Predicts Senate Approval

Carter Sees Jet Sale Approval

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is predicting Senate approval of his controversial plan to sell sophisticated U.S. warplanes to Israel and two of its Arab neighbors.

On the eve of the showdown vote, scheduled for late today following several hours of debate, Carter lobbied his \$4.8 billion plane sale proposal with a number of senators. He telephoned them Sunday from the

presidential retreat at Camp David, Md., where he spent the weekend. Then, in a statement issued before he returned to the White House, Carter said he thinks the Senate will approve

the proposed sale to Israel, Egypt and Saudi Arabia. The president said he had been "impressed by the sincere desire of

senators I have talked with this weekend to rise above partisanship and political concerns." He called the sales "crucial to our efforts to secure a just and lasting peace in the Middle East."

Senate Democratic Leader Robert Byrd of West Virginia also foresaw victory. "I think we have the votes to allow the sales to go forward," he said. Two opponents, meanwhile,

predicted a close vote. Republican Sen. Jacob Javits of New York said the resolution to disapprove the sale would be decided by "one or two votes on either side." And the assistant Democratic leader, Sen. Alan Cranston of California, said the situation in the Senate was "extremely fluid." Cranston broke with the ad-

Tornado Cleanup Continues

By The Associated Press. Cleanup work continued in three western Kentucky counties Sunday in the wake of tornadoes that injured 32 people and caused millions of dollars in lamage, officials said.

In Three Counties

Cleanup work continued in three western Kentucky counties Sunday in the wake of tornadoes that injured 34 people and caused millions of dollars in damage, officials said.

The majority of work centered in Hopkinsville, where tornadoes injured 22 persons and destroyed seven homes Friday night, officials said.

In addition to Christian County, tornadoes caused damage in Trigg and Butler counties. Gov. Julian Carroll Saturday declared all three disaster areas.

Tom Little, a spokesman for the state Disaster and Emergency Services Division, said heavy equipment crews had all but completed cleanup of public property such as streets and that private property was slated for work later Sunday and Monday.

Saire Army Is **Battling Invaders**

KINSHASA, Zaire (AP) - Zaire's army is battling rebel invaders in mineral-rich Shaba province for the second time in 14 months, and President Mobutu Sese Seko has asked the United States and other nations for

The official Zaire news agency AZAP said Katangan exiles and Cuban troops slipped across Zaire's southern border with Zambia. The Belgian Foreign Ministry said the invaders came from Angola, crossed northern Zambia and occupied part of Kolwezi, a coppermining center.

Zaire is the former Belgian Congo and Shaba was called Katanga then. The invaders, we members of the Lunda tribe who fied to Angola after the defeat of the late Moise Tshombe's Katangan secession movement in the 1960s, after the Congo got its independence from Belgium.

AZAP said about 4,000 invaders in civilian clothes infiltrated Kolwezi, 25 miles from the Zambian border, and launched an attack there Sunday night. In Brussels, the Belgian Foreigh try said som

Little said. "Now it's a matter of taking care of private property."

"The biggest problem for us right now is trying to dete mine whether there is a need for temporaray housing," Little said. "The Red Cross had a shelter set up in Hopkinsville but closed it Saturday night because there were no takers.

Little said revised damage estimates from the Red Cross "showed more significant damage than we first thought.

Though the number of injuries in Hopkinsville remained at 22, including two who were hospitalized, the number of homes damaged climbed to more than 430. An earlier estimate placed the total at about 200.

"In Hopkinsville there were seven single-family dwellings destroyed, 98 received major damage and 330 received minor damage," Little said. We estimate 18 mobile homes destroyed and six with major damage. Twenty-one businesses were destroyed or had major damage.

"In all, about 420 families in Hopkinsville were affected," Little added.

Little said revised figures for Trigg and Butler counties was not available, but an earlier count included 30 homes damaged in Trigg County and two houses, two mobile homes and eight barns damaged in Butler county.

One death was attributed to the weather. Police said 12-year-old Willard Mitchell Jr. of Cadiz was struck and killed by a car while he was walking in a severe rainstorm along Kentucky 525 eight miles south of Cadiz in Trigg County Friday night.

