Approved By House

\$50.9 Billion Deficit Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal budget that makes room for a tax cut of \$19.4 billion next year and reduces spending slightly below earlier plans was narrowly approved by the House on Wednesday.

The House adopted the compromise budget, 201 to 198, after the Senate accepted it Monday by voice vote. This completes action on a tentative budget resolution, not requiring the president's signature.

This target budget for fiscal 1979, the federal bookkeeping year starting Oct. 1, 1978, calls for \$498.8 billion in spending and \$447.9 billion in revenues, resulting in a \$50.9 billion deficit.

The budget resolution will serve as a guide while the lawmakers consider actual spending and taxing bills. A second resolution in September will set mandatory limits.

President Carter, who originally proposed a \$25 billion tax cut, bowed to increasing concern about inflation and congressional insistence in accepting the \$19.4 billion total tax reduction. The budget resolution does not spell out exactly how the tax reduction should be split between income taxes and Social Security payroll taxes.

Later the House voted down a proposal to increase the national debt limit to accommodate the expected deficits for the remainder of this year and next year.

The vote was 228 to 167 against a bill that would have increased the present \$752 billion limit expiring July 31, to \$849.1 billion, expiring Sept. 30, 1979.

It was the second time this year the House refused to approve a new limit on the borrowings the Treasury must make to cover deficit financing. Handlers of the legislation presumably will now seek a compromise figure.

Earlier Wednesday, the House Ways and Means Committee reversed a prior vote and rejected legislation that would have rolled back part of the Social Security tax increase scheduled for next year. Efforts to revive a Social Security

tax rollback, however, are expected

both in the House and the Senate.

The budget allows Congress to provide up to about \$1 billion in tuition relief. However, Congress must still decide whether the relief should be in the form of expanded grants and loans, as Carter proposes, or tuition tax credits, favored by many lawmakers. The resolution also provides for \$115.7 billion in defense spending, or \$2.1 billion less than Carter proposed.

The defense figure was said to be sufficient to honor the president's commitment to European allies to

increase spending by 3 percent. The deficit figure is about \$10 billion less than Carter's original estimate.

Republicans argued that the reduction of the deficit was ac complished largely by providing less tax relief than the president recommended and by underestimating expenditures. The GOP has called for even greater tax cuts, matched with spending restraints.

Most Americans Rescued

KINSHASA, Zaire (AP) — Rebel tribesmen were reported gaining ground Wednesday in southern Zaire, stranding 2,500 foreigners behind their lines, but American officials said a surprise ground-and-air rescue mission mounted by a U.S. firm managed to evacuate most Americans from the embattled area.

In this capital city, more than 100,000 dancing and chanting Zaireans rallied in a stadium in support of President Mobutu Sese Seko's pro-West government and to denounce alleged Cuban and Soviet support for the rebels. The central government and rebel

invaders accused each other of murdering whites in the war zone. "Foreigners are being bunted in

"Foreigners are being hunted in Kolwezi," Foreign Minister Henri Simonet told the Belgian Parliament in Brussels. He said this was the last message Belgian officials received from the rebel-held town in this central African nation's southeastern copper belt.

He urged Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim of the United Nations to take action to aid civilians caught in the fighting.

A United Nations spokesman in New York said Waldheim was in touch with various sources to get foreigners out of the area "on humanitarian grounds."

Belgian Foreign Ministry spokesman Alfred Cahen described the 2,000 Belgians, 400 French citizens and assorted other foreigners in the Kolwezi area as hostages of the rebels. The Kinshasa government dropped several hundred paratroopers around Kolwezi earlier this week to join ground forces in a drive against the rebels. The Zairean news agency AZAP said the paratroopers recaptured the Kolwezi airport Wednesday after three hours of heavy fighting. There has been no word on military

casualties. Various reports from diplomats here and from Belgian sources said between five and nine Europeans have been killed in the Kolwezi area — apparently all Belgians, except for one Italian.

In a statement issued in Brussels, the rebel Congolese National Liberation Front denied its forces had killed wreigners in the five-day-old invasion, said they were protecting civilians and blamed any civilian deaths on "barbaric" government forces.

The American rescue operation was mounted by the construction firm Morrison-Knudson of Boise, Idaho, which is building a power project near Kolwezi and employs most of the Americans in the area. said civilian helicopters and a truck convoy encountered no opposition as they made their way to the Morrison-Knudson compound eight miles from Kolwezi, picked up 77 employees and dependents and took them 60 miles to Musonoi. From there they were flown to Kananga, 400 miles from the fighting.

A company spokesman said two employees and two dependents were missing, and eight other Americans six missionaries, one tourist and an employee of a mining firm — also remained in the rebel sector.

