#### I. C. Freight Wrecked Near Abbott, Ill.

An Illinois Central freight, 1st 72, in charge of conductor W. H. McAnally of Fulton, was derailed Sunday morning near Abbott, Ill., on the Blufford district resulting in damages estimated at between \$60,000 and \$75,000. Traffic will be tied up on this line for several days and trains will be diverted via North Cairo.

The accident which resulted in a derailment of 35 cars was caused, presumably, by a broken flange on a wheel under a tank car loaded with oil. When the cars were derailed on a bridge, fire broke out and badly damaged the cars and the bridge.

#### ALL SEATS ON I. C. TRAINS TO BE RESERVED DURING HOLIDAYS

All seats on all Illinois Central passenger trains will be reserved during the holiday period from December 15 to January 10, and ticket sales will be limited to the space available Coach travelers will have to have reservations, which may be made in the same manner that space is ordinarily reserved in sleeping cars. There will be no charge for coach reservations.

In announcing the plan, J. V. Lanigan, passenger traffic manager of the Illinois Central Railroad said:

"Train travel over the holidays is always very heavy and this year the demand will be far greater than ever because of military movements, furlough travel, essential war business and rationing of gasoline and tires.

"In order that those who must travel on the Illinois Central during the holidays may do so, and to enable such travelers to plan their trips with confidence and complete them as planned, the Illinois Central will extend to all passenger trains from December 15 to January 10 inclusive the coach reservation plan that as worked so well to control weekend travel between Chicago and Champaign, Ill., during the 1942 football season.

"Only persons holding reservation cards as well as railroad tickets will be allowed to board trains. When all space on any train is reserved, no more tickets will be sold for that train that date. Telephone lines are unusually busy, and travelers are urged to go to ticket offices in person, if possible. Coach reservations may be made through any Illinois Central ticket office, and passengers are advised to purchase tickets when reservations are made. Reservations not obtained within established time limits will be canceled.

"The needs of our armed forces will of course come first in the making of reservations. In addition we expect to be able to take care of all necessary travel. Travelers who can postpone their trips until after Jan. 10 are requested to do so."

#### Farm Machinery Rationing Plan Announced

An over-all plan for rationing of new farm machinery and equipment has been announced by the Kentucky State USDA War Board.

With the "unfreezing" of farm machinery and equipment which is in dealers' hands, the new plan permit machinery to be rationed by county farm rationing committees. The machinery in the hands of distributors (wholesalers) and manufacturers will remain frozen until county rationing quotas are established and a system of distribution is set up. County quotas will be announced sometime during December.

Eligibility of farmers to purchase machinery and equipment is determined in essentially the same way as under the previous temporary rationing order, being based on such factors as inadequacy of present equipment, proper disposition of old machinery, and willingness to share equipment.

#### Was Mail Carrier On Dukedom Route

Thomas O. Winsett, 55 years of age, a rural mail carrier on a route from Dukedom, and a resident of Fulton, received injuries which caused his death two hours after an automobile crash on the State Line road, east of Fulton early Tuesday morning. Emmett Stunston, 52 negro, driver of the other car, is in the local hospital, suffering from serious injuries including a broken hip and possible skull fracture. He is employed in the Baldridge store in Fulton and was on his way to Fulton when the crash occurred. Mr. Winsett was on his way to Dukedom to carry his mail route and the two cars collided near the Weldon King residence about two miles east of Fulton.

It is understood that there were no eye-witnesses to the fatal crash which came about 7:30 when darkness still hung over the road. Junior House, Browder Mill employee enroute to work, came by shortly after the accident occurred. He brought the two victims to the Fulton hospital where Mr. Winsett died.

Mr. Winsett, who had been in the postal service for the past thirty years, is survived by his widow, Mrs. Rosalie Cavender Winsett, one son, Charlie Burton, and a daughter Mrs. Dorothy Dale Prince of Detroit, Mich.

He had served as rural carrier out of the local postoffice in earlier years, but for the past few years had been carrying a route out of the Dukedom office, although he made his home in Fulton, the family living on Jackson street.

Funeral services will be held today, (Friday) at 1:00 o'clock.

## Money Talks



By

W. E. Evans

The Office of Price Administration has set July 1 as the date on which it will put into effect the new price regulations on many "retail services."

Some of the more common consumer services which will come under this regulation are laundry and dry cleaning, shoe repairing, lubrication and repairing of private automobiles and other garage services, the repair and servicing of home radio sets and electrical appliances, tailoring, and even the sharpening of household knives and scissors. The maximum price which retailers may charge for these services is the highest price which was charged during March, 1942.

Every person or firm supplying these services is automatically licensed under this regulation. These firms will receive no certificate or formal license, but the Government nevertheless considers them licensed. The purpose of this automatic license is to secure a method of enforcement. If a seller, after a warning from the OPA, violates the regulation, a court of proper jurisdiction may suspend the license for as long as twelve months, and without a license it is illegal to sell services which come under this regulation.