Mitchell was walking to his grandmother's house for candles when the accident occurred, police said. State

Supreme Court Again Rejects Bid **To Scuttle Panama Canal Treaties**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court today rejected the fourth attempt - and most likely last by 60 House members to scuttle the

Panama Canal treaties. The justices turned down an appeal by the congressmen contending that

the Senate's ratification of the treaties April 18 was unconstitutional. The treaties give Panama permanent control of the canal in the year constitutional challenge received its day in court. Each time, the requests were denied

without comment. A federal trial judge did not rule on

the challenge's merits, holding that the House members lacked the proper legal standing to file such a lawsuit.

The U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Washington, however, ruled that the Constitution provides "concurrent" powers for disposal of U.S. property either by act of Congress or by treaty. In answering the congressmen's appeal, the Carter administration said the controversy was not one for the courts "Petitioners were free to introduce legislation and to seek to convince their colleagues that no property should be transferred to Panama without the consent of the House," the Justice Department said.

Anti-Riot Troops Patrol Tehran Streets

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - Troops and anti-riot police patrolled the streets of Tehran today after opponents of Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi ordered shopkeepers to close and motorists and pedestrians to staf off the streets.

It was estimated that more than half the city's million motorists heeded the stay-home order, but most shops were open. Small groups attacked stores and traffic in two outlying areas of the city but fled as soon as the police arrived. No casualities were reported.

Nine persons were killed and millions of dollars worth of property destroyed in anti-government riots in 34 cities last Tuesday. Troops fired tear gas and bullets into the air to disperse thousands in Tehran's main street on Thursday.

The government's opponents, estimated by it to number from a few thousand to 35,000 all over the country, include conservative Moslem religious groups, Islamic Marxists, the Tudeh Communist Party and others.

Carter wants to sell 60 F-15s to Saudi Arabia, 50 less advanced F-5Es to Egypt and 15 F-15s and 75 F-16s to Israel.

Meanwhile, in a letter to Carter released Saturday, King Khalid of Saudi Arabia said he wanted "to emphasize that the planes are being acquired for defense" and that his country urgently needs the planes "because of the continuing, and recently stepped up, communist expansion in the area.'

His remarks came shortly after Carter told a group of editors that Cuban military forces are operating in South Yemen.

The House International Relations Committee votes on the warplane sale Tuesday. Unless both houses disapprove the sale by May 28, however, Carter is free to go ahead with the sales.

For Piece Of **Radioactive Plywood**

By The Associated Press A search for a piece of radioactive plywood has been called off by the Kentucky State Police.

The search for the 4-by-8 foot piece of plywood began Friday when a truck driver discovered that it had fallen off of his truck loaded with radioactive material bound for a disposal site in Barnwell, S.C. The driver said the plywood could have fallen off anywhere along Interstate 65 between Elizabethtown, Ky., and Nashville.

Police said the piece of plywood was part of a crate containing material being shipped from the Commonwealth Edison nuclear plant at Zion, Ill.

The Tennessee Health Department launched a search for the plywood. Although the agency said the wood wasn't dangerous, it wanted the piece recovered in order to be on the safe side.

Italians Are **Swinging Toward Christian Party**

ROME (AP - Initial returns from Italian local elections showed a strong swing today to the Christian Democrat party whose leader, Aldo Moro, was slain by the terrorist Red Brigades.

Even as the votes were counted, the Brigades struck again, seriously wounding an official of a car factory in Bologna.

In the area of Trent, the northeastern city where Red Brigades leader Renato Curcio spawned his terrorist philosophy, partial returns from Sunday's voting showed the Christian Democrats scoring a strong increase in their share of the vote while the Communists and Socialists lost some ground

Political analysts had predicted a strong sympathy vote for the Christian Democrats after the Red Brigades kidnapped and killed former premier Moro, the president of the party, but the shift seemed to be even stronger than predicted. Moro, 61, was kidnapped March 16. His bullet-riddled body was found in Rome last week after the government refused to deal with the terrorists who demanded the release of some of their comrades.

FIRST STEPS FOR NEWLYWEDS

Q. What sort of investment program would you suggest for newlyweds with limited funds? Combined income about \$20,000. Neither has a pension program at place of employment.

