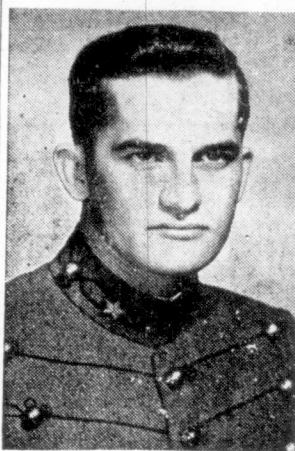

Light Vote Expected Tuesday

A light vote is expected in Marshall County in next Tuesday's primary election. Only two races are listed on the ballot, those for Congress and Court of Appeals. Marshall County officials are predicting a vote of only about 3,000. Only 16 absentee ballots had been cast up to Wednesday. Five candidates are in the race for a seat in Congress from the First District of Kentucky. They are Noble Gregory of Mayfield, Frank Stubblefield and John Pascoe of Murray, L. A. Williams of Cunningham and Harry Lessley Jr. of Paducah. Gregory, incumbent, and Stubblefield are considered the leading candidates. The race for the Court of Appeals is between Elwood Gordon, an attorney at Benton, and Judge Brady Stewart of Paducah, the incumbent.

Guest preacher for the conference will be Dr. George C. Baker Jr., a professor of evangelism at Southern Methodist University, Dallas. This will be the 120th session of the annual Memphis Conference.

Marshall County TB Group Gets Certificate

The Marshall County Tuberculosis Association has been awarded a certificate of outstanding achievement in the 1957 Christmas Seal sale by the directors of the Kentucky Tuberculosis Association. Total receipts of the 1957 seal sale, which was officially concluded on March 31, amounted to \$1840.03, an increase of 25 percent over the previous year's sale. A check for \$644.01, 35 percent of the gross receipts, has been mailed to the state association. The expense of conducting the 1957 Seal amounted to \$491.

A seven-member Planning and Zoning Board was chosen Monday night by the Benton City Council. Both of these men will serve one-year terms. Mayor Guy Mathis is the seventh member of the board, which will attempt to guide Benton's growth in an orderly manner. The City Council also granted the Marshall County Rescue Squad permission to build a storage house for its truck and boat. The storage shed will be built near the city's warehouse in North Benton.

Two teen-agers were injured last Thursday night, May 15, in an automobile accident at the intersection of Pine and 12th Streets in Benton. Jerry Lovett, 18, of Route 4, suffered head injuries and Kathleen Lyles, 17, of Route 3 in the car with Lovett, suffered arm injuries. Both were treated by a Benton physician. Driver of the car, which was approaching the intersection, was Woodrow Blackwell, 20, of Benton Route 2. The car's brakes failed and the vehicle didn't make the turn at the intersection. It overturned in a nearby ditch. Blackwell was not hurt. Martina Freeman of Benton Rt. 2, also in the car suffered bruises. Policeman Bonnie Chambers investigated the accident.

Business License Fees Are Increased

Benton's City Council Monday night passed an ordinance revising and increasing charges for occupational licenses. The new regulations and rates for the business licenses will go into effect next Jan. 1. Most business and professional firms in Benton will pay higher fees under the new regulations. And out-of-town firms operating in Benton will be charged the same fees as Benton firms. Here are some samples of the new charges: Banks, \$150 per year; barber shops, \$50 with an added \$5 for each barber chair in excess of one; beauty parlor, \$25 with a charge of \$3 for each additional operator. Carnivals or street fairs, \$100 per day or \$500 a year; general contractors, \$50; department store, \$100; drug store, \$75; dry cleaning, \$40. Sandwich or barbecue stand, \$100; furniture store, \$75; furniture and appliance store, \$125; filling station, \$50; grocery store, \$50; grocery and meat market, \$75; grocery, meats and general merchandise, \$100. Hardware store, \$50; hardware store and appliances, \$100; hardware, appliances, furniture and general merchandise, \$200. Hucksters, \$5 per day or \$25 per year; jewelry store, \$75; lumber dealers, \$125; oil distributors, \$60; painters and paper hangers, \$25. Plumbers, \$25; physicians, \$50; dentists, \$50; lawyers, \$50; radio station, \$100; radio and TV repair, \$25; repairs, \$40. Restaurants, \$50; tinners, \$25; undertakers, \$75; wallpaper and paint store, \$40; welding shop, \$25. The ordinance soon will be published in full and booklets made for the benefit of the public.

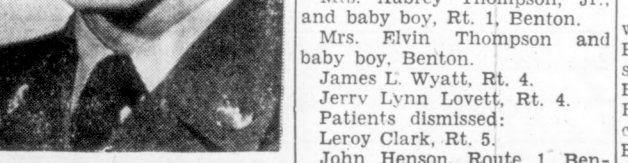
PAT WARREN ATTENDS OPTOMETRIC CONVENTION

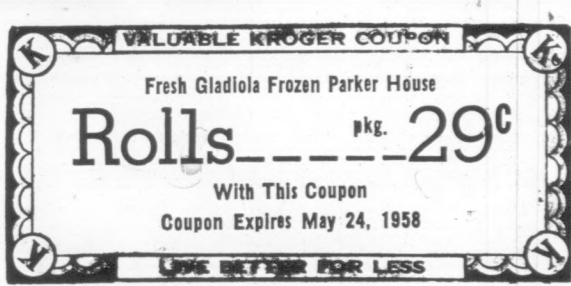

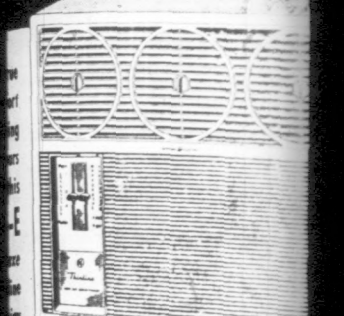
