Pennsalt Picnic to be Saturday

The Pennsylvania Salt Manufacturing Co. will hold its annual picnic for employees at Benton City Park Saturday, Sept. 6.

One of the most important aspects of the Selective Service System is its capability for rapid expansion in time of emergency. The Selective Service System is the only agency with an inventory of manpower, and in event of disaster or catastrophe it is the only agency organized in each of the communities throughout the United States capable of expanding its present functions and assuming necessary additional responsibilities in connection with the mobilization of manpower, not only for the military, but for all civilian activities, including Civil defense.

Numbers of inquiries by phone and in person have been made concerning acreage reserve compensation that had not been completed. Allocation was released Sept. 2 to make further payment and these are being made at this time.

WARNING to all farmers who signed acreage reserve agreements for 1958 on tobacco, wheat and cotton. This agreement is binding until Dec. 31, 1959, and violation of this agreement by grazing or harvesting a crop of any kind, including hay, will be a violation of the agreement, and will result in forfeiture of amount received plus 50 percent civil penalty.

Acreage reserve farms are being spot checked now to determine compliance with agreement.

MARVIN PRINCE BUYS BENTON BUSINESS LOT

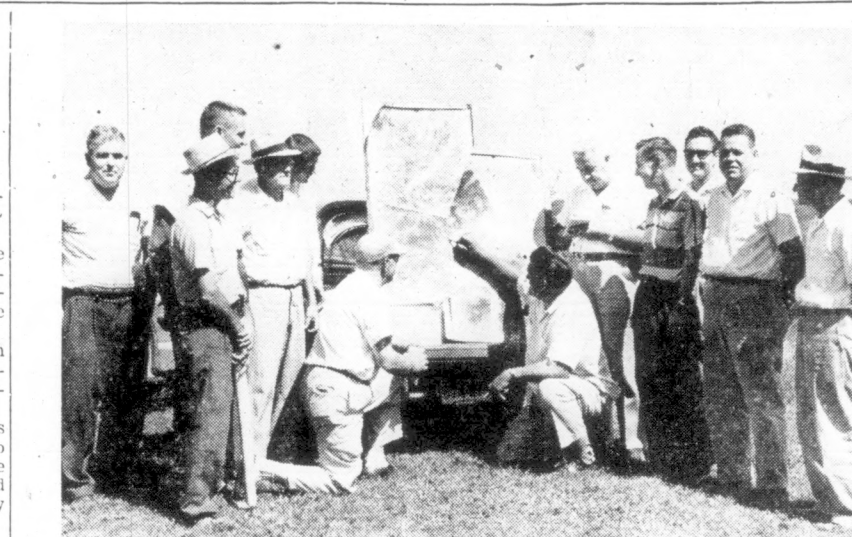

State Offers to Bring Tax Records up to Date

The State Department of Revenue has offered to give the Marshall County tax commissioner's office a fund of \$10,000 to bring its property records up to date.

The offer carries with it one "if." That is, if the project is kept clear of all politics.

Tax Commissioner Charles Lents has assured the Department of Revenue that there will be no politics.

The money would be used to make aerial and other maps and to pay every piece of property in the county. This vital data would be kept in the tax commissioner's office and would provide the first complete record ever assembled of all property in the county.

Local and experienced men would be hired to gather the property records for the tax office. The workers would be hired by the tax commissioner and would be under his supervision.

The records would provide the tax commissioner with complete information on a great deal of property that is now unlisted, especially newly-developed property on Kentucky Lake.

The information would include property boundaries, ownership, etc. No appraisal of value would be made, however.

Fiscal Court has voiced its approval of the project. Also, most civic clubs have endorsed it.

County Schools Show Increase in Enrollment

Enrollment in Benton and Marshall County schools is showing a slight increase over 1957, it was reported this week by Supts. Joe Duke and Holland Rose.

County grade and high schools have a total enrollment of 2,698 pupils, which is about 60 more than in September 1957.

