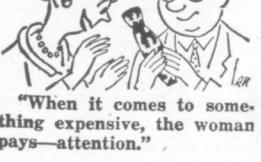

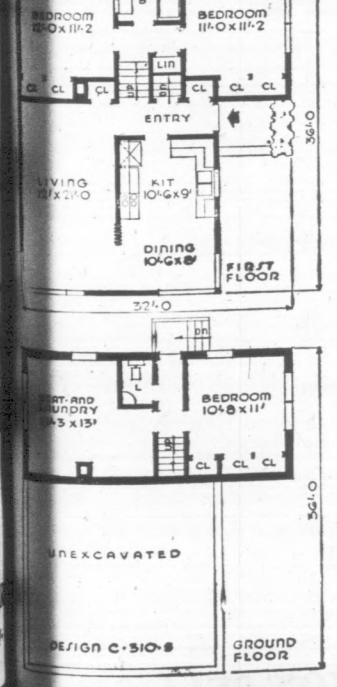

# 20 YEARS AGO

From The Courier  
Files of 1938-39

Items for this week's column are taken from the Sept. 29, 1938, issue of the Courier.

The big news of that week—20 years ago—was that a South Carolina manufacturing company had inquired about establishing a shirt factory in Benton.

The company said it would hire 250 employees and have a weekly payroll of \$2,500. (An average of \$10 per week wasn't much pay, even in 1938).

Whether Benton got the shirt factory or not, we do not know, but the story went on to say that local folks believed that the new Gilbertville Dam would bring several factories to this county. And it sure did. More than a hundred million dollars worth of chemical plants to Calvert City.

Hardin High School was planning to hold its annual school fair. Other schools also were to participate in the fair, which was to feature exhibits, speaking, spelling and other contests and last, but not least, the Golden West Cowboys from radio station WSM at Nashville.

Palma Grade School had won the county softball championship by defeating Brewers 9 to 1. The all-tournament team, picked by Umpire Bob Hall and Scorekeeper Hope Trimble was as follows:

Egner, catcher, Palma; Solomon, pitcher, Palma; Cole, first base, Brewers; Powell, second base, Palma; Pugh, shortstop, Palma; Brewer, third base, Brewers; Smith, left field, Vanora; Lents, center field, Brewers; and Brady, right field, Palma.

Sharpe was getting ready to hold a Turtle Derby. A turtle named "Chief," trained by Ed Nelson, and one named "Wilkes," owned by Hatter Morgan, were among the entries. Also a female turtle, "Miss Oyl," owned by Staggner's Grocery and trained by Dr. Edleman, John

Gregory sponsored the race for the benefit of the school's agriculture department.

Fire had destroyed a stock barn owned by Jack Treas of Brewers. A horse, three mules and a lot of hay and corn were lost in the fire.

Three Paducah youths had been charged with breaking into Davenport Bros. store at Hardin and the Cleve Rudolph store near Maple Springs. The charges had been filed in the court of County Judge John Hall.

Marriage licenses had been issued to Reuben Harper and Nina Tally and to William Earl Lee and Jaunita Holland.