A. Establishment of a life insurance program would be a logical first step. Second, an emergency savings account equivalent to three-to-sixmonths' earnings. Thereafter you could begin an Individual Retirement Act program that could consist of mutual funds invested in common shares or the purchase of common shares direc-

tly. It would be a good idea to use the automatic dividend reinvestment program of a mutual fund offered to shareholders by many large corporations.

Q. A few years ago I bought shares in a corporation in another city. Is it required to inform shareholders periodically? How? If the company goes broke, would there be a notice published?

A. First let's rule out the "another city" factor. The location of the company has no bearing on its responsibility to keep shareholders informed.

You are certainly entitled to receive quarterly and annual statements, as well as notice of annual meetings and proxy statements in the mail. These should come directly to you. The same applies to notification of bankruptcy proceedings.

Q. I decided to buy government bonds in order to reduce my income tax bill but was told that such a purchase is limited to \$7,500 a year. Furthermore, government notes require collecting interest regularly, as in a bank. I want to buy \$50,000 worth of government bonds to cut my tax bill.

A. I think you must first distinguish between U.S. Savings bonds and Treasury bonds.

Savings (E) bonds grow at the rate of 6 percent until such time as you cash in the bonds or cash in the H bonds which you may obtain by turning in E bonds (still deferring the income taxes on the accumulated E bond interest).


The \$7,500 annual (purchase price) limitation applies to E bonds. You may buy \$50,000 or \$50 million worth of Treasury bonds any day of the week. Asto taxes:

Interest on all federal debt is subject to federal income taxes, but exempt from state and local income taxes.

E bonds pay out no interest, so you need not pay an annual tax on the accrued interest. Treasury notes and bonds (not bills) pay interest every six months, which is federally taxable whether you collect the interest coupon or not. (The same is true of savings account interest.) If you are thinking of exemption from federal (as well as state and local) income taxes, think municipals.

Q. How does one arrive at a quality designation for municipal bonds?

A. Just as one would arrive at a quality designation for any security: by looking at the rating agencies who make their living rating comres. preferreds, corporate municipal bonds. You can see these ratings at any brokerage firm and banks and at some libraries.

Ford: Fillmore Or Cleveland?

WASHINGTON - In the not-so-longago days when Gerald Ford was being compared to Millard Fillmore, our rather unsuccessful 13th president, Ford was never bothered enough to pursue the likeness. Thus, it's probably fair to speculate that he's not responding to current Ford-Grover Cleveland analogies by checking biographies of the 22nd and 24th president out of the Palm Springs Library

That's right, 22nd and 24th. Whereas Millard Fillmore, who took office in 1850 upon the death of Zachary Taylor and served until 1853, was the last Whig president, Cleveland's claim to fame rests on his political recuperative abilities. First elected to the White House in 1884, the New York Democrat was defeated for re-election in 1888 by Republican Benjamin Harrison, but Cleveland then went on to defeat Harrison in 1892. Cleveland thus became the lone U.S. president to serve two non-consecutive terms. And some history books list him as both the 22nd and 24th president.

Could Gerald Ford become the GOP Grover Cleveland? It's a tantalizing prospect. To date, the prevailing view in the upper echelons of the Republican Party has been that a new face is needed for 1980. Both Republican National Chairman Bill Brock and National Republican Congressional Committee Chairman Guy Vander Jagt have said as much -- and quite bluntly. The hope: to come up with a younger 1980 candidate who can sidestep both 1976 Ford-Reagan factionalism and 1977-78 intra-party bitterness over the Panama Canal treaties.

But there are increasing signs that Gerald Ford may not see things that way. Several weeks back, Newsweek noted that he was thinking about hiring a political aide and a press secretary. he's been in touc And in recent weeks with some former aides, telling them he hopes they'll be available should he ever get back in the national political ballgame. Alternatively, other ex-Ford aides privately allege that the expresident has reached a tentative decision not to run in the 1980 primaries but to remain available for a draft in the event the convention either deadlocked or turned to him by acclamation.

nomination. Whereas Ronald Reagan led Ford in late 1977, Gallup now reports Ford ahead of Reagan by 40-30 percent. I have my doubts about this, though. NBC News surveys show Reagan with much the same lead over Ford (43-35 percent) in March that he had back in 1977. What's more, Reaganites are showing considerably more strength in party primaries, and even moderate GOP leaders generally admit that if the convention were meeting today, Reagan would win.

