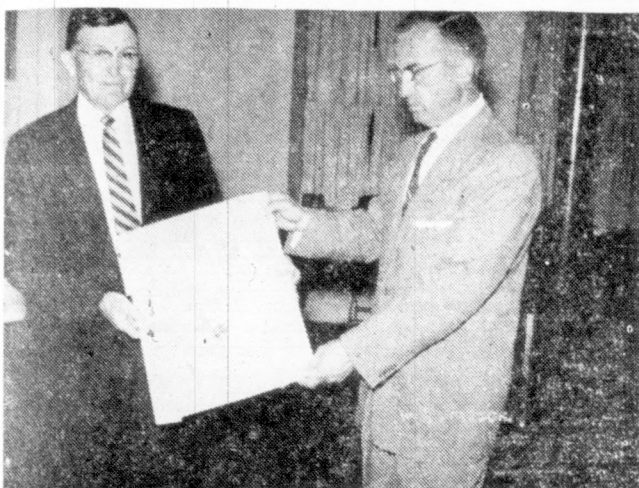

The 75th annual Old Southern Harmony Singing Day, which drew a crowd of approximately 2,500 persons to Benton Sunday.

Only a few score were in the Marshall Circuit Courtroom Sunday morning for the start of the singing program. In the afternoon, however, the courtroom was filled and the visitors partly filled the courthouse yard and the Court Square business area.

The crowd reached its peak about 3 p.m. and by 4:30 o'clock the Court Square was almost deserted.

Big Singing Day has been gradually diminished in popularity for several years and it is doubtful if it ever again will attract the big, colorful crowds of the pre-automobile days.

Cratus Crowell of Hawthorne, Ark., was recognized as having traveled the greatest distance to attend Big Singing Day.

Farm Leaders Do Final Work On Brucellosis

Marshall County Farm Bureau directors and other farm leaders of the county met at the Chevrolet Cafe last Monday night to make plans for the final petitioning for brucellosis control of all cattle in the county.

A complete cattle inventory will be necessary among all cattle owners before the state will give free testing over the entire county. Twenty-five percent of the cattle are required before the state and federal government will assist with the testing, County Agent Miller said.

This can be accomplished only by three-fourths of cattle owners signing petitions. If you have not signed and you want area testing, contact your Farm Bureau directors, the Farm Bureau office, Coop Store, your agricultural teacher, or your county agent before June 14. The survey must be completed by that time.

If petitioning is completed the state will test all cattle without cost. Reactors will be eligible for indemnity from state and federal governments. The county can be certified brucellosis free after testing is completed.

In fact, he likes it so well that he has attended school 12 years without missing a single day.

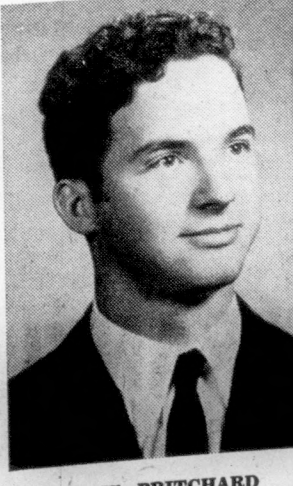

Cleaning Care Preserves Linoleum Beauty

BY EDNA MILES

A LINOLEUM floor, contrary to popular opinion, is not indestructible. But it will take a lot of wear and tear, including rough usage from children and pets.

However, it needs the right cleaning methods if it is not to bulge and crack. And it should be waxed to preserve the beauty of its finish.

Don't flood linoleum with water when you wash it. If you use a cleaning product specifically formulated for linoleum, you won't need a lot of water. A once-over wiping with a damp mop cleans the floor evenly and quickly, without rinsing.

To make your job easier, make use of the new mopping equipment that takes the strain from you as well as from the floor. A mop with a built-in wringer is a big help. It also cuts down on the amount of water you need.

Remember, your linoleum cannot stand the pressure of heavy furniture. Set furniture legs in coaster-like cups that distribute the weight evenly and keep the linoleum from becoming marred.

Calvert Presbyterians Will Install Minister

The Presbytery of Western Kentucky of the United Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. will meet Thursday at 7:30 p.m. at the First Presbyterian Church, Calvert City, to ordain Harry F. MacCall to the Gospel ministry, and to install him as pastor of the Calvert City Church.

He is married to the former Miss Mary Lou Jones of Louisville, Ky., and they have one small son. The MacCalls are living in the church manse at Calvert City.

All members and friends of the Calvert City church, and of the McCalls, are invited to attend the ordination and installation services, J. B. McFarland, Clerk of the Session, said.

Following the service, a reception will be given in the fellowship hall at the church by the women of the congregation.

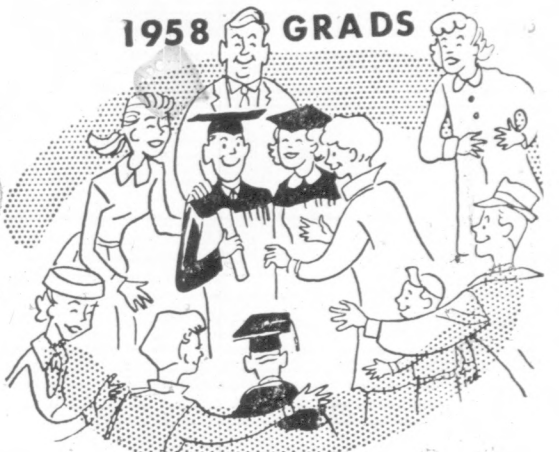

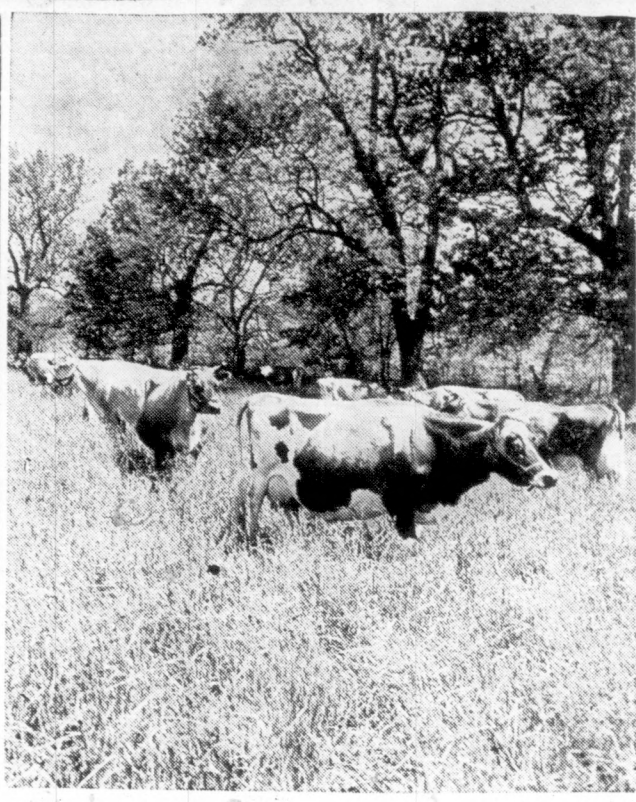
