EDITORIAL

OVER THE TOP OR FAILURE? WHICH?

The success or failure of the Victory Pulpwood Campaign, which this community and this newspaper have been supporting for three months, depends on the outcome of the next drive announced by the Newspaper Pulpwood Committee this week to Cut-a-Cord of Pulpwood for Every Local Boy in Service.

This drive might be likened to the Battle of the Argonne Forest which decided the last World War and led to the Armistice. If we put over this drive, we will have won the 1943 battle for greater pulpwood production and overcome a 2,500,000-cord shortage which threatens to hamper our progress against the Axis.

We've already made a substantial contribution to the war effort in the extra pulpwood cut to date. More is being cut now than during the months before the campaign started. But it is not enough. War needs are great.

Let's get behind this new drive and give it the final push needed to put the Victory Pulpwood Campaign over the top. Then we can be sure that no soldier, flier, sailor, or marine will suffer for lack of the many things pulpwood provides him.

And we will know that no boy has died because we have failed.

SOLDIER ON POSTWAR PLANS

In view of the supposedly "far-reaching" postwar plans now coming out of Washington, it is enlightening to read a letter from a soldier stationed in North Africa and received by an Eastern newspaper.

This young man is, as he states, "in a position to observe at first hand the reactions of service men to the so-called 'cushioning' plan for demobilization recently submitted to the President by the National Resources Planning Board Conference on Readjustment of Civilian and Military Personnel." And, on the basis of this observation, he states emphatically that although such benefits as government-paid education, pensions, unemployment insurance, etc., are commendable, the one question in every fighting American's mind is: "How quickly will I be returned to civilian life after the cessation of hostilities?"

As an overseas topic this question overshadows all else—every bit of news in fact is interpreted on the basis of the degree to which it will hasten "D" (for discharge) Day.

The men we sent off to the war are the same Americans who in peace days had jobs and were determined to keep off of doles. What they want is to come back to jobs of their own, and they are more concerned with this than with government-inspired relief. Naturally there will have to be certain benefits to our returning fighters. But it must be remembered that these men themselves have definite ideas on the subject of the longed-for civilian life.

The jobs they will want as civilians will be jobs of their own choosing in private industry. Industry has accepted the responsibility—in individual concerns and in industrial associations postwar plans are now being made to supply the needful jobs.

Government's place in these plans is to provide the economic atmosphere in which industry can go ahead with its production—to make all the things that will be needed. They, in turn, will mean jobs.

DOWN OUR ALLEY

Spearheading an attack on the Government's \$800,000,000 food subsidy program, a livestock industry leader charged Monday that the subsidies are a form of "bribery and blackmail" and are being used as a weapon to set up a dictatorship.

"Complete and perpetual control and dictatorship of every phase of our lives is desired by influences that are directing our government policies," Mr. Montague, general counsel of the Texas and Southern Cattle Raisers Association stated before the Senate Agriculture Committee on proposals for expanding the subsidy program, which President Roosevelt declares is necessary to check inflation.

There is little doubt in the mind of those who are close to prevailing confusion among farmers that if the present price regulations continue they will bring about an acute shortage of beef next year. The subsidy plan, proposes in effect, to revolutionize the social economic and political structure of our country.

The control or regulatory system has become so prevalent in our lives, and the offering of a payment to an individual as a dole or gratuity, that the price demanded and extracted is the surrender of personal liberty.

The blackmail comes in, Mr. Montague said, when a person is penalized, through denial of "gratuities and even fines and imprisonment," because he refuses to accept the "dole." He argued that presidential orders creating the price control set-up are illegal, that subsidies are actually inflationary because they block normal price increases that would drain off surplus money, and that, in effect, the subsidy system simply passes on the current food bill to another generation.

The Smith Committee of Congress recommends changes in existing OPA laws to "retain and strengthen inflation control and at the same time eliminate the abuses and injustices now apparent."

This committee accuses the Office of Price Administration of assuming unauthorized powers to legislate regulations and set up a nationwide system of judicial tribunals through which this executive agency judges the actions of American citizens relative to its own regulations and orders and imposes drastic and unconstitutional penalties upon those citizens, depriving them in certain instances of vital rights and liberties without due process of law.

This is the most damning indictment yet to be made against a war-created bureau. The committee expresses belief that the facts it presents to Congress "reveal practices which if not halted might conceivably lead to the undermining of our basic constitutional provisions or separate and independent executive, legislative and judicial departments of government."

Bureaucracy rampant. Weaknesses and lack of congressional restrictions in the Price Control Act and in the Allocation, Priorities and War Powers Acts, plus the grossly abusive manner in which the OPA has interpreted its own functions and powers, are held by the committee to be responsible or the unconstitutional manner in which citizens are being dealt with by OPA.

To prevent inflation and a subsequent rise in living costs was the purpose of the Price Control Act. Coincident with this purpose was the idea to prevent profiteering. But there is no place in the Act which authorizes inclusive profit

control. The OPA has no legal right or authority to formulate such a plan or attempt to put such a plan in effect, asserts the committee.

