In its 60-year history, the has accredited less than 180 major universities across the country.

In Kentucky and Tennessee, only the University of Kentucky at Lexington and the University of Tennessee at Knoxville have been so honored by the Assembly, Dr. Lindauer pointed out, adding that Murray State is the only Kentucky regional university to receive this recognition for its undergraduate business programs.

The accreditation action was recommended after a visitation team came to the Murray campus in February of this year to inspect the academic programs and facilities.

Members of the visitation team were: Dr. Jack Turner, dean of the College of Business and Economics, University of West Virginia; Dr. John Alexion, dean of the College of Business Administration, St. Johns University, New York; and Charles Plum, vicepresident and controller of Standard Oil of Ohio, Cleveland.

The final phase of the Murray accreditation effort was directed by a University committee jointly headed by William Freeman and Dr. Robert Warren. Freeman, a professor of

# Final Exams Begin Monday At University

Final examinations for spring semester day classes at Murray State University will begin on Monday, May

Dr. William G. Read, vice-president for academic programs, said those examinations will begin at 8 a.m. on that date and continue through Friday, May 7. Examinations were given to Satureday classes April 24 and to evening classes at the regular meeting

The examination schedule on the campus leads up to the 53rd annual spring commencement exercise at 10 a.m. on Saturday, May 8, in the university fieldhouse. James Chandler Bowling, a Paducah native who is now an executive with one of the world's largest cigarette companies, will deliver the graduate address.

A total of 864 students have filed for degrees in the ceremonies this spring. The exact number of graduates will be determined when university officials have checked the candidates to certify. that requirements have been met.

Both mid-year and spring term graduates will participate in the cap and gown ceremony since no formal graduation exercise is held at the conclusion of the fall semester.

A spring intersession is scheduled on the campus May 10-26. Students may earn three semester hours of credit by enrolling in the short session that spans the gap between the spring semester and summer school. Students who are not pre-registered should meet the class May 10 and then report to the Records Office in Sparks Hall to register between 1 and 4 p.m. on that

Summer term registration for students not pre-registered will be on Monday, June 14-with classes to begin the following day. Summer commencement exercises will be held at 2 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 6, in Lovett Auditorium.

After two days of conferring with supporters who pleaded with him to enter the last round of primaries before the party's July convention, Humphrey tearfully announced Thursday that a fourth run for the presidency was just not in the cards.

"The one thing I don't need at this stage in my life is to be ridiculous," the Minnesota senator said, obviously agreeing with those who were advising him that a fourth unsuccessful try for the White House would classify him as a perpetual candidate.

But many long-time Humphrey supporters had urged him to actively enter the race, seeing him as the only way to stop the campaign of former Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter, who trounced all other rivals in the Pennsylvania primary on Tuesday.

Carter said he had "mixed emotions" about Humphrey's decision, that having Humphrey in the race would have made for a clearer choice for the convention delegates and the primary

Two other Democratic candidates, Rep. Morris Udall of Arizona and Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington, said Humphrey's decision would help their

Humphrey's backers urged him to enter the June 8 New Jersey primary, the last state balloting before the Democratic convention. At a minimum, they pleaded with him to approve formation of a campaign committee

### Safety Equipment Approved For RR Crossing Locally

FRANKFORT, Ky. - State Transportation Secretary John C. Roberts has announced approval for installation of new safety equipment at a Calloway County railroad crossing.

The new equipment-consisting of automatic flashing lights and warning bell-will be installed at the Louisville and Nashville Railroad crossing on Industrial Road at Murray.

According to Roberts, the work will be done by the railroads which will be reimbursed for the project costs. Roberts estimated that the total cost will run about \$21,660. Reimbursement funds will come 90 per cent from available federal highway money with the railroad paying the remaining 10 that could line up delegate support and solicit funds.

# Louisville Ready To Go 'Ga-Ga' Over Derby "It's the flavor of the Old South," said

LOUISVILLE (AP) - One West Coast pundit checked into this citadel of the blue grass horse country, took a deep breath and called it "Loo-vil, the bar rag of the nation."

"You don't have to buy a drink here," he said. "Inhale once, and you're

At Churchill Downs, Stevens Concessionaires announced that 250,000 pounds of ice and 170 bushels of mint were being stocked for Saturday's 102nd running of the Kentucky Derby.

We expect to sell 80,000 mint juleps," Joby Stevens said. "We also are stocking beer in 24-ounce cans and will have vendors selling soft drinks in the stands and infield."

Once a year, the first Saturday in May, this robust riverfront metropolis unbuckles the stays on its corset, lets down its hair and goes pleasantly ga-ga over a two-minute horse race.