Benton's total enrollment is 717, which is 10 more than in September 1957.

There are 203 students in the upper four grades (high school) at Benton, and 314 students in the other eight grades.

South Marshall High has 311 students, and North Marshall has 385. Grade schools in the county have the following enrollments:

Aurora 98, Brewers 231, Briensburg 167, Boys Camp 14, Calvert City 488, Gilbertsville 113, Fairdealing 190, Sharpe 349, Hardin 259, West Marshall 90.

The county school system has 110 teachers this year, six more than last year.

Two new classrooms have been added this year, one at Calvert City and one at Sharpe.

Joe Nell is attendance officer for the county school system.

Park Care By Traders Requested

Members of the Benton City Park Board appealed to the City Council Tuesday night to request First Monday traders to keep the City Park clean and free of livestock disease.

John Clay Lovett, chairman, Joe Brooks Phillips and Jack Periman represented the Park Board at the City Council meeting, which had been delayed from Monday night because of the Labor Day holiday.

Lovett, as spokesman for the Park Board, urged that the traders be required to keep the grounds as clean as possible and to use every care NOT to bring diseased animals to the park.

He said that expensive saddle and race horses used the barns at the fairgrounds and that owners of these horses would refuse to come here if they thought there was any possibility of their fine animals becoming infected with some disease.

He also suggested that the traders use every care in protecting children that use the park as a playground.

He further suggested that the trading area be confined to one particular part of the fairgrounds, that part near the cattle barns.

Mayor Guy Mathis suggested that barrels be placed in the trading spot so the swappers could put their discarded trash and paper in the barrels.

Park Board members represented the City Council for not consulting them regarding use of the park for any activities, particularly those not classified as recreation.

Most of the Councilmen and Park Board members felt that the traders would co-operate in every way possible to take care of the park.

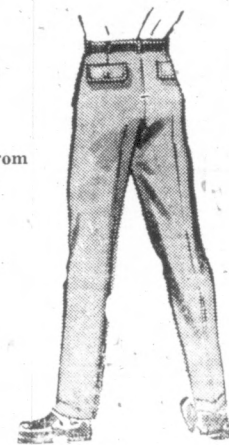

June Carter to be At State Fair With Country Music Show

As Minnie Pearl is known for her yellow organdy dress and floppy straw hat, as the Duke of Paducah is remembered for his "killing" shoes, so is June Carter outstanding for a particular article in her wardrobe.

The funny dancing of this elf-in folk singer, who is to appear with the Country Music Show during the Kentucky State Fair, Sept. 4-13, is glamorized by ruffled pantaloons which she wears for public appearances and for her weekly stint on the Grand Ole Opry.

June recalls one incident about her bloomers that makes her blush even to tell it. At one personal appearance, in the middle of the dance, she was ready to show off her bloomers when she remembered, just in time, that she had forgotten to put them on.

"I forgot something!" she screamed, and retreated quickly backstage to complete her dressing. On another occasion her elastic, not her memory, failed her, and the bloomers slid their merry way to the floor.

But June Carter is not the sort to be ruffled by minor mishaps. This spunky girl has sung, danced and clowning her way into the hearts of country music fans in an amazingly short time. From making transcriptions for a radio station in Del Rio, Texas, in 1950, June rose to an important spot on the Grand Ole Opry and has made countless personal appearances.

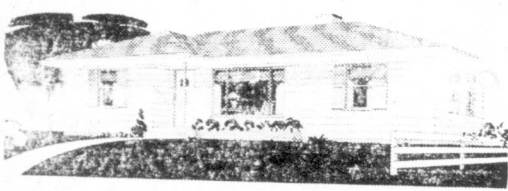

Design C-468. This plan achieves circulation without the use of a long hall. The three bedrooms have large wardrobe type closets. Adjoining the kitchen, space has been provided for the washer and dryer. In the family area, a folding door can be used to separate the dining area and form a guest room, study or private playing area.

