REA Is Celebrating Its 20th Birthday

In March 1938, less than 3 percent of the farms in West Kentucky had electricity.

In March 1958, over 95 percent of the farms in West Kentucky had electricity.

In those lines—and in the annual report which appears in a whole page elsewhere in this edition—is the story of the West Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. It is the story of 20 years of hard work and a job well done.

Prior to the formation of this cooperative, many farmers in this area had tried, unsuccessfully, to get electric power on their farms. With a mile of line costing around \$1,500, private power companies felt that rural electrification would be too expensive to cover the investment. In fact, many of the people weren't sure they wanted elec-

tricity. To dangerous or "too expensive," they said.

But there were some men who wanted electricity very much. Enough to get out and work for it.

One of these men was Ed C. Ray, who has served as chairman of West Kentucky RECC for the entire 20 years.

"You youngsters may wonder why we wanted electricity so badly," Chairman Ray said, "and why it was so important to us. But if you've ever tried to read by a kerosene lantern or do the chores in the dark, you know what it was like before we had our cooperative."

"Today," Chairman Ray explained, "the job of making electricity available is complete. One of the paradoxes of rural electrification is that the more lines you build, the more you

have to build. When electricity comes to a community, there are always more folks down the road a little piece who want power, too. And new homes go up, meaning even more lines to be built. So you've never really through building. It's a never ending task."

Another paradox of West Kentucky RECC's first 20 years is that this cooperative, barely given a fighting chance to succeed, has enjoyed a fantastic rate of growth. It has mushroomed to 13,293 members and now has 1,930 miles of line.

The value of the plant and all equipment, which is actually owned by the members, is now \$4,625,826.

According to John Ed Waker, manager of West Kentucky RECC, the members pay less for a kilowatt-hour of electricity

than the national average. "For the electricity that we use in our homes, we pay an average of 1.33 cents," Walker said. "The U. S. average price is 2.58 cents, almost twice what we pay." Last year West Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation sold over 71 million kwh and paid \$18,490 in taxes and tax equivalent. This \$18,490 brought the total tax payments for the cooperative to \$83,058.09 for the 20 years of operation.

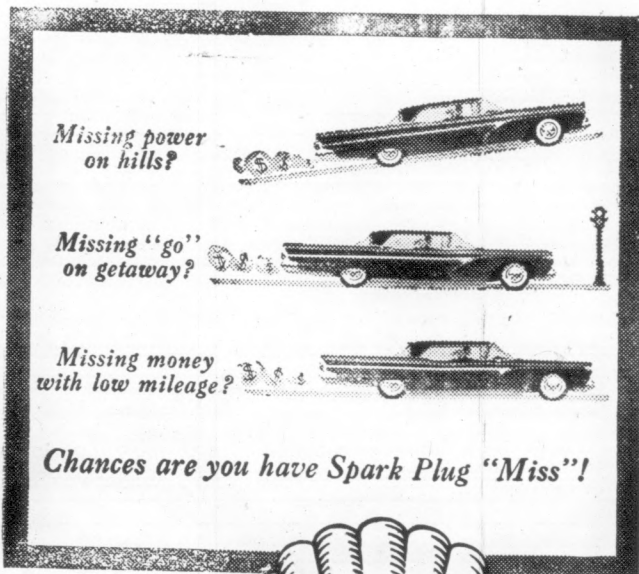

County Soil Notes

"These waterways will be the beginning of my conservation work," said Lawrence York of the Olive community. A basic plan was being prepared as the Soil Conservation Service technician and the farmer walked over the farm.

Waterways were planned and other erosion control measures discussed. The waterways will be worked and seeded to fescue this spring. About 2,000 pine trees have been set on eroding land on this farm. Some hay and pasture land will be seeded this fall. A.S.C. will pay 50 percent of the cost of preparing and seeding hay and pasture land. It will pay 50 percent of the cost of working and seeding waterways.

Farmers in Marshall County have received pine trees to set

this spring. These young pine trees should be gotten into the ground as soon as possible. Take your time in setting and do a good job. Do not let the roots dry or this will result in a poor stand.

You still have time to sign up for the A.C.P. emergency program. Money is still available. This has to be used by June 30 or it will be lost to the county.

J. O. Burken of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, who has been assisting the Marshall County Soil Conservation District for the last 10 months, has been transferred to the Obion Creek watershed. He will be stationed at Clinton in Hickman County. Before reporting this new location he will receive 90 days training on the Rough River Pilot Watershed in Breckinridge County.

