Soil Bank Program Ready

By ROBERT L. RUDOLPH

The 1959 Soil Bank program has been announced. In 1956, '57 and '58 there were two parts to the Soil Bank, the Acreage Reserve, to adjust production of allotment crops such as tobacco, wheat and cotton, and the Conservation Reserve, to adjust the production of general crops.

In 1959 only the Conservation Reserve part of the Soil Bank will be in effect, but may be used to adjust production of both allotment crops and general crops.

The rate for Kentucky will be somewhat higher than heretofore, being set at \$15 per acre, which is \$5 above the previous state average of \$10 for eligible

acres in the Soil Bank base.

Marshall County rates will be announced along with other county rates at a later date. These rates will be based on land productivity, rental value and fixed costs that producers will have to meet to comply with the program. Also individual farm rates within the county will be established, along the same lines except that no farm rate may exceed 20 per cent of the value of the land in the farm.

Eligible land for 1959 will be land that is regularly used for cultivated crops or tame hay.

Two types of payments will be made in '59 as before—a cost-share payment for completing a conservation practice on the re-

serve land such as planting forest trees, digging a pond, establishing a grass and legume cover or planting wildlife cover, and rental payments during the life of the contract.

The Conservation Reserve is being opened early this year probably sometime in September. Meanwhile, the county office is keeping a list of all who have inquired about the program.

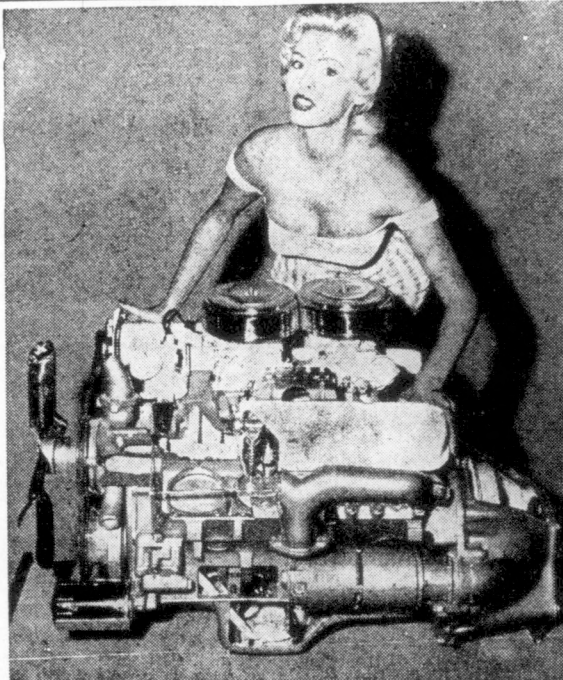

Honey bees, bumble bees, hornets, wasps and yellow jackets all belong to the same family, and they all sting. The female, with the exception of the wasp, leaves her stinger with the victim.

- Remember:
1. Scrape out the stinger with a small knife blade. Don't pull it out. You may cause poisonous fluid to enter the flesh.
 2. Use baking soda paste, Unguentine or calamine lotion to allay the pain.
 3. If a finger or toe is stung, wrap a rubber band around it above the sting and leave it there until the stinger has been removed (but not more than five minutes) to keep the poison from going farther.
 4. Call a doctor if the victim is stung several times. A wasp or hornet can sting repeatedly.
 5. Use ice packs or cold applications to help reduce the swelling and prevent absorption of toxin that may cause a severe reaction.
- Caution: Anyone who has experienced severe reactions to a bee sting should consult a doctor. To avoid serious consequences if stung again, he should have ephedrine or adrenaline immediately available.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE DECLARING IT INSANITARY AND UNLAWFUL TO CONGREGATE IN LARGE GROUPS FOR THE PURPOSES OF BARTERING, SELLING OR TRADING LIVE STOCK UPON THE STREETS OF THE RESIDENTIAL SECTIONS OF THE CITY OF BENTON AND DECLARING SAME TO BE A NUISANCE AS BEING INJURIOUS TO THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND GENERAL WELFARE ANY WELL BEING TO THE CITIZENS OF THE CITY OF BENTON

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Benton held at the City Hall, on the 4th day of August, 1958 at the hour of 7:30 P. M. present and presiding the Honorable Guy Mathis and the following named Councilmen:

Graves Lampkins, Sam Myers, Curt Phillips, Bob Long and Richard Rudolph, Councilman Robert Rider absent, the following was in order of business:

Upon motion of Councilman Lampkins, Second by Councilman Myers all members of the Council who were present voting "Aye" the following Ordinance was adopted:

Be it Ordained that it is declared to be insanitary and unlawful for groups of people to congregate on the Streets of Benton, Kentucky in residential sections for the purpose of bartering, selling or trading or exchanging live stock; be it further ordained that the aforesaid purposes shall be and the same is hereby declared a nuisance.

Be it further ordained that any one found "guilty" of violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined for each offense, not less than \$5 nor more than \$25.

Any laws or regulations relating to the congregating for the purpose of trading live stock in the Streets of Benton in the residential sections which are in conflict with this Ordinance shall stand for naught, upon and after the legal publication of this Ordinance.