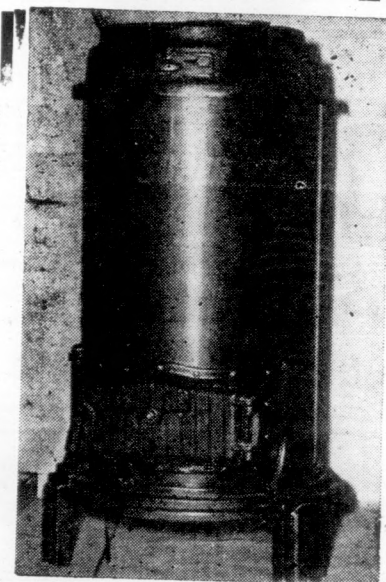

Dove Hunt Season On; Will Continue For Two Months

Frankfort — With the rapid comeback of small game and one kind of big game—deer—Kentucky has some of the most diversified hunting in the nation. The two parts of the split squirrel season are Aug. 15-Oct. 15 and Nov. 20-Dec. 17. Hunters annually bag some four million red and grey squirrels.

The dove hatch was good this year, although weather conditions could cause the birds to migrate early. The season, opening Sept. 1, continues 65 one-half days, with a limit of 10 a day, or possession limit of 20 after two or more days of hunting. The bag last season was about 1 1/2 million.

Topping the game kill list in Kentucky is the bobwhite. Last year hunters bagged more than four million.

Last year hunters also bagged slightly more than three million rabbits.

The waterfowl hunting potential increased last year with the opening of the Ballard County waterfowl management area for shooting. It will open this year Nov. 7. The goose and duck season is Nov. 7-Jan. 15.

For the third consecutive year, Kentucky will have a deer hunt. The four-day season will open Nov. 27 and continue through Nov. 30 in 31 counties this year, compared with 27 last season. Only bucks may be taken the first two days, with the final two being hunter's choice.

Deer have increased rapidly since a restocking program was begun in 1945, with the population estimated not at a peak of 35,000.

Conservation Commissioner Laban P. Jackson, chairman of arrangements, said his committee is mapping out the slightest details to insure a pleasant stay for the governors and their parties.

An honor guard and band will greet each governor as he arrives, either at the airport or station.