The company identified its missing as Lonnie W. Glen, his wife and child, from Yerrington, Nev., and William Starkey of Boise.

State Department spokesman Robert Holliday said the best information available indicated none of those left behind was injured or was being held by the rebels.

A Pentagon spokesmen said it now

appeared unlikely U.S. paratroopers put on alert for a possible evacuation mission would go into action, but they would remain on alert.

But officials in Brussels said Belgian paratroopers were ready to head to the former Belgian colony if needed to save their countrymen.

Cahen said the Belgian government also was considering a Zairean request for weapons. Mobutu, who crushed a similar invasion last year with the help of Moroccan troops and French, Belgian and U.S. equipment, has asked for new Western help in the current campaign.

President Omar Bongo of Gabon, chairman of the Organization of African Unity, called on all African governments Wednesday to back Zaire in the conflict.

Legislation was introduced in Congress Wednesday to ease restraints on President Carter's authority to ship arms and equipment to Zaire without prior congressional approval.

Not To Reduce Social Security Fees

Committee Reverses Itself, Elects

WASHINGTON (AP) - A \$19.4 billion tax cut tentatively approved by Congress will likely be used to cut your income taxes, but not your Social Security payroll deductions.

The House Ways and Means Committee reversed itself Wednesday and voted not to apply part of the tax cut to Social Security.

But backers of the payroll tax cut this year for 106 million Americans are not conceding defeat. Rep. Fortney Stark, D-Calif., said the fight will be carried to the Democratic Caucus, the rules committee and the full House.

Even if that effort is successful in the House, sentiment for a Social Security tax cut is not nearly so strong in the Senate.

In quick order Wednesday:

-The House Ways and Means Committee voted 21-16 against any reduction in Social Security taxes this year. The same panel had agreed 19-18 only six days earlier on a \$14.5-billion rollback.

-The House gave final approval, by a vote of 201 to 198, to a federal budget for fiscal 1979, the 12 months that begin on Oct. 1 this year. The \$498.8 billion spending proposal would accommodate a tax cut of \$19.4 billion in either income taxes, Social Security taxes or a combination of the two.

Total spending would be about \$600 million less than President Carter recommended. The Senate-passed budget, which will guide Congress in considering spending and taxing bills over the next 4½ months, is not subject to consideration by the president.

-The House rejected, 228-167, a bill that would raise the ceiling on the national debt and allow the government to borrow enough money to finance the \$50.9 billion deficit anticipated in that budget. The current debt limit expires Aug. 1.

The deficit is almost \$10 billion lower than what Carter anticipated when he submitted his budget proposals last January. The reduction resulted mainly from Carter's decision — with approval of the budget committees to pare his proposed tax cut in order to moderate inflation.

Public Meet Tonight

The public is reminded of a public meeting beginning at 7:30 o'clock tonight in the Mayfield City Hall.

The city council's Finance Committee called tonight's public meeting to discuss city finances and methods of raising revenue for city government. Interested persons are urged to attend the meeting. Rep. Robert Giaimo, D-Conn., chairman of the House Budget Committee, said a reduction in Social Security taxes would be a strong step toward further reducing inflationary pressures. But such a cut is opposed by the Carter administration and by a growing number of lawmakers, even in this election year.

Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., chairman of the Ways and Means committee, had voted for the rollback when it was approved by his panel last week. But he told colleagues Wednesday he had voted that way primarily because the

House Democratic Caucus had instructed his committee to write a Social Security tax cut bill.

"I have decided that I cannot live with a vote" to cut Social Security taxes in a way that would result in massive uses of income taxes for the pension system, Ullman said. He and three other members who had supported the rollback a week earlier changed their votes and the bill was killed.

The bill would have used \$14.5 billion of income taxes to make up for a cut of the same size in Social Security taxes.

UK Board Appointee Reportedly Paid For Flight By Governor's Daughter

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) - ALexington businessman provided Gov. Julian Carroll's daughter and her friends with a chartered jet flight to the Bahamas last March worth more than \$2,000 at commercial rates, The Courier-Journal has reported in a coprighted story.

In its Thursday editions, the newspaper said the businessman, W.B. "Bill" Terry, had received from the governor an appointment to the University of Kentucky board of trustees.

The governor's daughter and three friends spent about a week at Treasure Cay in the Bahamas, The Courier-Journal said. The report said the governor's office could not confirm Wednesday night how the young women returned to Kentucky.

Gary Auxier, the governor's deputy press secretary, said the governor sees nothing wrong in his daughter's receiving free travel and accommodations from such businessmen, the newspaper said.