There is no doubt that rationing and price control are vital wartime necessities, but immediate er bureaus are stench in the nostrils of every free-born American. It is the duty of Congress to act, and act at once.

The recent surrender of the War Labor Board to a so-called compromise agreement made between John L. Lewis and Harold Ickes is another example of bureaucracy at work. To grant wage increases to one group is to break down the purpose of wage freezing—that of preventing inflation. Submitting to the demands of Lewis was nothing more than political expediency, states Harry Wellford, of Memphis, who has just resigned from his post as panel member of the War Labor Board.

It seems to us that the sooner that it is realized that political maneuvering must go in the interest of the country and the war effort, the better off we all will be. The people are beginning to realize this act, as was testified in the recent November election, and sentiment is steadily growing throughout the nation against high-binding government regulations that take away individual rights and liberties, and swivel-chair bureaucrats seek to run all business, including farming, from a White House bureau. This type of government is not only unconstitutional and undemocratic, but will lead to dire results in the end. Bureaucratic government becomes so lop-sided and unwieldy that it is impossible to know what is necessary to correct ailments or abuses. Can a doctor, or a whole corps of doctors, diagnose and successfully treat an ailing patient, much less

thousands and thousands of patients, who reside in every section of the country? Then, how can Washington officialdom expect to administer and properly attend to the affairs of farmers, business men and industries throughout our nation? It is time that Washington wake up to what is happening throughout our nation. The handwriting is on the wall if they will only read it—and if they don't the people will read it for them one of these days at the election polls. But it would, indeed be regretful that we would have to await the action of the people, when we have duly elected representatives who should act, for in the meantime some very serious effects can take place in our nation, which could in the long run be catastrophic. Let us heed the warning which is elimination of now apparent abuses and injustices must be accomplished. This is an "immediate necessity."

As the situation now exists, the "illegal, absurd, useless, and conflicting regulations promulgated by OPA are creating such confusion that it is impossible for the average citizen to know how to comply," the committee pointed out. It inevitably "tends to bring the law into contempt and ridicule and create widespread indignation and resentment among our citizens. Such an unfortunate situation will ultimately lead to a complete breakdown of the price control law and necessarily retard the effective prosecution of the war."

CIVILIAN AWARDS

Testimony to the effect that the stimulus of the Army-Navy "E" and the Maritime "M" production awards has been very great constantly is accumulating. Both management and labor on the home front have been helped to even greater efforts and devotion to the great task of turning out the vital materials of war. Now both directors and workers in a category other than those previously recognized are to receive an achievement award for work well done. These are the seasonal processors of food. The fact that they are not year-round operators makes them ineligible for Army-Navy "E" recognition. But if they meet the same high standards demanded for that badge of honor they are to receive the award of the War Food Administration's "A" flag. Qualifications considered in selection for the award will include ingenuity in the development of war food products, low absenteeism, cooperation in the various food purchase programs, accident prevention and the like.

A number of vital factors on the home front still lack recognition in the form of public awards. The power and utility companies, the communications companies, and even the enormously busy railroads do not fall within the technical requirements for existing awards. There would seem to be little reason why the powerful incentive which existing awards for merit have supplied should not be extended to such fundamentally important elements as the electric light and power industry, which has shown an increase of 73 per cent in its kilowatt hour output since 1939; or the telephone industry, which last year handled 83 per cent more long-distance calls than in 1939; or the American railroads, which in 1942 increased the ton miles moved as compared with 1939 by 62 per cent and the passenger miles by 135 per cent in the same period. The service industries have done and are doing an outstanding war job. They, too, deserve an accolade.

The Return of Our Lord

Acts 1-9-11

In approaching this subject I am conscious of the existing difference of opinion concerning it and the wholesale unbelief among many in the entire matter. But, regardless of the various theories some of which are erroneous and the atheistic propaganda, it remains one of the cardinal doctrines of the Bible. The return of our Lord is one of the inevitable predictions of our Sovereign, God. This truth makes the how of the matter relatively unimportant and it is more or less on the order of His return that so many

differ and quibble. Many ministers have neglected preaching this great truth due to the various opinions held among the brethren concerning it. This should never happen because, in so doing, they neglect preaching a very large part of the sacred word of God. God has given this subject and important and spacious place in His Book, which reminds us that He would have it expounded to all men without any apology.

There are many men today that look upon this doctrine with hatred, but this attitude will not delay His return, regardless of the number that embrace it. Men have hated God's ways and plans throughout every generation but their hatred has not altered God's plans in the least.

There are many others that have adopted the attitude of indifference toward the coming of Christ. Indifference will not affect His appearance in due season. Countless others tremble with great fear as they think of facing Him when He comes but fear will not change the order of His coming. In spite of all these things, there are many that are rendering faithful service to Him, which will hasten His coming again. This should be the attitude of every church that claims Jesus as its head.

In speaking of the second coming, I presume that we all accept the teaching that He came the first time. This fact in itself is a basis of His second coming. Let us keep in mind that there is a vast difference between the two. The coming of Jesus the first time was characterized by the atonement on Calvary's Hill, which called for humiliation, suffering and finally death itself; also, the going down into the heart of the earth and coming forth on the third morning to stand triumphant over death and the grave that the plan of salvation might be completed in behalf of every generation, but the second coming will not be so, for its purpose will be to gather the saints of God, both dead and alive unto Him, and to assure just recompense of reward to every creature that has ever lived which will place Jesus in the position on this occasion, whereas, He was a Saviour in His first coming.

