School To Open Here On Aug. 27

Benton City Schools will begin Wednesday, Aug. 27, at 8:30 a.m. Only the 8th, 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th grades will attend school on that day. Buses will run at 8:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. on that date.

All grades will attend School Thursday and Friday, Aug. 28 and 29, from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. There will be no school Monday, Sept. 1. School will convene again Tuesday, Sept. 2, at 8:30 a.m. The cafeteria will serve lunch Tuesday, Sept. 2.

Any child six years of age by Dec. 30, 1958, is eligible to enroll in school this year. All students entering school for the first time MUST present a health certificate and a birth certificate or proof of birth, such as Bible record or affidavit, the first day of school.

Free textbooks will be furnished to all students from the first through the eighth grades. All students who live outside the Benton Independent School District desiring to attend the Benton City Schools will pay tuition at the following rate: \$50 per year for all students from grade one through grade 12 inclusive. Tuition to be charged only for the days the student is in membership in the Benton City Schools and further providing that any student living in the Benton Independent School District at the beginning of the school term and enrolls in the Benton City Schools and moves from the Benton Independent School District during that term may finish that term without a tuition charge. Bus routes will be same as last year.

Bishop Asbury wrote in his "Travels" of his friendship and visits in the home of Captain Wood.

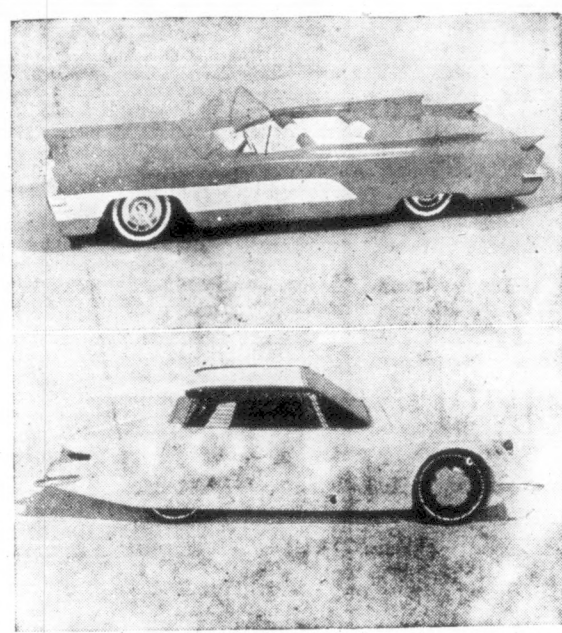
Before her marriage to Mr. Bean, she attended Marvin College at Clinton and was one of Marshall County's teachers.

'Swapping Ring' Must Leave City Residential Section

Swapping of livestock, dogs and other animals in any residential section of Benton was made unlawful by an ordinance voted Monday night by City Council.

The action came after a delegation of citizens appeared before the Council and protested the "swapping ring" which operates on First Mondays in the vicinity of 13th and Elm Streets.

The "swapping ring" has operated in Benton many years, and is a carryover from the old-time trade day crowds that gathered on the Court Square and did their bargaining.

The traders moved off the square when parking meters were installed.

Citizens said the "swapping ring" is a nuisance; that livestock and dogs damage lawns; and that the large crowd of men often are not careful with their language.

Some of those who gather at the "swapping ring" are Marshall County residents, but many of them come from surrounding counties to trade livestock.

Several suggestions have been made for new sites for the "swapping ring". One of these sites is City Park. The other site is the north side of the Court Square, which could be roped off for the First Monday traders.

Neither site has been officially endorsed, however, by the City Council.



The tree and seed catalogs do such a wonderful job that we can't wait to pick the fruit from a new tree. And how long it seems before the first fruit appears! Horticulturists tell us that trees will bear several years earlier if branches are weighed or tied down so that branches are parallel to the ground. This lets more sunlight in—helps set more fruit buds.

Now that we have the fruit arriving earlier, we ought to know how to handle it. One of the best aids for removing fruit skins is household lye. Just dissolve a can of lye slowly in two gallons of cold water (not in aluminum container) and bring to a boil. Place the fruit in a wire basket or in a thin cloth and lower into the solution for about 30 seconds. Remove and immediately immerse in cold water. The skins may now be washed or rubbed from the fruit. After peeling, have been removed, rinse fruit in clear water, then dip in solution of four tablespoons of vinegar in two gallons of water to neutralize any lye remaining, and help prevent fruit from darkening. And here's a tomato-peeling trick. Massage it lightly with the dull edge of a knife. The peel will come loose much more easily.

One of the handiest ways to scoop the insides out of a tomato or pepper is to use a curved-blade grapefruit knife.



Good Looks And Your Feet

Aching feet can spoil your looks and shatter your peace of mind. So you should care for your feet regularly, not only to keep them free of painful corns and calluses but to prevent tension that puts ugly wrinkles in your face.

The new pointed shoes may be too snugly fitted for foot ease. This causes pressure at the heels, on the ball of the foot, along the outer side of the big toe and sometimes at points on the other toes. 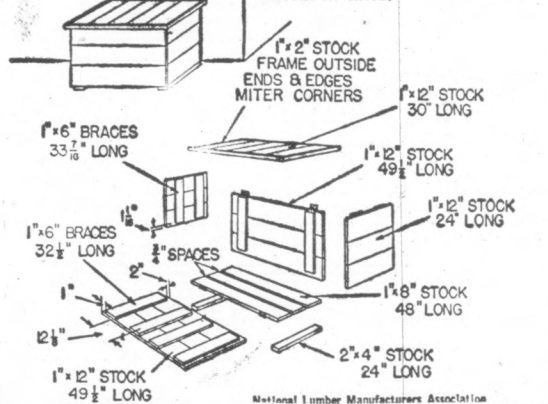
squatting position to see just how strong are the muscles in your feet, legs, and thighs. Try holding your back straight and remaining in this position for a moment.

