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A NEW SUFFRAGE EXPERIMENT.

The election just held in Belgium

was the first one under the new and

complicated system of manhood

suffrage and plural voting recently

adopted in that country; and the re-

sult is of general interest as pertain-

ing to political development in the

line of Democratic government.

This system gives one vote to each

male citizen over 25 years of age who

has lived a year in the district, two

votes to each married man or wid-

ow paying a small tax, and three

votes to each member of the educa-

tional class, including the clergy.

Every man compelled to serve in

the army is furnished a legal excuse, and

promote the definite expression of

public sentiment. Two years ago,

under the restricted suffrage plan then

in force, the voting population was

only 135,238, whereas it now ag-

gregates 1,370,087, and the plural