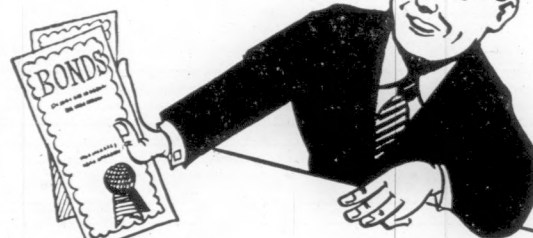

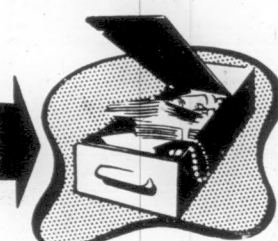

Long Concrete Has Had Big Growth in 10 Years

The Long Concrete Co. was organized on May 3, 1946. It started operations with one small manually-operated machine that made only 1,300 blocks per day. Now the company has an automatic machine that turns out more than 3,600 blocks per day.

At the outset, Long Concrete made only four-inch and eight-inch blocks. Now it makes concrete bricks and blocks up to 12 inches and in 10 different sizes. Including accessories, the company makes 40 different sizes and shapes of concrete products.

The firm has tripled its buildings and office space during its 12 years of operation, and sells most of its products within a

radius of 25 miles of Benton. Since 1952, Long Concrete has supplied all the ready-mix and much of the concrete blocks for industrial expansion at the Calvert City chemical center.

Long Concrete was organized by Cliff Treas, George Long and Bob T. Long. Now it is owned by George and Bob Long. Bob Long is manager of the plant and Jimmy Small, his brother-in-law, is assistant manager. Miss Gladys Allen is bookkeeper.

The company opened its ready-mix plant at Calvert City in 1952. This year, the company installed two-way radio system in its trucks and offices to provide faster service to the

public.

Bob Long was born in Benton in 1915, the son of George and Trentie Treas Long. He was graduated from Benton High School in 1933 and attended Murray College three years. From 1935 to 1940 he worked in the Bank of Marshall County, and then worked about two years at Treas Lumber Co. He was claims agent for about a year in Chicago for the American Four Insurance Co.

He entered the Navy in August 1943 and after 10 weeks of schooling was commissioned an ensign. He was discharged with the same rank in 1946.

Mr. Long is married to the former Dorothy Christmas of Laurel, Miss., and they are the parents of three sons, Bob Jr., George and David Long. The family lives in Parkview Heights in Benton.

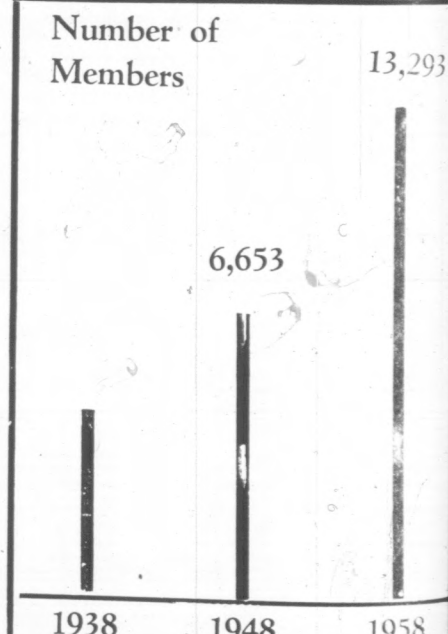
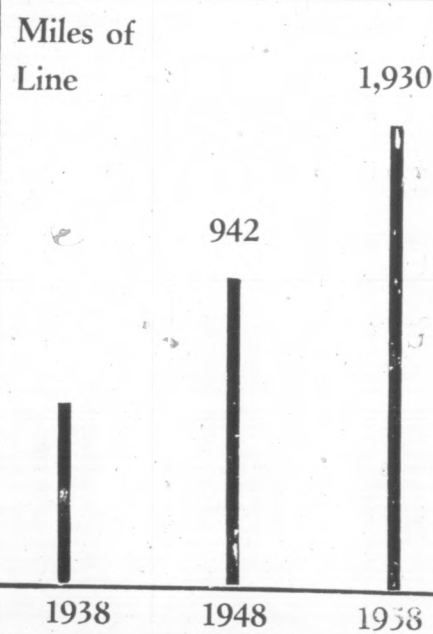
This week marks the twentieth anniversary of the West Kentucky RECC. This organization is not only your source of electricity—it is your property! You and the other members own it.
