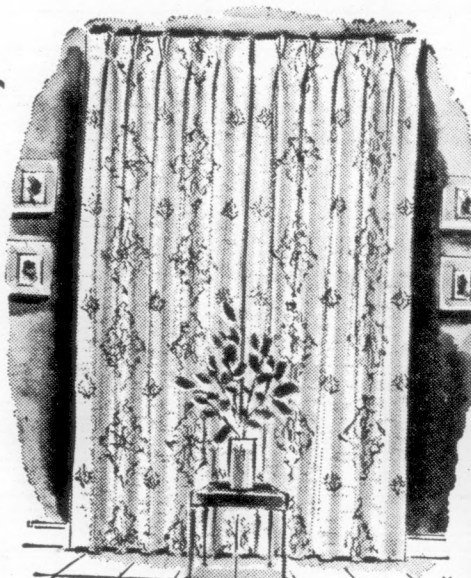

### New Type Chicken Easy to Raise And Lays More Eggs

Poultrymen will find a new white egg-layer, called the K-37 or the K-137 Kimberchick, among the breeds from which to choose.

According to tests, it is said to have a proved livability of 91.9 percent to about 18 months. Excelling in early large-egg size, it will produce from 8 to 10 more eggs per year than the straight white Leghorn.

John E. Kimber, the California originator, said the K-137, developed after more than 10 years of careful breeding and research, is a small-bodied bird, making for greater economy.

He said egg quality is exceptionally high, being white-shelled with high firm albumen content.

Reports from the field tests and commercial poultry farms indicate the K-137 is "peppy" and easy to raise under almost any environmental conditions.

## County Soil Notes

"If we are to represent the people, we will have to visit more farms in the East Fork of Clarks River watershed. We must know what their problems are."

W. W. Shenwell made this statement as he and other members of the conservation district board met with the Marshall county soil conservation district supervisors. Also present were representatives from the extension and soil conservation service.

Ways and means will be worked out as to how to keep the people in the watershed informed as to what is going on. Also how they as farmers can hurry the program along.

In about ten weeks a planning party is scheduled to be in the area. They will make surveys and ask a lot of farmers what their conservation problems are. With this information they will determine if a watershed plan can be developed.

In developing this plan the party will keep three steps in mind.


How to reduce flood water damage.  
How to reduce sediment damage.  
How to speed up the land treatment program.

Soil Management is the key to

the success of the watershed. If the land treatment program is not carried out, all work done in streams down below is useless.

J. R. O'Daniel, Bill Grimm, Floyd Culp and many others are working toward this complete land treatment program. Contouring, terracing, grass seeding, tree planting and other conservation measures are necessary on many farms to hold the water back and reduce sediment and flood damage. The A. S. C. Program will help farmers get these needed practices on the land.