It is not just a horse race. It is a spectacle. It is one of the four or five transcendent sports events of the year, ranking in national interest with baseball's World Series, football's Super Bowl, Masters golf and the 500mile Indianapolis Speedway race.

The same horses run on other tracks-in the Preakness at Baltimore and in the Belmont Stakes in New York. But it isn't the same. The other races are run for the horse buffs. The Derby is run for the populace—the uninitiated as well as the initiated.

Throughout Derby Week, while the cream of the country's three-year-old thoroughbreds were assembling at the Downs' backstretch and Louisville itself was working itself into a strange sort of high, secretaries from coast to coast were drawing names from office pools and men at the corner saloon were arguing the respective speeds of Honest Pleasure and Bold Forbes.

These are relatively obscure names to the average household—as also are such names as Elocutionist, Cojak and Play The Red. It's the Derby that makes celebrities of them all.

What is the distinction of the Derby? Certainly not the city, a pleasant, hospitable river town that comes alive once every spring. Not the site-the ancient, sprawling complex with its historic twin spires, a sharp contrast to the multi-million-dollar super structures that are now rising in every major league city.

It couldn't be the lure of the mint the Duke and Duchess of Windsor and

'Phew!" said one visitor, spitting out his first taste of the famous drink which consists largely of chipped ice, sugar syrup and a dash of bourbon. "Too damn sweet."

Bar tenders here don't even sell it except at Derby time. It costs \$2 to \$3, and you get to keep the glass.

It's the century-old tradition plus the pageantry and the nostalgia of the pre-Civil War days when sportsmen gathered on a plain with their best horseflesh and wagered homesteads on the speed of the animals' hooves.

Celebrities flock in in droves-stars of television and movies, business tycoons, sports idols and government bigwigs. England's Princess Margaret attended the Centennial Derby two years ago. Before her, visitors included

Ali Khan. Presidents of the United States occasionally drop in. The last was Richard Nixon in 1967.

John Wayne, who is familiar with horses as America's No. 1 cowboy, served as marshal of the Pegasus Parade Thursday. Peter Graves, Carl Reiner, Jo An Phlug, Gail Fisher and others donned shorts and competed in the Celebrity Tennis Classic. There was the usual steamboat race on the Ohio

"The celebrities are not brought in as guests of Churchill Downs," a Downs spokesman said. "They are invited by people who have tickets."

Attendance Saturday is expected to be around 140,000. There have been as many as 165,000. The most expensive reserved seats cost \$115. An infield ticket costs \$10. The infield traditionally is carpeted with human

bodies, stocked with blankets, beer and

Maybe 40,000 will get a glimpse of the horse race. The other 100,000 won't try or won't care. Some ladies come just to sip mint juleps and show off their coiffeurs and silly hats.

As at other major events, hotels jack up room prices. One of the better hotels asks \$285 for one double room for three days. Entertainers, like old horsemen, emerge from the shadows of the past and seek another quick moment in the

Sally Rand is doing her bubble dance at a spot a few blocks from the race track. If you're 60 and over, you'll remember Sally. She was teasing audiences 40 years ago. She was popular when War Admiral won in 1937.

Even then everybody got a lump in the throat when the band struck up the strains of "My Old Kentucky Home."

# Ravages Of Time

Two hundred years is young for a country and for the Church it is just a drop in the bucket of time. This two hundred years however, has been a significant period for God's Church. It played an undeniable roll in the carving of a civilization out of a wilderness. The Church laid the foundation in this land for its educational system, its hospitals, relief and welfare programs, and on and on the list could go. But suffice it to say that the Church was there not only with its spiritual services but offering aid and leadership to the many needs of a developing society and country.

It is not surprising then, that problems began to develop within the Church as it inter-mingled so freely with society's needs and secular man. The first apparent effect on the Church was that its message ceased to be the a large degree a social gospel. It is true that the Church must be concerned about the total person, but the concern must remain total. The Church must not let the social aspects of man's needs and nature exclude his spiritual nature.

But alas, time comes and goes, ideas and priorities evolve, the man in the street is the man in the pew and basically he is the same man. So the Church has felt in very serious ways the encroachment of secular ideology and influence. So it seems that the Church in these two hundred years has come to the point where secular man is the spirit and mind that controls it. This can readily be seen in society's opinion that the Church should be seen, not heard, and is not to interfere in the world around it. The easiest response and the one too often chosen by the Church is peaceful co-existence with secularism.

This secular influence has in effect directed the Church to, 'Roll over and play dead.' It appears that for the most part the Church has not disappointed the proponents of this directive.