Rescue Is Planned For Other Americans

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) – Representatives of the United States, Belgium and other countries will meet today to make arrangements for the rescue of more than 2.500 Europeans and 14 Americans from southern Zaire, Belgian Premier Leo Tindemans announced.

Tindemans refused to say where the representatives of the United States, Britain, France, Belgium and African countries would meet. "We're talking about friends, and nothing was done with respect to any dealings that anyone may have with state government," Auxier said. He said the governor contacted Terry concerning the flight and no payment was made, The Courier-Journal reported.

The trip reportedly occurred during the March 11-19 spring vacation at Murray State University, where Carroll's daughter is a senior.

The flight to the Bahamas was in a Learjet provided by Sprite-Flite Jets Inc., Lexington, according to information gathered by The Courier-Journal.

Terry was the original president of Sprite-Flite Jets, according to corporation records in Frankfort, but said Tuesday that he no longer owns any part of the company, the newspaper said.

Carroll named Terry to the UK board of trustees last December, but he was not sworn in because it was discovered that a conflict-of-interest law apparently prohibited him from serving, according to the newspaper.

With Carroll's support, the state Legislature last March amended the law to allow Terry to take his trustee's seat next month, the newspaper said.



THE ELDERLY GET A SCARE

Q. As a senior citizen 1'm plenty worried about all the talk concerning bank problems. Do you think they will fold? Will the government really "pull the switch" and let them sink?

A. I suppose it is to be expected that "doom and gloomers" should take advantage of mounting federal deficits, continuing inflation and dollar weakness to step up the volume of their dour predictions. Nor am I opposed to criticism of what is considered dangerous and irresponsible national economic policy. But I do feel that any opposition force should be directed at correcting these policies rather than sadistically frightening elderly persons who are just managing to get by on a small pension and the interest from a few thousand dollars in a savings account with stories that banks are going down the drain, or that the government is going to exchang e\$1 for every \$10 now on deposit, or that the government is going to withdraw its bank insurance programs - or any other items of wild propaganda which have come to this desk from readers who are frightened out of their wits by these purveyors of doom.

l refuse to believe any of these stories is true. Why should the government drop an insurance program which has, more than any other single factor, brought stability to our banking system? With living costs doubled, with purchasing power of our dollar just about halved in the last decade what would be the point to a "reverse split" in the dollar?


1 am not a bank stock analyst. But more and more analysts in a position to study the industry are advocating bank stocks as a "buy," especially in view fo the improvement in real estate and other loans. In any event, our government is neither about to withdraw its sponsorship bank insurance nor do anything which would send banks "down the drain." And I think the scare tactics directed against unsophisticated investors are reprehensible.

Q. Please tell me something about "Ginnie Maes." All my friends are buying them and I feel l'mmissing out on something. A. Ginnie Mae stands for Government National

Mortgage Association which was established in 1968 as a corporate instrument of the U.S., and as an adjunct to the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Jeffrey Hart Says Communist? Don't Mention It

Communists do not exist. At least that must be a working assumption ot the mass media and much commentary. Judging by media treatment of the Letelier murder case, for example, you would never guess what has been tirmly established: that "Orlando Letelier was a communist agent functioning in Washington with funds from East Germany funnelled through the Cuban version of the KGB, the DGI. This was shown beyond doubt by the contents of Letelier's briefcase which were examined after his mur-

Nor would you ever learn from ABC-TV that filmmaker Joris Ivens, whose propaganda films were featured on 'Good Morning, America," hosted by David Hartman, has been, by his own admission made in a French newspaper, a communist and a revolutionary since 1928.

But to one nationally syndicated columnist Letelier is, simply "Orlando Letelier, the charismatic Chilean exile leader who was murdered here when a bomb destroyed his car." How's that for a description of a communist agent? Apparently there's no one here but us charismatics.

In its own update on the Letelier case, concerning the expulsion of a Letelier murder suspect from Chile, Time magazine goes just a bit further with the Letelier identity: "Letelier had been a trusted Cabinet member under Chile's Marxist President Salvador Allende Gossens. After Allende was overthrown by a right wing military coup in 1973, Letelier was jailed for 14 months, then allowed to go into exile in Washington." Period. quote, end-quote. Total treatment. Does Time, with all its researchers, not know that Letelier's funds were being handled through Havana by Allende's daughter Beatrix, who had married the number two man in the Cuban DGI? Of course it knows this. But why is this part of the actuality being treated so demurely? Similarly, with the Joris Ivens caper. 'Good Morning, America," this is David Hartmen introducing "a wellknown documentary filmmaker who's been shooting film in China since 1939." Ivens explained that he had been permitted to do so because he had been a friend of Chou En-lai. Hartman then showed several sequences from lyens' 12-hour, yes, 12-hour, film celebrating the delights of the mainland peasants' paradise.