Still, while polls showing Ford ahead of Reagan seem somewhat unrealistic, I can suggest one partial reason for a mild Ford surge and a slight Reagan ebb. Ever since the forme California-governor became the early-book 1980 nomination favorite latelast year, he's been toning down his rhetoric. Meanwhile, Ford has been sounding tougher and tougher, especially in his criticisms of President Carter. Not a few of his speeches sound like 1976 vintage Ronald Reagan! Gerald Ford out of office is a lot bolder - and much less content with the status quo -- than Gerald Ford in office.

Of course come 1979, both Ford and Reagan may decide not to make another bid for the White House. And the Republican Party's hopes for a

Ugly Protesters

It's an interesting question. Why do so many political protesters tend to be, to put it mildly, physically ugly? South Africa has been this spring's

protest issue on the college campus. At Princeton, 800 students demanded that the university withdraw its money from corporations doing business there. A similar number turned out at Harvard, a much smaller number at Dartmouth, etc.

For now, I want to set aside the substance, pro or con, of the in-vestment in the South Africa issue.

But it is simply a visual fact that the students and non-students marching in these picket lines with hand-lettered placards are mostly quite unattractive human beings. First of all, the most casual glance

indicates that most of them were not very well endowd by nature to begin with. They are either too fat or too thin, they tend to be strangely proportioned. Often, various features are somehow ... wrong. They do not stride forth as if they had a valid claim on existence. They shuffle. Some move as if one leg were a couple of inches shorter than the other.

But if nature failed to give most of these people much to work with, they themselves have certainly not improved matters much. Ill-fitting blue jeans seem to be the uniform. Sloppy shirts. Hair looks unkempt, unwashed. They wear a variety of stupid looking shoes. Yuck.

people shuffling around has nothing much to do with South Africa. Perhaps they are really protesting against what they see when they look in the mirror. Perhaps this is a kind of cosmic protest against the way things, the way they, actually are. Comes the revolution and, boy, it would take some revolution - they will be attractive human beings. Their ugliness seems an act of will. Perhaps they think it symbolizes proletarian status, the great unwashed.

But, of course, the actual proletariat does not consider itself ugly. The American worker has a collection of Linda Ronstadt records, a motorboat and a Volvo. Of course the South Africa protest

marchers, most of them, implicitly desire a "socialist" solution there.

Another alternative has not occurred to them. Suppose foreign capital poured into that resource-rich region. Might it not overwhelm the musty 19th century apartheid system with the economic pressures of modernity, make black workers much too valuable to mistreat? That, at least, is one possibility.

But it has not occurred to these dim types, shuffling along with their tired slogans. They are not only ugly, they are stupid.

Q. I realize that government spending contributes to inflation. But what about companies that pay inflated prices to acquire other companies?

A. They tend to inflate the price of the stock of the purchased company, especially when they have to make a tender offer to the public to get all the stock needed for control. But I don't see how that enters into the inflationary spiral unless, of course, prices on the product are then raised to justify the high price paid in the corporate "takeover.

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







Q. - I have a considerable amount of wood that has to be sanded. I do not have a power sander and prefer, in any case, to use steel wool. My wife has a large quantity of steel wool on hand that she uses for cleaning pots and pans. Can this steel wool be used on wood?

A. - Not unless it is a type that does not contain soap, as most do. You're better off using the type of steel wool that you can purchase in a hardware store. It does not contain soap or water, which can raise the grain of the wood and, in some cases, warp And you can purchase it in various grades of coarseness, enabling you to choose the proper kind for the job that has to be done. A very fine steel wool is best for the preparation of the wood prior to the application of a clear finish. Also, be sure all grit particles are removed from the wood before applying any kind of finish.

Q. - In some wood finishing that I expect to do this summer, please give me some advice about the use of a sealer. After removing all the old finish from furniture, I intend to apply a stain and then varnish. At which point during the operation is the sealer applied?

