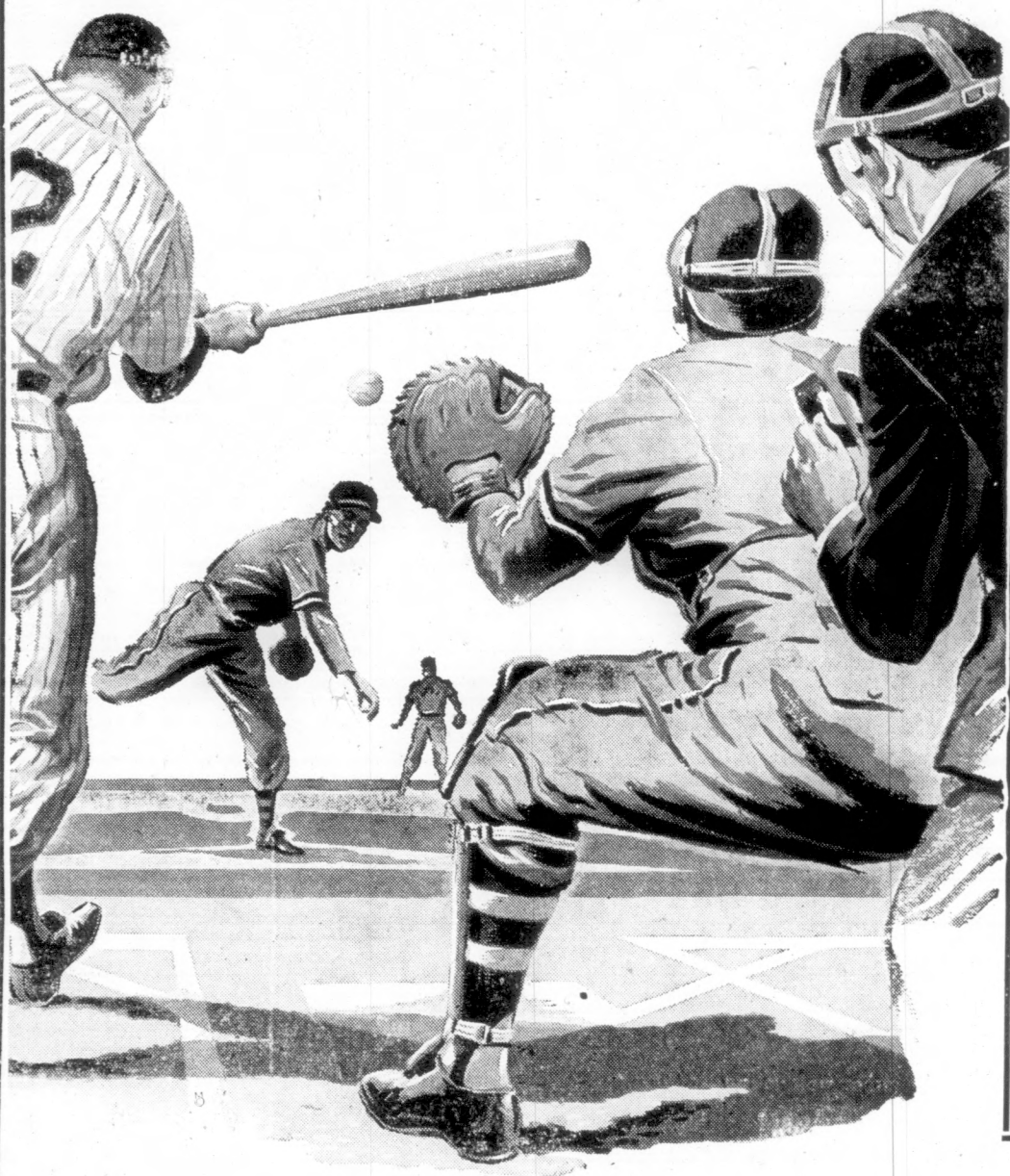

River Development Discussed at Meeting

The development of the East Fork Clark's River Watershed is going to be "a local program with federal help, not a federal program with local help," according to an official of the state department of water usage and flood control.

C. D. Luttrell, speaking here to 28 conservation leaders from four Kentucky counties and one in Tennessee, outlined the things that persons within the watershed "can do" and things they "must do" to successfully complete the five-year project.

Hearing the verbal picture were representatives from Calloway, Graves, Marshall and Meade counties in Kentucky and Henry County, Tennessee.

The Conservancy District Board on East Fork has certain definite administrative problems," Luttrell said. He pointed these:

Identify all farms in the watershed; obtain operating capital to conduct the local watershed program; arrange for necessary legal and clerical personnel and activate community leadership.

Physical problems within the watershed that need to be solved are:

Timber Occupies 3 Of Land in Marshall

About 35 percent of Marshall County's 217,000 acres is commercial forest land, according to a forest inventory just reported by TVA Forest area of the county is set at 74,800 acres. Estimated sawtimber volume of this forest land is 171.2 million board feet.