There are a few facts concerning His return upon which practically all agree. We believe that His coming will be universal; that is to say, when He appears to the people of America, at the same time, He will appear to the people of Europe, Asia, Africa and the other continents as well as all the islands of the sea. Regardless of where a man might be, Jesus will appear to him at the same time He appears to all other people of the world. We also agree that His coming will be sudden. The Scripture says, "As the lightning cometh from the east and cuteth its way to the west, so shall the coming of the Son of Man be." This reminds us that there will be no time for preparation after He appears. Furthermore, we agree that His coming will not be expected. The world will be off guard. The Scripture says that in a time when you think not, the Son of Man will appear. This is a reminder that we should at all times be ready for His coming because soon the trumpet of God will sound and Christ will ride down the roads of the sky, with all of His holy angels, coming for His saints. Let us remember that there is a vast difference between Christ coming for His saints and coming with His saints. The Scripture teaches that He will first come for His saints. This will be when He appears in the air and we will rise to meet Him. The living Christians will be translated in the twinkling of an eye and those that are dead shall be resurrected to meet Him in the air. The coming will be secret. Only the redeemed will see and meet Him on this occasion bearing out the Scripture that says, "He will come as a thief in the night." Two will be at the mill, one will be taken and the other left. Two will be in the field, one will be taken and the other left. Two will be in the bed, one will be taken and the other left." This is the Scriptural picture of Jesus assembling His chosen ones in the air to be with Him for a brief season there. This world will be shocked and surprised by the mysterious absence of so many. Some fathers and mothers will awake to find that their children are missing. A lost husband will wake up to find that his Christian wife is gone. In all of the earth there will be confusion and

fear, as men ponder the meaning of what has taken place. They will take notice to many erupted graves in the cemeteries and will wonder what as happened. Great throngs will crowd the churches only to find that every Christian is missing. Terror will stalk down every path and highway. Fear will march up every street and boulevard. Tragedy will decorate the highways and railroads and airplanes because some Christian will be engineering locomotives, some piloting airplanes, some driving automobiles and busses when Christ comes, who will immediately be taken from whatever position that they are in, leaving the trains, cars, and planes to run wild and wreak havoc in the world. If I were a lost man, I would never ride any vehicle that had as its conductor a Christian for I would fear that he would be taken without a word of warning. Jesus is coming in clouds. This time it will be clouds of great glory and might of an omnipotent God. For some of the inhabitants of the earth, they will be clouds of joy, relief, riches and peace. Yes, He is coming in clouds. For others they

will be the darkest storm clouds that have ever arisen because they will contain condemnation and assignment to eternal hell where wails of woe ring through its chambers forever. They will be clouds of disappointment and bitter tears. Oh, how it behooves every man to make adequate preparation for the coming of Jesus.

During the time that the saints are in the air with Christ, the Anti-Christ will reign supremely on the earth and the great tribulation period that is spoken of in Daniel and Revelation will take place. Never before has the world experienced such woeful events as it will experience during this time. I thank God that not one Christian will have to endure the tribulations. To escape these tragical days is worth more than any person could possibly put into Christianity, but this is very small when compared to the multitude of rich blessings that is promised to every follower of the Son of God.

When the Scripture speaks of Jesus coming with His saints, it refers to His appearing following the

tribulation. This will be when Jesus puts His feet upon Mt. Olivet

Therefore, I conclude that the preaching of mere facts of this Biblical truth makes men better. The important question is, "Are you prepared for His coming?" Sad to say, many are not. Many were not ready for the flood in Noah's day. Many were not ready for the fire that came upon Sodom. Just so, countless thousands are not ready for the coming of our Lord even though they have been warned many times of His coming. Because of a lack of preparation, many will experience a terrible, terrifying period of time when Jesus appears which will be likened unto the awful night that came upon Babylon when Nebuchadnezzar was overthrown. That night in Babylon, the king, his lords, princes, and concubines were revelling in ungodly dissipation, unaware of the nearness of their destruction; ignoring God and all principles of righteousness; drinking and dancing. Suddenly the forces of the Medes and Persians came upon them as a mighty tornado and with lance and sword slew them to the last man. This was the bloodiest, most terrifying night that the

kingdom of Babylon had ever witnessed. Thus, to a great degree will it be true when the Son of Man comes. Conditions will be alarming. From every part of the earth thousands will grope in darkness with terror reigning in all lands. My friends, you need not be here during that time if you will place simple trust in Jesus, accepting His as your personal Saviour. Having done this, you will not be here, but with the Saints of God standing prepared before Jesus. May I plead with you that you take care of this most important matter this day?

Following the treachery and tragedy at Pearl Harbor in December, 1941, the Management of this Company declared early in 1942 in an advertisement entitled "America First" that the primary purpose in the operation of this railroad would be the effective prosecution of the war.
