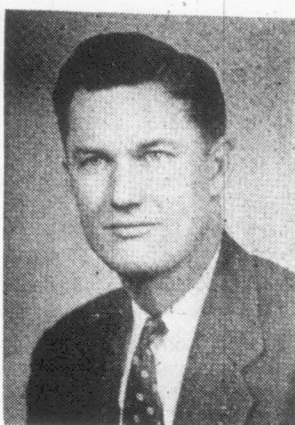

### Indict Man In Shooting Of Horse

The Marshall Circuit Court grand jury returned a dozen indictments late Wednesday after three days of investigating law violations. Some of the indictments were not released for publication because the defendants had not been arrested.

The grand jury was discharged late Wednesday by Circuit Judge Earl Osborne.

Among the indictments were: Eugene Dunn of Benton was indicted on a charge of shooting a race horse that had wandered into his yard from the Marshall County fairgrounds. The horse was owned by Lucien Blaylock.

Myrdol Henson and Glen Allen were indicted on a charge of grand larceny. They were accused of taking a watch and some cash from Jimmie Dillingham.

William H. Anglin Jr. was indicted on a charge of detaining a woman against her will. He also was indicted on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a girl under 18 years of age.

Noah Lynn was indicted on a charge of shooting a shotgun charge into the home of Dorotha Kennedy.

Majorie McCampbell was indicted on a charge of issuing a forged check to Nelson's Drug Store.

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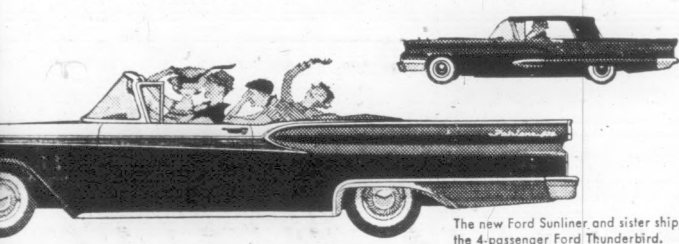
