## State Farm Aids Banks In Fighting Recession

Nine thousand banks and the nation's largest auto insurance company have joined in an anti-recession measure aimed at boosting sales of new and used cars.

Half a million dollars will be spent by State Farm Mutual Insurance Company to stimulate car sales through a program developed by the company and co-operating banks throughout the nation, according to Adlai H. Rust, president of the Illinois firm.

State Farm's local agent, Homer Solomon, said that the Bank of Benton is cooperating in the program.

A heavy advertising campaign in newspapers, magazines and over network television will describe the "bank plan" to U. S. consumers. Rust said the plan will ease financial arrangements for prospective buyers and can reduce the net cost of an automobile by \$75 to as much as \$300.

"High financing and insurance 'package deals' have helped keep auto prices out of reach for many buyers," Rust said. "The 'bank plan' combines the lowest financing and insurance rates available in the nation today."

The plan was first developed in 1950, he said.

"When the slow-down in car sales led the economy into this recession, we decided to back up the 'bank plan' with an all-out campaign, and we have interrupted our normal advertising program to do this," he pointed out.

The campaign opens this month with double-page advertisements in three of the nation's largest magazines, Life, Look and Reader's Digest. The

### CORN SUPPORT PRICE IS \$1.36 PER BUSHEL

Corn price supports for 1958 have been set at a minimum national average of \$1.36 per bushel, Roy C. Gray, chairman of State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, has announced.

This is an "advance of planting" minimum support, reflecting 77 percent of the April corn parity price, and based on a corn supply estimated at 4,751 million bushels—126.7 percent of normal.

The loan rate for each county will be announced before harvest.

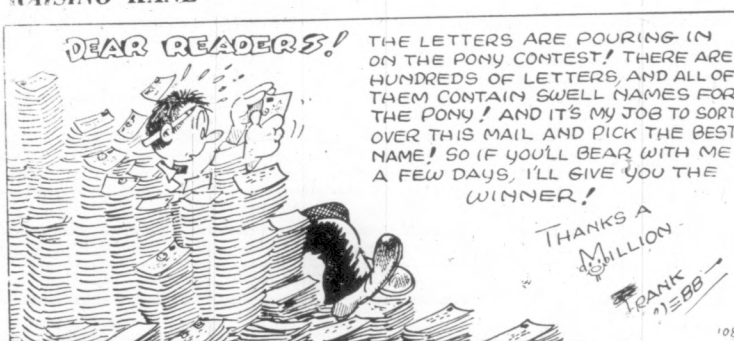

## Ray Mofield Catches Eyes of New Yorkers

Columbia University (30,000 students), set in a city area of 14,000,000, is not an easy place to make your mark or even to be noticed by anyone. But a tall, handsome Kentuckian has achieved some academic eyebrows in the 1957-58 school year rapidly drawing to a close. He is Ray Mofield of graduate faculties, Department of Political Science, who lists his birthplace as tiny Hardin in Marshall County and his business address is WPA, Paducah.

He was singled out for special praise this week when his masters' thesis was accepted by the Department of Economics. In the first place, he had done something the university catalog virtually says cannot be done—write a thesis while carrying a full load of course work. Most candidates take 12 hours or at most 15 per semester and then take a third session for writing the thesis. Many use two or three years but most take a year and a half.

Mofield took 18 hours each term and wrote the thesis and thus has six hours on the P.D. in only nine months! This is very rare, according to Dean Jacques Barzun.

Apparently the work is very good, too. The study in economic history deals with the building of the atomic plant at Paducah and was done under Dr. Carter Goodrich, the world-famous professor who developed the modification of Frederick Jackson Turner's thesis of the American Frontier and who set up postwar development programs in Burma and Bolivia.

Says Dr. Goodrich, "This is one of the best pieces of work ever turned in to me. It tells a startling story well and it is good economic history as it compares Paducah and Oak Ridge in total cost to the federal government and to society. Mofield shows the U. S. probably saved \$175,000,000 by building the plant at Paducah."

"I think it ought to be published," Dr. Henry Graff of the history department says.

Mofield is an easy person to interview. He smiles easily but is no mere glad-hander. Asked how he had been treated by fellow students, he replied that a few at first asked him if he had ever worn shoes before but he figured it was all in fun. In his classes he always looks around to see if any other hands are up on questions and answers only when no one else seems to know. That makes him popular even though his reputation for always knowing the answer is spreading.