In the field of evangelism, secular man has said, 'Cool it!' Shamefully the Church which came into being on the wings of evangelistic zeal and whose very existence is justified through evangelistic outreach has complied. 'Don't disturb my life' and 'Don't try to change me' is the retort to the Church's efforts to influence others. 'Yes, Sir,' the Church has replied. 'We don't want any trouble. We don't want to make waves. We must keep the peace. We must guard our conservative middle class image.'

In the areas of politics, social justice, race relations and welfare, the word to the Church is, 'Butt out! You were content for too long to rest on your past

laurels and to ride the coat tail of anemic government programing. What right do you think you have to moralize at this late date?' In other words, 'Roll over and play dead.' It is never too late for conscience. It is time that the Church break out of the pattern too long defended and surprise the world of men. But I wonder sometimes if the Church has any surprises left in it. By this I mean, does the Church have what it takes to do other than what is expected of it? Is the Church willing and able to be different?

The Church's image for too long has not been a surprise to anyone, even though to many it has been a disappointment. It would be refreshing for a change if the Church would surprise its critics rather than identify with their evaluations. The most disturbing surprise that the Church could deliver would be that the Church again become the bearer of the Good News of the Gospel to the whole world. And in this declare that the Church is, 'in the world but not of the world,' and that the business of God's Church can not be conducted on the same computer as the nation's business and commercial community. God's business is people and ministry to God's people is implemented in faith, love, and selfless service. I can not think of a more significant contribution the Church could make during this Bicentennial Year than to stand up and truly be God's Church.

Heartline Interview: James B. Cardwell, Social Security Commissioner. (This is the second of two

Heartline: Do you feel that Medicare should cover prescription drugs?

Mr. Cardwell: There's no question that prescription drug coverage would be valuable to the elderly and the disabled who make up the Medicare beneficiary population. Many of their medical problems require that they rely continuously on prescription drugs. Naturally, this expense is a drain on their financial resources. At the same time, it would be very expensive for the government to take over responsibility for even part of these costs. In the light of the already rising cost of Medicare and the prospect of future deficit in Medicare financing, we are not in a position to expand the program at this time to include prescription drugs. I believe the Congress faces the same problem.

Heartline: If a national health program were established in this country, Medicare would possibly not be necessary. If Medicare were eliminated, what would happen to the medical fund?

Mr. Cardwell: The answer depends upon what form national health insurance would take. At this point, it is impossible to speculate which, if any, of the proposed versions will be enacted into law. Under any national health insurance plan, the government would need to make equitable arrangements with respect to the funds in the medical insurance trust fund. There is nothing in the way in which the Medicare Trust Funds are now organized that would prevent them from being merged with a larger program, should that be the ultimate decision.

Heartline: Do you hold your position as Commissioner of Social Security for a certain length of time?

Mr. Cardwell: The Commissioner of Social Security is appointed by the President with the consent of the Senate and serves at the President's pleasure and for only as long as the President

Heartline: SSI has indeed been a blessing to many thousands of senior citizens. However, is it true that the SSI program has hurt many recipients. because it raised their monthly income to the level where they were no longer eligible for Medicaid and food stamps?

### The Challenge of Mobility Hebrews 11:1, 8-16

forty million citizens in the United States changing their addresses annually, it is obvious that many adjustments have to be made. These changes create numerous problems within the families involved, and have a tremendous effect on the religious activities of multitudes of people. Hebrews 11:1

Here we have a classic description of faith and an explanation of what it does. The value of our faith depends upon the trustworthiness of the one in whom it is anchored. Faith, which is the firm persuasion and expectation that God will fulfill the promises he has made to us, makes us certain of realities we have not seen. "Things not seen" can refer to both the past and the future. We did not see Christ making atonement for our sins, but we believe that he did it. The fact that we exercise faith in God and commit outselves to him, and that we have faith in the things that are unseen, gives us the assurance that we shall possess them in due time. Faith also makes real to us some things which we shall have in the future, such as a resurrection from the grave, a perfect likeness to Christ whom we shall see face to face, and the enjoyment of the reunion of the saved in heaven.

Hebrews 11:8-16 A summons from God came to Abraham to leave his native country and go into a land which he had chosen for him. God called Abraham away from the sinful manner of life of his countrymen unto fellowship with himself, unto purity of worship, and unto the purposes which had been formulated for him in heaven. God's call was to faith, obedience, separation, and dedication

As a superlative example of faith, in response to the call and command of God, Abraham, without asking any questions, immediately left the comforts of his home, the people whom he knew, and the land of his birth, and started on his famous journey into the regions beyond. Making of life an illustrious adventure, "He went out, not knowing whither he went," and without any knowledge of what the future held in store for him. He knew that God was leading and because of his faith in him Abraham firmly believed that his heavenly Father would provide for him. Knowing God, certain that God was calling him, and believing that God would never lead him astray, Abraham was ready to go anywhere with God. To him there were not any risks in obeying God. In Abraham we see faith functioning in the realm of the unknown and

"By faith he sojourned in the land of promise, as in a strange country. Possessing faith in God and resolved to be obedient to him, Abraham looked far into the future and saw a city, of which God was the architect and masterbuilder, into which the redeemed will enter and enjoy perfect communion with him.