What the ABC-tv audience never learned was that Ivens has been producing films celebrative of the revolutionary cause for half a century, films about the Soviet Union ("Song of Heroes"), the Left in Spain ("Spanish Earth"), and Castro's Cuba ("People in Arms"). He won the World Peace Prize, awarded in Helsinki by the World Peace Council. Leonid Brezhnev won the same prize in 1975.

In a 1976 interview with "Le Nouvel Observateur" reprinted and translated in the magazine "Atlas," Ivens stated that he had "been a communist and a revolutoinary since 1928." He also declared his strong sympathies for the Chinese brand of Marxism: "Being a revolutionary, and with my knowledge of Marxism-Leninism, the Chinese appeared to me to be aware of the direction to take in order to change man, take socialism seriously. But why, as in the case of Letelier, is

Kevin P. Phillips Says

The 'Threat' Of Democracy?

WASHINGTON - What columnist hasn't received some of those letters with slogans like "This country is a republic, not a democracy -- and let's keep it that way"? Their implicit message: the more layers of government between "the people" and policymaking, the better.

Ultra-conservatives nervous about the seething liberal masses have historically given such slogans their currency. But these days, a curious pause and even shift is apparent. Conservatives are beginning to rethink "the people" - and so are liberals.

The other day, Washington Post columnist David Broder lamented the 'Me Generation" politics whereby many Americans are trying to brush away the intermediaries of representative government and take control back into their own hands via devices like the initiative and the referendum. Pundit Broder, who would apparently prefer to have the country accept the wisdom of established power structures, deplores the departure from the underlying premises of the republic and laments that "from Florida to California, the initiative and referendum have become the playthings of the New Right ... and anyone who is watching how these devices are used has to be worried about the results.'

Note the considerable irony here. For all practical purposes, the "This is a republic, not a democracy - and let's keep it that way" slogan is being quietly borrowed from the John Birch Society and the Liberty Lobby by the centrist Establishment opinionmolders. Democracy is no longer perceived as a promise on the left but as a threat on the right.

In mechanical terms, meanwhile, much more is involved than just initiatives and referenda. Other increasingly relied-upon popular devices also belong on the list...party primaries (in lieu of party leadership-dominated conventione) conventions), recall elections, recall petitions and growing public pressure on state legislatures to pass resolutions calling for a U.S. constitutional convention (to consider possible amendments on topics like abortion, a balanced budget and busing). Election law watchers are likewise charting pressure in more and more states -Illinois and Florida, for example - to strike down restrictive laws aimed at blocking independent candidacies or the qualification of new political parties.

Among all these, three mechanisms have become the most dramatic. First, there's the state initiative or

referendum, getting such heavy recent use by conservatives out to push tax limitations, repeal gay rights or-dinances or block suburban low-income housing experiments. Secondly, one can point to the rising chorus of demands for a U.S. constitutional convention. The citizenry has discovered that when easily-pressured legislatures begin calling for a con-vention, nervous Washington legislators at least begin to discuss (if not resolve) the issue in question. Thirdly, there's the recall. Whether the objectionable action be judicial, executive or legislative, local (as with the mayor of Cleveland) or national (as with the Panama Canal treaties), voters are no longer sitting back and accepting public officials who flaunt public opinion. In some states, the tide is becoming a flood. A recent Detroit Free Press analysis says "no one is quite sure why, but recall movements against local politicians are sprouting like mushrooms in the rain.

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My own view is that although this populist mobilization does create some obvious dangers of excess, attempts to condemn it as a "Me Generation" indulgence of selfishness, parochialism and egocentricity are misplaced. Mechanisms like the direct primary, the referendum and the recall have their roots in a very different set of circumstances harkening back to the turn of the century. From the Midwest to California, early 20th century leadership and policymaking was in the grip of party machines and institutional elites that were beyond the reach of politics as usual. Populist electoral mechanisms made the people's voice heard again.

The situation is not all that different today. Far from being a "Me Generation" self-indulgence, the trends now underway could signal a revitalization of grassroots involvement which, however unpopular among Washington elites, could in turn be the key to a larger revitalization of American politics.

This writer has never been enamored with politics.

As far as we're concerned, politics are closely akin to scratching an itch - that is, just a necessary evil. Recent national political developments have not changed this view.

Our understanding of politics is about as extensive as Pepe Zambrano of Rockport, Texas, a politician of obvious Spanish-American persuasion who recently was defeated for public office. His reputedly-hot Latin temperament notwithstanding, Pepe took his defeat rather philosophically, we think.