Says Dave Mermelstein of New York, "I've never seen anyone like him. He always knows that fact needed at the moment no matter what field is involved. He remembers everything he reads and he reads a lot. He can

tell you the population of Pittsburgh, the amount of wheat in Kansas and the number of guns on a battleship."

He is fiercely loyal to Kentucky and plans to return there to work in radio at Paducah. With an MA in economics and a minor in history, plus his Murray State degree, he could go most anywhere and is already receiving many offers from such diverse companies as a building supply firm and a Muzac franchise. But it appears it will take a sizeable chunk of money to pry him loose from Paducah.

"I'd rather do a basketball game in Kentucky than eat," he says, adding that he might consider moving to Louisville or Lexington.

Whatever happens to William Ray Mofield in the years ahead, it is a foregone conclusion that in the Department of Economics or of History at Columbia University, they will be remembering the tall boy from Kentucky who showed the city slickers a thing or two about books.

## County Soil Notes

"I have spent a lot of time and money doing half a job on seeding," said John Rayburn of Fairdeal, community. "The only way to get a good sod is to put on the required amounts of time and fertilizer and not pasture until it gets established. Seed bed preparation is also very important."

John plans to seed about 20 more acres of hay and pasture this spring and fall if the weather will cooperate a little. The farmer is on his way toward building a fine herd of registered Herefords.

Paul Anderson, also of Fairdeal, plans to do some work through the ACP emergency program. Last year heavy rains caused considerable damage by caving in banks and depositing silt, brush and trees in the stream channel.

Glen Warren, teacher at South Marshall High School, has started his ACP emergency work. The stream off his farm had become clogged with sand, brush, and fallen trees. Damage was being done to the bottom land as the water swept across it. The U. S.

Soil Conservation Service is responsible for seeing that these repairs are carried out according to instructions. A basic conservation farm plan was developed with Roy Gregory as we discussed the conservation needs of his farm. Mr. Gregory plans to do more pasture and hay seeding and waterway development this year.

discussed his conservation needs. A pond will be constructed and about 12 acres of pasture and hay seeded this year.

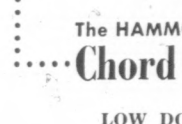

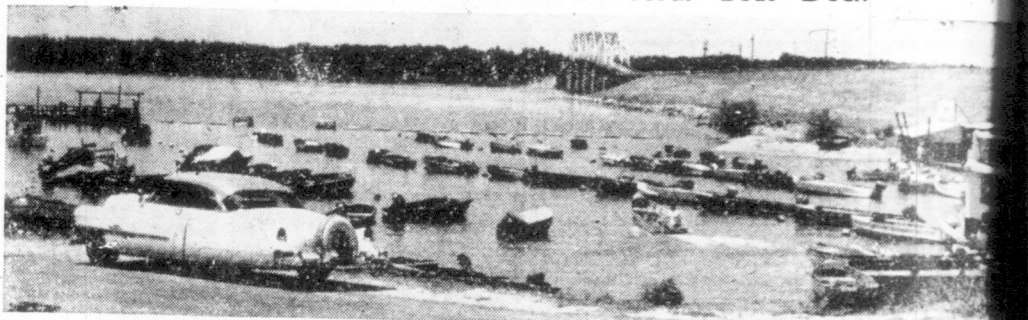

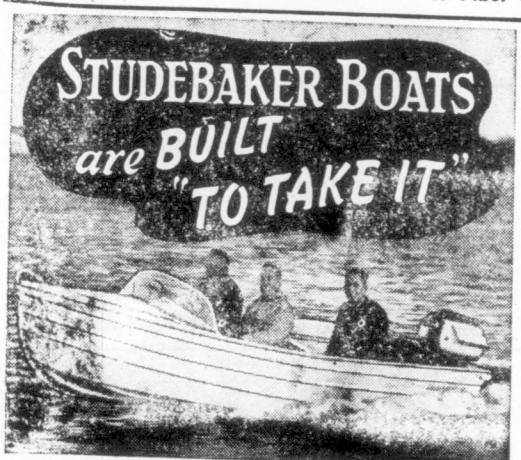