R. D. Nelson, TVA forestry representative at Paris, Tenn., said the field survey was completed last August. The Marshall survey, he said, is part of a larger survey that will eventually include 125 Tennessee Valley counties.

The survey shows that Marshall County forests are practically all hardwood. Of the total sawtimber volume, 170.4 million board feet is hardwoods and only 800,000 board feet softwoods. The principal softwood species is loblolly pine, which accounts for about one percent of the total growing stock volume.

Mildred Kingcade Attends Chicago Psychiatric Event

Miss Mildred Kingcade participated in a meeting of the American Psychiatric Association June 12 through June 17 at Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago.

Early in 1957, the National Institute of Mental Health gave a grant to the American Psychiatric Association for a study on the "Use of Volunteers in Rehabilitation of the Discharged Psychiatric Patient."

Psychiatrists, psychologists, nurses, social workers and community leaders throughout the United States were appointed to serve. Miss Kingcade was the representative from Kentucky.

This was the last meeting of the project and findings with recommendations will be published in a book early next year.

During the past year, Miss Kingcade has had several papers published. A paper, "Mental Health Nursing" was published in the 1957 "Yearbook of Nursing." Others were "Community Responsibility for Rehabilitation" in the National Health Forum, a publication of the National Health Council; "The Follow-up of Patients by Public Health Nurses" in the July 1957 issue of the U. S. Public Health Reports.

Smith, Kline and French, the drug firm, published a booklet which included a report given by her at a meeting in Philadelphia last spring. A national magazine, Nursing Outlook, has accepted an article and it will be published in the "Service of Mental Illness for Public Health Nurses."

William Heath attended grade school at Birmingham and St. Mary's High School in Paducah and then went into the business world.

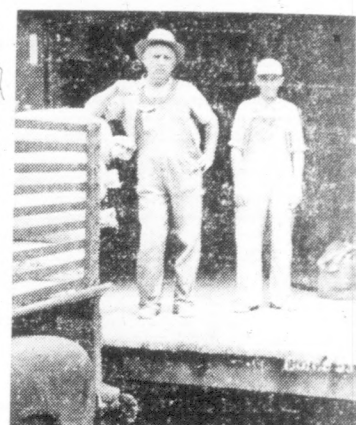

Rx for Health

Prevention — and Treatment — of Sunburn

Probably the most common summertime ailment is sunburn. And its causes are so little understood that many thousands of people actually harm themselves in their innocent pursuit of a beautiful tan. The advice, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," applies more to sunburn than to most illnesses. For sunburn can be prevented if one understands what causes it and practices certain common sense rules.

Sunlight is composed of three main components: visible light, ultraviolet and infrared light. Waves producing sunburn lie within the ultraviolet region. Contrary to the opinion of many, fog and clouds are poor protection against ultraviolet rays, so that you may get a severe burn on an overcast or even cool day. People at beaches run extra hazards of sunburn, even though they may lie under umbrellas part of the time. Water and sand reflect the burning rays, and moisture in the air softens the skin and makes it more vulnerable to ultraviolet rays. Cooling breezes off the water fool many people into thinking they are not being burned.

Always keep in mind that the time of day has a lot to do with whether or not you will be burned. The sun's rays produce the most severe burns between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., when the ultraviolet rays are most numerous.

Sunburn, commonly classified as first or second degree burn, may vary from a mildly uncomfortable redness to a painful skin eruption of blisters, and in the more severe cases fever, chills, pain and swelling. The redness comes from dilation of minute blood vessels in the skin. Later, the peeling and itching are the first sign of recovery from the burn. Repeated exposure to the sun exhausts the skin's ability to replace pigmentation and thickens the skin, a protective measure, and may ultimately lead to persistent peeling, shrinkage of the skin, areas of discoloration, freckles and, in severe instances, various kinds of growths and



even skin cancer.

It is good advice to start your exposure to the sun gradually, about 20 minutes on the first day, less for children, since they can stand only about half as much ultraviolet light as adults. Most medical authorities advise some kind of protective preparation on the skin until it is tanned. Oils are effective, as are unguents and salves containing calamine, titanium oxide or zinc oxide. These have the effect of impeding the passage of ultraviolet rays. Mild sunburn can be relieved with a wide variety of soothing, analgesic unguents and oils, which are easily available. However, if you should experience severe sunburn, see your physician right away, for prompt medical attention may help prevent serious complications.

The best advice, though, is to be very cautious exposing yourself to the sun and avoid a burn. For while Old Sol furnishes us with the light and heat, he can also cause a lot of aches and pains.

Land Appraisal To Start Soon

Nashville—Appraisers are expected to start work in the Edwille-Kuttawa, Ky., area July 1 to clear the way for the proposed Barkley Dam on the Cumberland River.

Col. Eugene Stann, Army district engineer, said the first purchases will be made no later than September 1. He also explained that owners of any land acquired for the project can retain possession for the following crop season.

Tentative plans call for closing the dam in 1962, when it will impound water to a level of 330 feet or more. Appraisals of land on the river's left bank will begin in January, 1959.