In case these price regulations work an undue hardship on the retailers performing these services, the OPA has set up machinery by which a person may apply for relief. But it is absolutely necessary that retailers performing various services investigate and see if they come under these regulations. If they are not sure of their status, they should contact the nearest OPA office and secure the full regulations.

Professional services, such as those of doctors, dentists, and lawyers, are exempt from price control by the general regulation. Barber shop and beauty parlor prices are also exempt.

Thus we see the Government is enlarging its control over prices of commodities and services which the consumer buys. We may expect more of this, for inflation must be curbed if our living standards are to be maintained.

## U. K. LISTENING CENTERS TO ENJOY CHRISTMAS GIFTS

In spite of the war, Christmas will be celebrated in a very vital way this year in eight of the University of Kentucky's radio listening centers in the Kentucky mountains.

The Lexington Homecrafters, an organization of business and professional men having their own home workshops, are at work every Monday night making toys that they will give to the University of Kentucky to distribute to these centers. 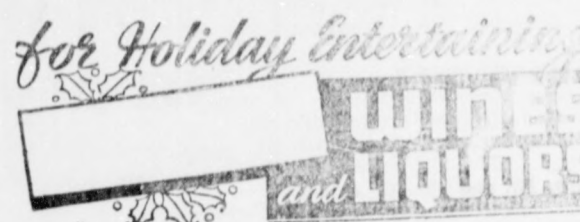
late quota of 60 toys going to each center.

## HOMEMAKERS TO MEET DESPITE RATIONING

In Logan county, the South Union Homemakers' Club secured permission to convert the old, unused South Union depot into a club room for its meetings. Another club rented a house in the country and fixed it up for use. Still another in the same county is making use of a nearby community building.

In Simpson county, two clubs arranged to meet at a central place for a joint program, then separated to hold the business sessions of the two groups.

Ride-sharing clubs in Henderson and Nelson counties save gasoline and provide ways for many club members to get to their meetings, while in Webster county, a number of members come by wagon and others in horse and buggy style.

## 4-H GIRL CANS AND PREPARE 900 MEALS

Juanita Bostic, Harlan county 4-H club president and president of her local club, has canned 425 quarts of fruits and vegetables as well as helping neighbors with their canning. ## SAFETYGRAMS

My attention has been called to recent railroad crossing accident. Some motorists seem to think that there has been a curtailment in railroad traffic because there has been a driving curtailment. On the contrary, more freight trains are being run on a greater number of schedules. It behooves all of us to be more alert than ever at these crossings.

Reduce your speed when you see a sign indicating a railroad crossing.

Look carefully both directions before crossing the track.

Keep the windshield and windows clean and free from frost.

Never change gears while crossing tracks.

Obey the signals of flagmen, automatic signals, or gates, if there are any, at the crossing. Train the good driver it is always train time at railroad crossings. Train your mind to mind the trains.

## CAKE URGED IN HOME CURING PORK

Molasses may be substituted for sugar.

We should not only share the meat but spare the meat as well, by using extra precautions to see that none spoils because of improper curing, states J. C. Snow, U. T. Extension meat specialist.

The two chief methods of curing pork are the dry cure and brine cure. For changeable weather such as we have in Tennessee the dry cure method is preferable. Mr. Snow states. A good recipe for this method is: for each 100 pounds of meat use 7 1-2 pounds of salt; 2 1-2 pounds of granulated sugar; 2 ounces of salt; 4 ounces black pepper; and, ounce of red pepper.

Mix the ingredients thoroughly. Be sure to pulverize the salt. This mixture will serve for three applications. After the meat cools off and has been trimmed, make the first application, using 1-3 of the mixture. The meat should be reprocessed and rubbed with the curing mixture at each packing. Allow 1 1-2 days of curing for each pound of meat. On extremely cold days the meat takes very little if any salt, and these days should not be counted.

Where sufficient sugar is not available, molasses may be substituted in the following mixture: 8 pounds salt; 1 quart molasses; 2 ounces salt; 3 ounces black pepper; 2 ounces red pepper.

Two equal applications of this mixture are made; one as soon as the meat has cooled and the other 3 days later. The hams are allowed to take the cure 1 1-2 days to the pound of meat, but the minimum is 25 days.

Mason, Oriental Club, highway 60 near Owensboro, sixty days each; John R. Heflin, Hub Bar, Owensboro, and Frank Plumridge, Frank's Place Sorgho ten days each.

Shelby county suspensions were: ern, highway 60 near Shelbyville, Mrs. Minnie Tingle, Tingle's Tavern, 60 days; Arthur Lenders, 15 days; Isaac Abram, 10 days; L. C. Donohue and A. D. Hardin, 5 days each. All of the latter are located in Shelbyville.

The Daviess county cases resulted from the Committee's work in carrying out its Army Camp Program designed to improve conditions, where needed, in retail outlets near military training centers. Camp Breckinridge is located at Morgantown, not far from Owensboro and a Coast Guard Training School is operating just outside the Owensboro city limits.

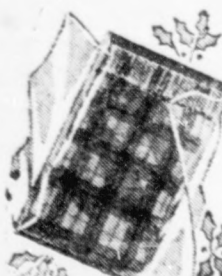