You see, dear reader, Pepe was defeated by a dead man and defeated by a 3-1 margin, we might add.

In commenting upon what must have been a moderatley disgusting turn of event, Pepe uttered a statement to live by, we think, when he said. "It's hard campaigning against a dead man. What can you say except that he's dead and can't work. If he'd been alive, I'm sure I would have beaten him."

Pepe's political genius surfaced late in the campaign when, in a dazzling vision, he sensed victory when his opponent in the two-man race died. The death was untimely in that it came too late for the dead man's name to be stricken from Rockport. Texas, ballot. Pepe's spirits remained high because, after all, everyone knew the man was dead.

The wife of the deceased - a staunch soul if there ever was one - determined that she would keep the faith however. So, she took ads asking the public to elect her dead husband in order for the Democratic executive committee to choose another nominee later.

So, old Pepe bit the dust by a 3-1 margin at the hands of the family of the deceased.

Pepe said he did not believe the Democratic committee would choose him as the nominee because of the margin of his loss.

All the political wisdom we can squeeze from Pepe's dilemma is never trust a dead politician especially if your name is Pepe.

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: When I pray it always seems as though no one is listening. Can you please advise me what to do? - C.P.

DEAR C.P.: I wonder if you have ever analyzed exactly why you feel this way. Is it because you think you should have some special feeling when you pray, the feeling that God is present? Is it because you think you never have your prayers answered? Whatever the reason, you should examine it in the light of the Bible to see where you are wrong.

Let me suggest several things about prayer. The Bible tells us first of all that God has promised only to hear the prayers of those who are His children. From your letter I wonder if you have ever really given your heart to Christ by faith. When we come to Christ, we have a personal relationship with God Himself, and because of that we can pray with confidence. If you have never clearly yielded your life to Christ, I urge you to do that right now.

Also, true prayer demands a certain level of faith on our part. The Bible says, "And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him" (Hebrews 11:6, New International Version). You may feel like the father who brought his son to Jesus: "Lord, I believe; help thou mine unbelief" (Mark 9:24). But God will still hear you; He has promised to hear you.

You also should examine carefully the things for which you have been praying. Many people think prayer is a gimmick whereby we ask God for anything that we selfishly want. But that is not so. We are told above all to seek the will of God. Ask yourself if your prayers have been concerned for God's glory or just for yourself. Then seek always to have the Lord's will be done as you pray. That will mean, incidentally, that God will sometimes answer our prayers in the negative, because we have not prayed in accordance with His will, "And this is the confidence that we have in him, if we ask any thing according to his will, he will heareth us" (I John 5:14).

to ban certain children's advertising on TV, the Federal Trade Commission has charged off on a new crusade. The venture raises an old question: In terms of the role of government in a free society, how in the world did we get this way?

The FTC's notice, dated April 27, calls for hearings in November and December on a series of proposals having to do with banning or restricting tv commercials aimed at children up to the age of 11 or 12. Generally speaking, these are commercials for sugared products. The theory is that these products cause tooth decay: tooth decay is bad; therefore the advertising should be prohibited or strictly regulated.



The commission's staff takes what might be termed a dim view of the suspect commercials. Such advertising, it is charged, is deceptive, disturbing, false, harmful, immoral, injurious, misleading, offensive, oppressive, unconscionable, unethical, unfair and unscrupulous. It aims at the child who is defenseless, gullible, naive and trusting. On the average, says the staff, a child 2 to 11 years old watches 3 hours and 40 minutes of television every day; the child is bombarded by 20,000 commercials a year.

Thus mesmerized, children become fat little monsters. Denied their morning Gooey-Wooey bar, they throw temper tantrums. They hold their breath, pop their eyes and turn purple; they scream bloody murder. They nag their mamas to the edge of insanity. Parents are too shiftless, spineless or dumb to resist. The children gorge themselves on sugar; their teeth fall out. Obesity, apoplexy, bankruptcy, heart disease and premature death follow in the order named.

Do I exaggerate? Not by much. The commission's order of April 27 is based upon a 350-page staff report that appeared in February. The report quotes with approval from various authorities who hold that the sugar-product commercials take a toll on the parentchild relationship. The exploitation of children encourages confrontation and alienation on the part of children toward their parents. Conflicts are exacerbated when the child can't have his way.

