## Bids Asked On Resurfacing Of Griggs Road

The State Highway Department has asked for bids July 25 on one Marshall County road project.

Bids were asked on re-surfacing of the Griggs School-Community Chapel Road from Ky 782 near the school westward to Seals Sharp road, a distance of 1,077 miles. The road will be graded, drained, and given a traffic bound surface.

A Lyon County project of interest in Marshall County is the Eddyville-Birmingham Road (Ky. 58) from Ky. 433 to the edge of the TVA reservoir, a distance of 2,952 miles. Bids will be asked on a new bituminous surface for this road.

The Highway Department asked for bids on 97 projects throughout the state, involving 539 miles of road work. It is the largest number of projects in the history of the highway department.

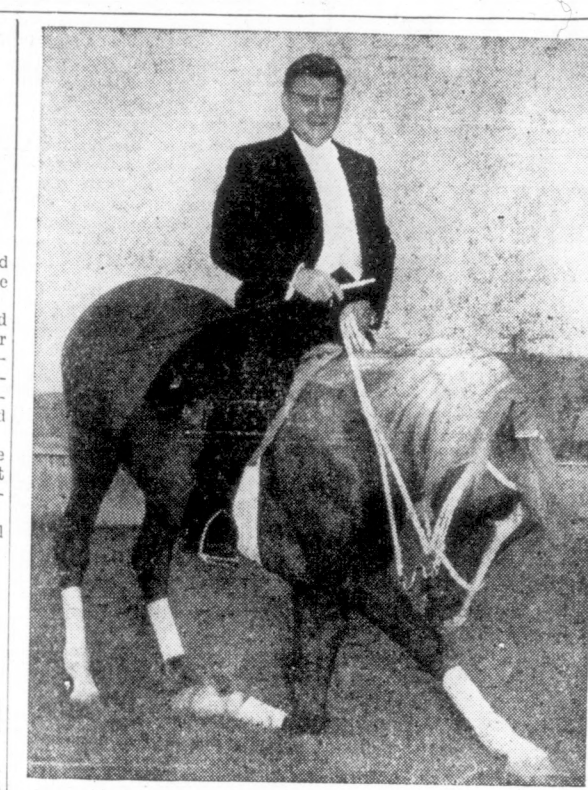

## Planning Group to Start Study Soon Of Clark's River

A watershed planning party for the East Fork watershed will begin a study of the East Fork of Clark's River on July 13. This information was given to members of the East Fork Conservancy District at a meeting held Tuesday night in Benton. At this time, the planning group will reveal its various conservation ideas for the watershed.

Also, at this time, directors and supervisors of the watershed district must voice their approval or disapproval of the watershed plans.

Nine of the watershed's 14 directors were present at Tuesday night's meeting at Benton. On a motion made by W. W. Symon, well and seconded by Rex Henson, the directors voted to raise funds for preliminary expenses to co-operate with the planning group.

A tax, not to exceed 5 mills per \$100 assessed land valuation, will be necessary through-out the watershed to maintain the flood-control system after it has been completed. This tax will be on land only involved in the watershed.

The East Fork watershed includes Marshall, Graves, Callaway and McCracken counties in Kentucky and Henry County, Tennessee. About 190,000 acres are involved in the watershed and 56,000 of those acres, or 29 percent, are subject to flood waters. One out of every four crops on these flood plains are destroyed by excessive water and damage runs as high as \$205,000 a year.

Mr. Terry explained at the meeting that people in the watershed will be required to provide all easements and rights of way, and maintain the system after it is completed.

The government will pay 100 percent of the cost of all major installations and 80 percent of the cost of installations under \$2,000 each.

Total cost of the East Fork project has been estimated at between five and six million dollars.

Mr. Terry also pointed out that actually the watershed is a local project and that local citizens must show a great deal of enthusiasm and aggressiveness if the project is completed.

Other speakers at Monday night's meeting included Wayne Williams, SCS field representative, and Warren Holt, SCS work unit conservationist of Graves County. About 40 persons from the five-county watershed attended the meeting. Floyd Roberts of Benton presided as chairman of the meeting.