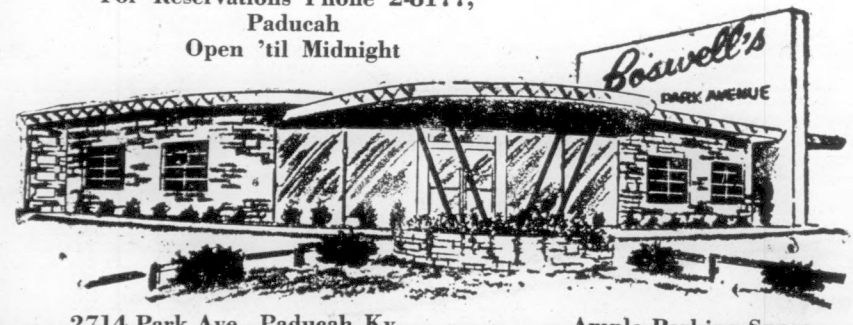

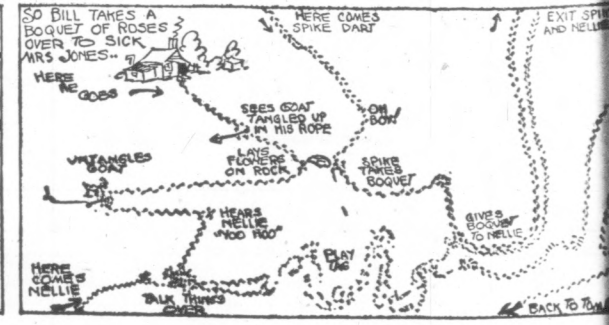

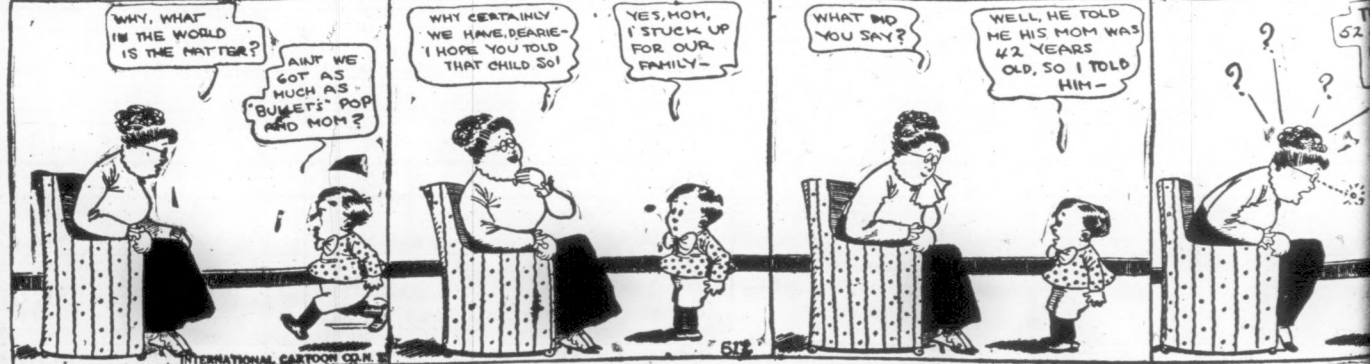

What Grandma Told Me

By MRS. WAITE CLARK

My grandma was born in North Carolina in the year 1843. When she was about 3 her family, together with several other families, moved in covered wagons to Marshall County, Ky., where she grew up, married and raised her family.

My mother was the oldest of seven children, and I, being the eldest grandchild, can remember my Grandma as early as I can remember anyone. To me she was then the most wonderful person in the world and as I grow older and remember the many things she told me, I realize how my life was enriched by a loving association. She loved to talk and loved to listen.

She was a hard-working woman and she told me of how she carded, spun, dyed and wove linen, cotton, and woolen cloth for clothing for her family; towels, pillowcases, sheets, blankets, and coverlets, also carpets and rugs for the floors.

She told me of the days before the Civil War when most of the landowners had slaves and of how the slaves were treated by their different owners; some were well treated, some not so well. One owner, in particular, when butchering time came in the fall, killed more than 50 hogs for his slaves as well as his own family. When they had ham for breakfast in the big house, they had ham for breakfast in the cabins.

Sugar was bought by the hoghead, and was shipped up the river from New Orleans. When spring house-cleaning was finished, everybody had pound cake. She told me of how the slaves were allowed to take Christmas holidays for a length of time covered by the burning of the Yule-log which had been soaked in the creek or was of unusual size.

She was 17 when the Civil War began. She told me of how the families, who were in sympathy with the South were cut off from Paducah, their market, when that city was occupied by the Northern troops.

They dared not to go to Paducah for fear of arrest and charges of aiding the South, but she told me that there were people who claimed allegiance to the North who would take their produce to market and bring supplies to her family for a price, together with a pledge of silence.

She told me how the guerrillas came frequently to the homes of the farmers, left their poor run-down horses and took the pick of the farmer's work-stock. She herself was stopped one Sunday when on her way to church. The men had removed the saddle from her horse when the officer rode up and said, "Men, it is against our orders to unseat a lady." She said they immediately resaddled her horse and assisted her to remount and she went on her way, rejoicing. She also told me she could never remember what the preacher talked about that day.

She had a habit, which I think she practiced as long as she kept her own house, and that was to leave what food she had left from the evening meal until morning to empty out, having

no means of keeping food, but this practice was acquired during the war, with expectation that someone, and I surmise they hoped a hungry Southerner, would stop for a meal.