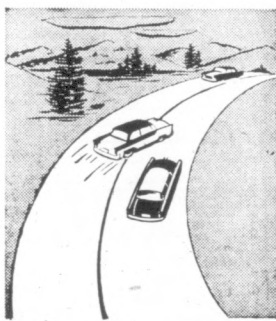

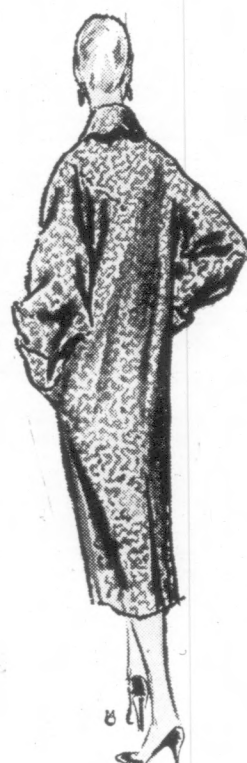

Break Ground For New Airco Calvert Plant

Ground was broken this week in the first phase of construction of Air Reduction Chemical Company's new multi-million dollar polyvinyl plant and expansion of the company's vinyl acetate monomer facilities at Calvert City.

The new buildings will be Airco's sixth Calvert City plant and will bring its total investment there to more than \$40,000,000. Facilities now under construction and a pilot plant being built in New Jersey are to cost in excess of \$12,000,000, John A. Hill, president, announced in May.

The Calvert City structure is to be completed early in 1960. First phase plans call for the completion of grading, road and railroad construction and the laying of the foundation before bad weather sets in. Warehouses are also scheduled to be built so that some construction work can continue during the winter months.

The new buildings will adjoin the present Airco plant on the east and south sides. It will provide employment for 70 persons and produce 20 million pounds of polyvinyl alcohol resin annually plus doubling Airco's vinyl acetate monomer production.

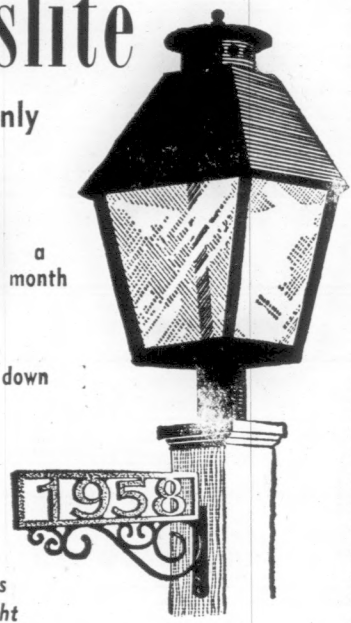
There comes a time—although it may be only in the hour of death—when a man's riches fail him and are worthless.

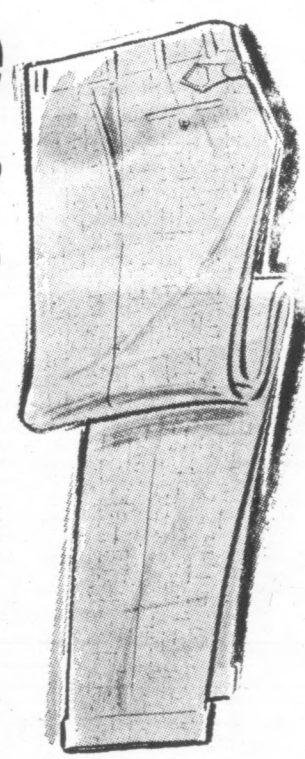

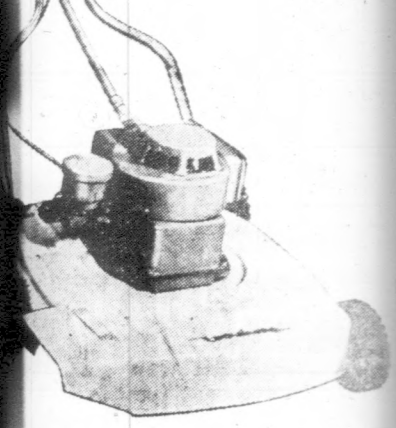

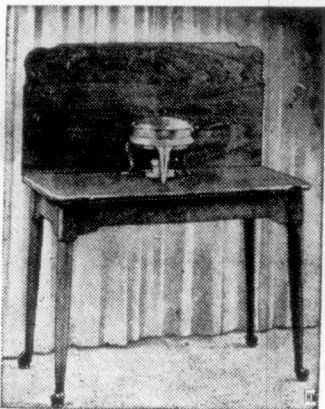

Among the latest road hazards is turnpike driving. One of the great dangers of traveling for a length of time at high speeds over straight roads is "road hypnosis." Safety experts suggest a variety of ideas to keep from being lulled to death. Remove the shoe from your right foot so that the gas pedal vibrates the foot as you travel. Sit on a piece of plywood or hardboard. Play the radio, but not too heavy a diet of soft music. Make periodic coffee stops.

Keeping the car clean inside and out helps prolong its life and beauty. Don't use too harsh a detergent on the paint finish—and wash the car in a shady area. Road tar can be removed by rubbing it with lard. Let it stand a few seconds, then rub off.

To prolong the life and maintain top efficiency of the radiator in your car, scale formed by water evaporation should be removed regularly. Frequent changes with soft water help. For a complete descaling, dissolve a can of household lye in five gallons of water. Empty the radiator and fill with this solution. Drain after five hours of engine operation. An important caution: do not use this solution if the cylinder heads in your car are made of aluminum.