A. - The sealer usually is applied over the stain and before the final finish is put on. However, some wood finishers use a sealer both before and after the application of stain, a procedure which I also have utilized. When the sealer is put on before the stain, it helps the stain to "take" more evenly. However, there is a school of thought which feels this is an unnecessary step in

These rigid pipes normally are assembled with a solvent cement that chemically 'welds" fittings and pipes together. They can be cut with a fine-tooth saw or a tube cutter. Pressurerated PVC and ABS pipes also are available for pressure applications, such as cold water lines. Old and crumbling sewer lines are being renewed by "slip lining. In this process, sections of large and flexible plastic pipe are butt-fused into long lengths, then are snaked through existing metal or concrete sewer lines to add many years of life to existing sewer systems. In competing with

metal and concrete pipe, plastic pipe keeps growing in size?" A plastic pipe 48 inches in diameter is currently being used at Fort Valdez, Alaska, to carry oil tanker ballast from an onshore plant to a discharge point 1,000 feet offshore and 242 feet under water. One of the reasons for

the increasing popularity of plastic pipe, aside from its light weight and resistance to corrosion, is that it can be easily worked and connected. But that doesn't mean you can rush headlong into the installation of it. There are certain fundamentals that must be followed to make it secure. 


Checked your attic lately? What you once thought was merely a family memento or just an old piece of 'junk" could turn out to be more valuable than you think.

NEW YORK (AP) - In the days when the CIA's paramilitary skills were freely in use around the world, he sent the first sabotage teams into North Vietnam.

From those clandestine beginnings grew the intense American bombing of North Vietnam and the commitment of 550,000 U.S. ground troops. The man who admits to Dinh Nhu, Diem's brother starting it all, William and opponent of American Colby, later director of the CIA, now believes it plans for reform. was all a mistake.

In his book published today by Simon & Schuster, "Honorable Schuster, "Honorable Men: My Life in the CIA," Colby argues that "whether we would have won or lost," the only way to have sensibly fought the Vietnam war was at the village level as a political struggle against the communists, using only Vietnamese forces

Colby criticizes the late President John F. Kennedy for going along with "what I still consider the worst mistake of the war, the American-sponsored overthrow of President Ngo Dinh Diem," and writes that earlier two "high ranking" United States officials clearly implied that the CIA should assassinate Ngo


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
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

Good Chance That Three Movies Will Be Filmed In Kentucky

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) - There's a good chance that two fulllength feature films and a made-for-television movie will be filmed in Kentucky later this year, according to Tom Clark-Todd, executive director of the state film commission.

Shooting is scheduled to start Friday on James Michener's "Centennial." "There is a move afoot

to to do more production outside Hollywood," Clark-Todd said in a telephone interview Thursday. "Audiences are ready for a different look than southern California."

Noting that there's not really much difference between Kentucky and Tenneseee or Ohio, Clark-Todd said a film company's selection of a state "comes down to an agressive sales effort." He said competition has grown more intense in recent years, with 43 states and nine cities havig their own film commissions.

Kentucky's commission was established in July, 1976, and since then seven films or portions of films have been shot on location in the commonwealth, bringing some \$2.4 million into the Kentucky economy, Clark-Todd said.

The commission operated on a budget of \$166,000 for the last two fiscal years. The amount will be increased to about \$270,000 over the next biennium



HEARTLINE: I read an article in the April issue of Moneysworth magazine about a discount on U.S. Postage stamps that is available to senior citizens. Can you tell me where I can get information on this program? - S.Z.

There was a postage discount available to senior citizens last year through teh Hillcrest Branch of the State Mutual Savings & Loan Assn. in San Diego, Calif. But a spokesman for the Hillcrest Branch told Heartline the discount no longer is in effect. When the branch opened last year, it offered the 25 per cent discount to senior citizens for a book of 23 13-cent stamps, but the discount was not advertised and was good only for a six-month period as an incentive plan to attract new depositers. Jeffrey Nisbet, Moneysworth editor, said the magazine has had numerous requests for information about the discount. A spokesman for the U.S. Postal Service said such an offer is not available in any area--for senior citizens or anyone else.