At first, Sarah received the promise of a son with utter astonishment. While her laughter, in unbelief, was within herself, it was heard and known by God who knows even the thoughts of all. When God challenged Sarah's laughter. she then turned from doubt to faith and was given power to bear a son. Sarah exercised faith in God's promise and in his power to do what was beyond human expectation and natural hope. When Sarah believed that the promiser was able to be the performer, and rested upon God's veracity and faithfulness, by his grace and power the humanly impossible became the

divinely possible. By faith Sarah overcame the world and received blessings from God and gave enrichment to the lives of many. Faith turned Sarah from a hurt to a help, from a doubter to a witness-bearer, and from human helplessness to divine strengthening. Functioning faith can do as much for us as it did for her. With an implicit trust in God, let us, who at present are pilgrims and sojourners in the country where we find ourselves, continue to bear a faithful witness for our Lord without apology until we take our departure for "a better country, that is, an heavenly," which God has prepared for us. Regardless of how much criticism and persecution to which we may be subjected, let us never be ashamed to live and to speak a good word for our Lord.



# Sunlamp Potentially Dangerous



A sunlamp should be used cautiously, if at all. It can do very little good in most cases and can cause much harm.

The National Safety Council

reports that over 10,000 people in the United States are injured severely each year by the misuse The common injuries result

from the ultraviolet light burning the skin and damaging the eyes. Falling asleep while under the sunlamp is often the reason for excessive exposure and deep

A tanned appearance, as if one has been on a vacation to sunny parts, has long been regarded as a mark of prestige and a sign of good health. The sunlamp is ed as a substitute for sunlight as a source of tanning.

In general, persons who burn more readily in the sun have a low tolerance to the ultraviolet rays of light from a sunlamp.

Fair-skinned blonds and redheads are more vulnerable to skin damage than brunettes. However, a person can be burned regardless of his or her light causes premature aging of complexion if the dosage of ultraviolet light is sufficiently

If you decide to use a sunlamp, take the following precautions: 1. Talk to your physician to find out what kind of skin you

have and how well your skin type will tolerate exposure to sunlamp rays. 2. Never look directly into a

lighted sunlamp. 3. Always cover your eyelids or grease them heavily ahead of time to avoid burning the tender skin of your eyelids and causing

possible eye damage.

4. Set an alarm clock or timer to go off when you have had the allotted dose of light. Such an alarm also helps to avoid overexposure in case you fall asleep while under the sunlamp. Overexposure to ultraviolet

the skin and causes predisposition to the later formation of skin Q: Mrs. A.H. says that she has heard syphilis is a subtle and po-

tentially fatal venereal disease She asks whether a vaccine is available to prevent catching

A: Syphilis is caused by a microscopic spirochete or spiral-shaped bacterium, treponema pallidum. Although it was discovered about 71 years ago, this organism has been very difficult to culture and grow in the laboratory. Recent success in the culture of this spirochete has been reported at the Florida In-stitute of Technology If this work permits the growing of studies can be carried out in animals, and later in humans, in the hope of developing a vaccine against syphilis. However, a vaccine probably would not be available for several years. Penicillin and other antibiotics are used effectively to treat syphilitic infections.

Q. Mrs. E.V. asks whether she should try acupuncture for rheumatoid arthritis.

A: The exact cause of rheumatoid arthritis is unknown, but it behaves like an infection. Acupuncture cannot be expected to affect the cause. It might give relief of pain for a short period of time after treatment. Cases of this disease vary greatly in severity. You should discuss this matter with your physician and follow his advice.

Ford - whose campaign swing through Texas continued today - is now suggesting he will surprise people in the Texas Republican primary Saturday in which he has rated himself an underdog. After several days of poking at Reagan, he abruptly shifted gears on Thursday and began talking about the Democrats.

Reagan, meantime, returned to Texas to wind up his campaign. In Beaumont, the former California governor called for a "spiritual revival" in the country and suggested "getting God back into public schools" might be one way of doing it.

At a Waco session with Baylor University students, Ford said of a potential Ford-Carter contest, "Ford and Carter? Well, we don't really know what Jimmy Carter stands for. But, if he gets the nomination, we will darned sure find out.'