The staff report anticipates an ob-e jection: "One might ask why parents" do not shield their children from these and similar themes presented in televised food advertising." A good question. The answer is that parents suffer from "profound feelings of helplessness." Parents are unwilling to intervene for fear "that if they deny their children so pervasive a childhood experience as children's programming, the children will become 'social outcasts or social isolates.' '

We learn from the staff report that tooth decay results from "betweenmeal snacking on candies, pastries and other foods that stick to the teeth." Notwithstanding the special hazards of snacking on such sugared foods. "much of the advertising in question specifically promotes stickiness, chewiness, and the length of time that a candy lasts in the mouth."

Very well. Back to my rhetorical question. How in the world did we get uns way ! How did the power vested in Congress to regulate commerce among the states get twisted into a power to control our diets? Something has gone woefully awry, or so it seems to me, when the whole might and majesty of the federal government is marshaled to smash the insidious cupcake.

In my own old-fashioned view, it simply is no business of the federal government if children nag their parents, or parents capitulate to their howling brats. The federal authority has no writ to cure every imperfection in society. Some obligations ought to be left to individuals, for good or ill, if personal responsibility is not to be fatally undermined.

The FTC's proceeding is far more destructive than the evil it seeks to prevent. Once government becomes the one great nanny of us all protecting us, guiding us, loving us, scolding us, holding our hands and wiping our runny noses - once we surrender to the idiot notion that Big Brother knows best, we have abandoned the basis of a free society. The fabric rots. Yes, we ought to be concerned about tooth decay, but tooth decay is not the decay that matters most

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My family doctor told me I have hypothyroidism and Graves' disease. I had a series of tests and X-rays. He did not go into much detail in explaining this and I am a little confused. He did say it was something that could be controlled with medication. I am taking 50 milligrams of propylthiouracil three times a day. I had some hair loss on four pills a day. Will I always have to take this? -- Mrs. C.W.S. I am sure you meant to say you have "hyper-thyroidism," which is overactivity of the thyroid gland. In Graves' disease the gland overproduces hormones that control body function. Hyperthyroidism is the opposite of hypothyroidism. Symptoms include nervousness, fast pulse, weight loss, and tremor. There may be bulging of eyeballs and a noticeable enlargement of the gland (which is in front of the neck). These latter symptoms may not be present, however.

In any event, it is relatively easy to detect and, as your doctor told you, can be controlled with medicine. The drug you mention suppresses the gland's hormone production, but if a patient is sensitive to it reactions can occur, such as hair loss. Dosages are then adjusted.

At this point no one can say how long you will have to take the medicine. It is not always necessary to take it for life. In fact, it is important to return for frequent examinations to determine its effectiveness so that it can be discontinued at the appropriate time. 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





Some Insurance **Agents Prey On Elderly Women**

WASHINGTON (AP) -Agents from one insurance company sold a 76-year-old woman 13 different life and health policies in a two-year period, a Senate committee was told Tuesday by the woman's son.

The premiums on the policies totalled more than \$9,000 a year -68 percent of her income, the woman's son said. The problem was uncovered only when his mother mentioned she was having financial trouble and had to defer some purchases, he said.

"I have loved too much or lived too long or trusted too much," Robert Lowry quoted his mother as saying.


The case history of Lucille Lowry, a resident of Otterbein Home in Lebanon, Ohio, was one of several such cases cited as the Senate Special Committee on Aging opened hearings on private health insurance supplements to Medicare health coverage.

Sen. Lawton Chiles, D-Fla., cited a case, now being investigated by Wisconsin authorities, in which an 87-year-old woman was sold 19 separate policies from nine different companies in just over a year. Her yearly payments on the policies totalled nearly \$4,000 a year.

And Sen. John Glenn, D-Ohio, said he had received a letter from a 79-year-old farmer who told him that a "fast talker" who "came to help us process our papers told us that Medicare was in bad shape and that it would run out in 1979." The farmer agreed to purchase a supplemental policy costing him more than \$700 a year. Having second thoughts, he wrote Glenn to find out if the salesman was telling the truth about Medicare.

"This has got to be a real flim-flam – a real fraud situation," said Glenn. He added that he was referring only to a few unscrupulous agents and was not castigating the entire insurance industry.

Lowry, who lives in Raleigh, N.C., told the committee that agents of Bankers Life and Casualty Co., an Illinois corporation, actually sold his mother 17 policies including two life annuity



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policies for him and his brother. The company cancelled four of the policies on its own volition after noting that they duplicated existing coverage already contracted for by his mother.

It cancelled the two life annuity policies, Lowry said, after he called to the company's attention the fact that his signature and that of his brother had been forged on the documents.

Although it originally refused to cancel any other policies, the company eventually cancelled all of them when Glenn and Sen. Adlai Stevenson, D-III., became involved, he said. Lowry said he objected to the company's decision to unilaterally cancel all policies since "there had been no intention on our part to leave my mother without any insurance."