She told me how they did the family wash at the spring, with the aid of the bathing stick (a paddle) and a wide board, or they were lucky if they could find a big flat rock to lay the wet clothes on after spreading with soft soap, then beating (or battling) 'till the dirt was loosened, then boiled, rinsed and bleued (with indigo). She said that later her father carved out a washboard, from a piece of hardened timber, similar to the metal ones we used before the advent of the present day washing machine, and on how easy to wash and how clean it got the clothes!

She has told me of sickness, disease and death, doctor's medicine and home remedies. It seemed that liver medicine was the first requisite of treatment, calomel, blue mass (whatsoever) and home doctors made liver pills from the bark

of walnut roots, also from may-apple roots. Quinine was taken for ague (malaria) and it was used in a mixture of lard as a rub for chests and backs, to break up colds.

She told me not many years before she passed away that she was confident that her father's death was caused by appendicitis, that since operations had become successful and numerous she'd been reading about the ailment and the cause, and even though they called it "Billious Colic" then, she was convinced it was appendicitis, and she probably was correct.

She was a wonderful cook and though she had a wood-burning cook stove since long before she was born, she knew and practiced the art of fireplace cooking. Vegetables were cooked in an iron pot for a much longer time than our present quicker cooking methods, and to me they seemed to have a better flavor.

She told me and showed me how to make and bake pound cake in a large deep oven, just how much fire to make underneath and how much to put on the cover. Cornbread including egg-bread, corn dodgers and cracklin' bread was baked in a smaller oven which she called a skillet. Hoe-cake, a plain corn-

bread without egg or shortening, was baked on a griddle. She called it a "baker." This baker was what she used to bake layer cakes in the cook-stove.

She had an unbounding faith in her Creator and in many ways she tried to instill the same faith in me. She would say, "Don't be afraid, do right and trust in Him, we need His help when the sun is shining just as much as when the storm comes down."

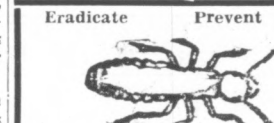
When I count my blessings, I am always thankful for the many things my Grandma told me.

The Danger Signals Of Diabetes

Statistically speaking, there is a good possibility that you are or will become diabetic. Diabetes is one of our most common diseases, far more common than active tuberculosis. In the United States about two million persons have this condition, about one fourth of whom do not know it. It has been estimated that there are also almost five million persons who are potential diabetics for one of several reasons. Just what is diabetes? Normally the body changes sugary and starchy foods, our chief source of energy, into a form of sugar called glucose. This is burned right away for heat or energy, or it may be stored in the body in a slightly different form for use later. In diabetes, however, the glucose accumulates in the blood and the kidneys work overtime to get this wasted sugar out of the body.

What are the symptoms of diabetes? The diabetic person is likely to urinate frequently and to be constantly thirsty. He will be weak, tired and hungry because the blood sugar is not being converted into energy. Since his body cannot fully utilize food, he will lose weight no matter how much he eats. Other symptoms are slow healing of cuts and bruises, changes in vision, drowsiness, intense itching, pain in fingers and toes.

The basic cause of the ailment is not yet known, but it is related to the working of the pancreas, the gland which makes insulin. Insulin's principal function is to help the body utilize glucose. This is why diabetes must have injections of insulin. Anyone may become a diabetic, according to the American Diabetes Association, but the condi-

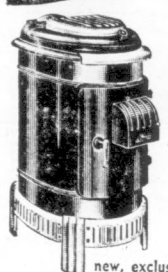

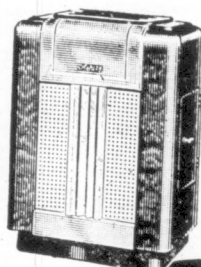

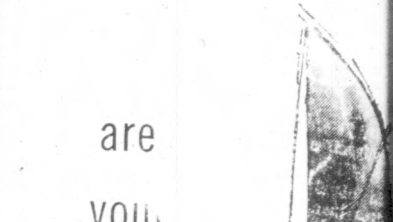