HEARTLINE: My father has always been working under the Railroad Retirement System. He has never worked at all in a job covered by Social Security. My father will be 59 years old this week and he says he does not feel like working much more. How old does he have to be to retire under the Railroad Retirement System? -- K.R.

To be eligible for a basic Railroad Retirement annuity, a person must have at least 10 years (120 months) of railroad service. An employee with at least 10 years of railroad service can retire at age 65 and receive a full annuity, or can be eligible for a reduced pension (up to 20 per cent) between the ages of 62 and 64. In addition to this, employees who retire after June 1974 with 30 years of service can receive a full annuity at age 60 without any reduction for early retirement.

Your father could possibly receive a supplemental annuity if he has at least 25 years (294 months) of creditable railroad service and a current connection with the railroad industry.

HEARTLINE: My husband is 66 years old. He started to draw his Social Security benefits when he was 65 years old. I am presently 61 years old. I will be 62 in June and I plan to draw Social Security wife's benefits because I have never worked under Social Security at all. Can you tell me how much of his Social Security that I can receive? - K.F.

The Social Security benefit for a wife who starts drawing on her husband's work record is 75 per cent of one-half her husband's unreduced benefit. This figures out to 37.5 per cent of his unreduced benefit.

This age 62 benefit is a reduction of what a wife who starts receiving benefits at age 65 would get. A wife at age 65 receives 50 per cent of her husband's unreduced benefit. The percentage for a wife starting at age 63 is 83.4 per cent of one-half of her husband's unreduced benefit, and at age 64, 91.7 per cent of one-half of her husband's unreduced benefit.

A wife who starts drawing these benefits at a reduced amount at age 62, 63, or 64 does not get a raise when they turn 65. They must continue on this reduced benefit for as long as they draw Social Security wife's benefits.

copy can also be obtained from any local health department office. Persons who need a copy immediately can obtain them in person at the Vital Statistics office. The waiting time is usually less than an hour.

make up 80 percent of the office's \$1 million budget. The remaining 20 percent will come from general

After July 1, Kentucky's fee for birth and death certificates will be slightly higher than the fees in surrounding states. "Still, most of us feel that Kentuckians are getting a bargain," said Greeman. "Kentucky is the only state in this immediate area with a single source for certificates. Only 11 states in the nation have a single certification authority. This adds considerably to the acceptability and the integrity of a Kentucky

birth or death certificate." Because of the singlesource system, he said confidentiality is more certain and fraudulent certificates are more difficult to obtain here than in states which make to copies available in every county courthouse.

Collide Over Kansas

LAWRENCE, Mass. (AP) - Two light planes collided and exploded over downtown Lawrence Thursday afternoon, killing three men aboard the planes and showering wreckage onto a playground where young girls were playing soft-

Witnesses said none of the girls on the softball field was injured. Fire Chief Richard

Lacey said identities of the three men were being withheld until relatives could be told.

There were early conflicting reports about whether two planes collided or whether a single aircraft exploded, but "from what I could see, there were two planes," said Wilfred Desruisseaux, chairman of the Lawrence Airport Commission, who inspected the wreckage at the softball field about five blocks from the center of Lawrence. "One was so mangled, I couldn't tell what kind it was.

Parts of the planes were strewn for blocks.

One of the planes, a four-seat Cherokee, apparently had just taken off from Lawrence Airport, about 25 miles north of Boston, when the accident occurred. Desruisseaux said the airport has no control wer and was not in touch by radio with either plane

Flames Hit Louisville's Tallest Bldg.

LOUISVILLE, Ky (AP) - Fire on the 34thfloor of Louisville's tallest building led firemen and police to evacuate the top seven floors Friday.

Almost everyone else in the 40-floor First National Tower evacuated voluntarily, jamming the area around the building.

Firemen began allowing those who worked below the 34th floor back inside after about an hour.

Firemen did not immediately know the cause of the two-alarm blaze, which they said was extinguished in about 20 minutes:

A spokesman in the city fire tower said the fire was believed to have started in an air duct system near the elevator on the 34th floor.

However, a fire official on the scene said he believed it started in a copying room on that floor.