All of Mrs. Lowry's money since has been returned to her.

Officials of Bankers Life acknowledged the problem and said it occurred because the agents violated company rules.



Suit Dismissal **May Clear Way For** Storm Warn System

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) - Work to complete the Kentucky Emergency Warning System may now get under way following the dismissal of a suit in Franklin Circuit Court.

Circuit Judge Henry Meigs dismissed the action Monday brought by Motorola, Inc., an unsuccesful bidder for electronic work on the statewide communication system.

J. Paul Warnecke. coordinator of the system. said a meeting has been scheduled next week with representatives of the three firms who were awarded \$10.1 million in contracts.

"Completion of the system had been aboslutely stopped, as far as electronics was concerned, for a period of seven months," Warnecke said in an interview Tuesday. "We can now proceed.

Warnecke said he hopes the three firms - Farinon Electric and GET Lenkurt, Inc., both of San Carlos. Calif., and General Electric, Corp. of Lynchburg, Va. can coordinate their activities and get back to work as soon as possible.

However, he said the delay has made it almost impossible to project a completion date for the new system, which will provide a versatile and weatherproof communications system that can reach any part of the state during an emergency or disaster.

"I will be in a much better position in the next week to 10 days to give a commitment date.' Warnecke said. "But we are talking about the last half of 1979 at this point."

Warnecke said that because of the delay as a result of the suit, "We have lost our place in line, so to speak, with their other contracts."

He said that no equipment has been in-stalled or manufact turered to his knowledge and even design work was haulted by the legal ac-

Motorola charged in its suit that the state had shown favoritism in awarding the contracts at "substantial variance rom the specification

Meigs, in dismissing the suit, said the state had substantially complied with bidding laws and

An attorney for Motorola said he did not know if the ruling would be appealed, which would cause further delays in completion of the system.

Construction work has proceeded on transmission and relay towers, equipment shelters and other facilities not directly affected by the suit.

Warnecke said that work also was delayed by the severe winter weather, but added that six crews are working simultaneously and are expected to make up the lost time and complete the construction by the end of November.

When plea bargaining was outlawed in Alaska three years ago. doomsayers predicted chaos and crowded courtrooms. Instead. cases are being tried more quickly and judges are passing stiffer sentences, says a study.

State Attorney General Avrum Gross, who ordered the ban during the crime increase that occurred during the trans-Alaska pipeline construction boom, said he did not "know whether it would work in California or New York but it worked here.

Plea bargaining involves trading concessions such as reduced or suspended sentences for guilty pleas or help in furthering criminal investigations. Its proponents say courts would be overwhelmed if all criminal cases had to go to trial.

The results of the study of the ban were "directly contrary to ex-pectations," said Mike Rubinstein, who heads the Alaska Judicial Council.

HEARTLINE: I have just turned 65 years old. I draw Social Security benefits and I am now on Medicare. I live on the northern border of New York very close to Canada. Many times I have been treated in Canadian hospitals because it is closer to where I live. When filing out my Medicare claim forms, do I use the standard form, or is there a special claim form for out-ofthe-country charges? -- K.T.

There is a special form. You may obtain it at your Social Security office. However, Medicare is good in Canada only if you are en route to or from Alaska (direct reoute), or if you live in the United States in an area on the border of Canada or Mexico at a location where a Canadian or Mexican hopsital is closer than an American hospital, or if an emergency occurs while you are in the U.S. and a Canadian or Mexican hospital is closer than a U.S. hospital.

HEARTLINE: I have heard that there are certain conditions in which improvement to a home can be taxdeductible. Can you tell me under what circumstances this can be done? - C.F.

Usually, improvements to your home are not tax deductible. However, under certain circumstances where your improvements are a medical necessity, then a portion (in some cases all of it) of your expense is tax-deductible. For example: a swimming pool to provide treatment for a polio victim, a chair seat for a heart patient, central air-conditioning for someone with emphysema

The amount of this expense that is deductible depends on how much money was spent on the improvement and how much the property value of the home increased due to this improvement. For example, if an elevator cost \$7,500 and the property value is increased by \$2,500, the \$5,000 excess is deductible. If there is no increase in property value, it's all deductible.

A person will need two documents to support this claim. First, a letter from a physician stating that it is a medical necessity, and second, a written opinion from a competent real estate appraiser stating the amount (if any) the improvement adds to the property value.

HEARTLINE: I am 64 years old and I am drawing my Social Security benefits. My wife and I are planning to move to a state in a warm climate. Will this affect our Social Security benefits? -- K.F.

No, but you should always report a change of address to your Social Security office in advance of moving. Notifying your post office is, of course, necessary as well, but you must also notify your Social Security office. The post office can forward a Social Security check but only Social Security can actually change the address on your check.

Harris Says Wet Spring Will Cut **Corn Production, Hike Soybean Crop**

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) - The number of acres planted in soybeans should increase as a result of the cold, wet spring, but there will be a corresponding decrease in the corn crop, state Agriculture Commissioner Thomas Harris has said.

"If the weather stays this way, more farmers will shift every day," Harris said in a telephone interview Tuesday.

Only a third of the state's corn crop has been planted so far, about half what is normally in the ground by mid-May, Harris said.

He advised farmers who haven't yet bought their seeds to get early maturing varieties, and said many would probably think about planting beans instead.

The number of acres planted in corn has increased slightly in recent years, but Harris said he expects it to decrease this year by close to 12 percent.

By contrast, the number of acres planted in soybeans, which has also shown a steady increase in the last few years, should increase more sharply if the weather continues cold and damp for several more days, Harris said.

One exception to the projected decrease in the number of acres planted in corn should be in white corn, for which there's a good export market. Harris said it should increase by 10 percent to about 130,000 acres.

Harris said the damp, cloudy spring has affected ali Kentucky crops.

"We're getting way behind," he said. Farmers have been forced to turn to supplemental feeding for cattle and some have turned their herds out to graze on what would have been hay fields.

"We haven't had the sunshine to make hay," Harris said, "and we're using up what we've got. Let's hope we don't have a bad winter.

Unfortunately, the moisture has been a boon to alfalfa weevils, he said, who are "chewing on it pretty good" Spraying the alfalfa is ineffective because rains wash away the chemical coating, Harris said.

Most of the alfalfa in Kentucky is ready to cut, but farmers are putting it off because the wet weather hampers curing, he said.

Tobacco plants aren't nearly as far along as usual, Harris said.

"They're about the size of a quarter," he said. "Blue mold is showing up in some plant beds, causing problems now. Sometimes it will kill the plants, and cut down on the number available for planting.

However, he said he didn't think damage to the Kentucky burley would be lasting.

"As a whole, if we could get the weather to change, we could get the cron out." he said

In fact, Kentucky burley farmers may be more fortunate than their Southern neighbors, whose planting seasons is normally earlier than in Kentucky and who have been dealt a a severe setback by the cold weather.

The advent of warm, sunny weather will pose another problem, Harris said. Farmers are behind in harvesting hay, and they're late planting corn and setting out tobacco plants. "It will be physically impossible for them to do everything," he said. "Someting's going to be missing.

"It's all we need on top of a tough winter.

SS Bite Could Be Lighter

WASHINGTON (AP) -Workers could find the government withholding less from their paychecks next year than they had expected if a partial rollback of higher Social Security taxes, narrowly cleared by a House committee, wins congressional approval.

But the rollback, approved by the House Ways and Means Committee Thursday, faces powerful opposition in the Senate, including that of Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., chairman of the Senate Finance Committee

President Carter also supports the higher taxes, which became law last December.

If the rollback survives the long legislative road still ahead of it, many higher-paid workers would find their paychecks \$123 fatter for the full 1979 calendar year than they would be under the law Carter signed in December.

The committee voted 19-18 to use an estimated \$14.5 billion in general income tax funds over the next two years to ease the size of the payroll tax in-

For 1979, the proposal would even mean a reduction from this year's payroll taxes for low-and middleincome employees and their employers.

But the greatest benefit would go to higher-paid workers, some of whom have complained to their congressmen about the increases they face.

Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., who cast the tie-breaking vote as House Ways and Means Committee chairman. told reporters he thinks the proposal will pass the House, where the Democratic Caucus has endorsed the idea of general revenue financing. But Ullman predicted it would have rough going in the Senate.

If the committee proposal is enacted. the Social Security tax rate next year will be 5.85 percent instead of 6.13 percent, with a maximum wage base of \$21,900 instead of the currently scheduled \$22,900. In 1980, the rate would stay the same with a base of \$23,900 instead of the planned \$25,900.

The maximum anyone would pay in 1979 would be \$1.281 under the committee plan, instead of \$1,404 In 1980

immediately after the incident that he tried to stop Augusta's car, which he said was weaving and had no taillights. Maggard said he followed Augusta home, where Augusta left his car and began firing at him.

The hearing is scheduled before Circuit Judge Charles Cornett.







Former state budget director Joe Elam was named to head the new office. Regional offices in Covington, London, Louisville, Madisonville and Prestonsburg will be headed by Regional Directors who will report directly to Elam. Carroll said the primary functions of the
