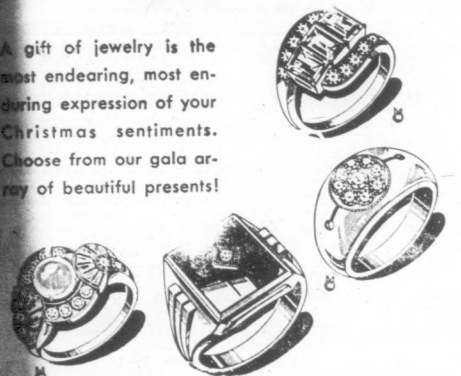

Ben T. Morse Wins Air Force Promotion

Ben Thomas Morse, son of Mr. and Mrs. George T. Morse, 601 Pine Street, Benton, recently reaped double honors from a Military Air Transport Service at Tachikawa Air Base, Japan.

Morse was promoted to Airman First Class on Dec. 1, and also named Airman-of-the-Month by his unit, the MATS 37th Communications Squadron.

The recognition and promotion came to Airman Morse through his ability to take advantage of opportunities offered by the United States Air Force.

Since entering the U. S. Air Force in August 1955, shortly after graduation from Benton High School, he has learned a trade and performed an important job for the Air Force.

Morse's second assignment after enlisting was a Francis E. Warren Air Force Base, Wyoming, where he was trained to be a telephone installer and repairman.

Shortly after completing this technical course, he was sent to Korea in May 1956, where he worked as a telephone lineman. His job there lasted for a year.

In March 1957, Airman Morse was sent to Tachikawa Air Base, Japan, where he was assigned to his present unit.

One of recent achievements was establishing wire communications for a net in Formosa. This was done within 24 hours after landing upon that island.

After completing his work, he served as maintenance repairman while living in a tent without modern facilities where lizards, insects and cobras were abundant.

Airman Morse's achievements extend into the inventive field. He was partially responsible for the design, construction and installation of a new, modified antenna, which has proved to be highly successful and an improvement over an old type.

Besides his technical training, Morse has done much to further his own education. While at Tachikawa, he has taken college courses from the University of Maryland for a total of 12 college credits. By taking other off-duty education courses, he now has 30 credits which can be applied to a college degree.

Airman Morse also has displayed a civic interest while in

Japan. In 1957 and 1958 he was chosen as "Goodwill Ambassador."

This was a program in which one outstanding young man of each unit was chosen to visit Japanese families for a day in order to further cement east-west friendship. He is also a member of the squadron pistol team and has been instrumental in supporting a Japanese orphanage.

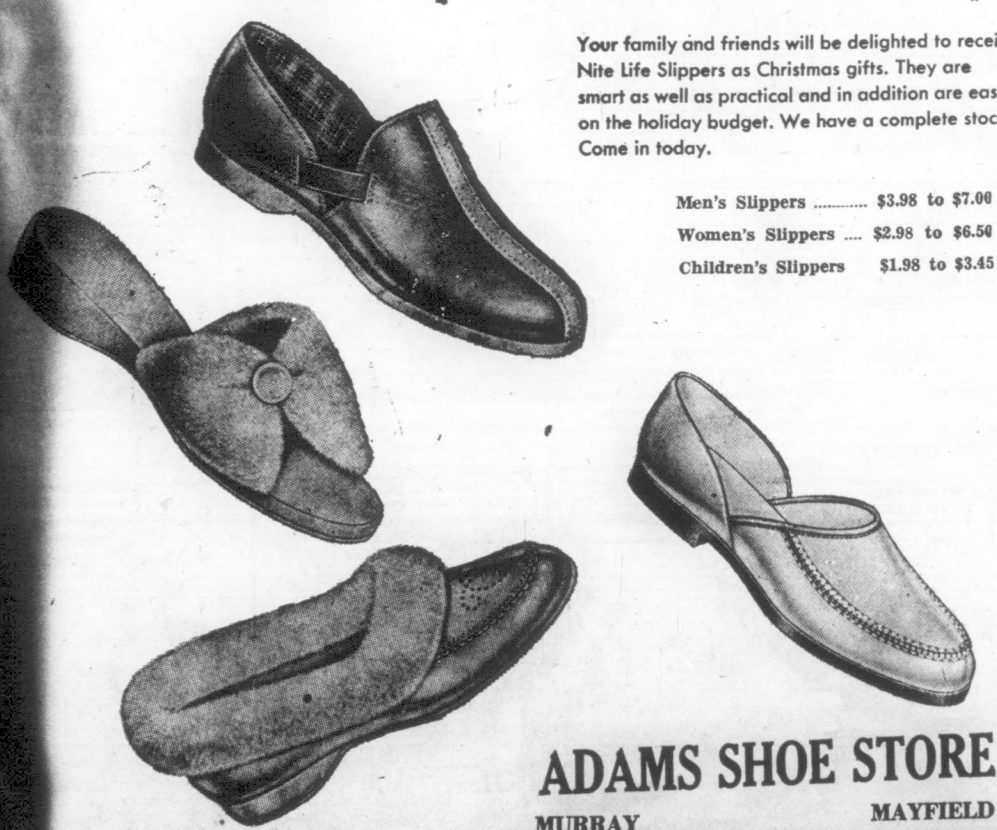

If you do sustain a painful strain or sprain, see your physician right away. Aside from immediate surface therapy he might apply to relieve the pain and swelling, he has available several valuable drugs, developed in recent years, which have been used with great success in treating muscle ailments.

It often develops, too, that a severe sprain or strain will permanently weaken the joint or muscle if proper medical attention isn't administered.

New Conservation Reserve contracts now being signed by farmers in Marshall County will in general become effective on April 15, 1959, according to Renloe Rudolph, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

All Conservation Reserve contracts require that the land included be devoted to grass, trees, or a water or wildlife conservation practice. If the conservation practice to be used on the designated land is performed before April 15, the contract becomes effective at the time the practice is started.

This means that 1958 crops on land put in the Conservation Reserve this fall can be harvested

before the contract goes into effect. In addition, the land put in the Reserve for the first time this fall may be grazed until the contract goes into effect.

After the contract goes into effect, the farmer agrees not to graze the land or harvest a crop from it. He also agrees to refrain from harvesting Christmas trees and ornamentals from the Conservation Reserve land on which forest trees have been planted.

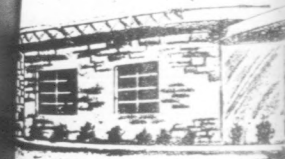

Dear Mister Editor:

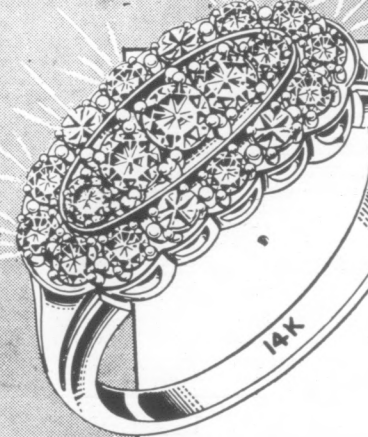

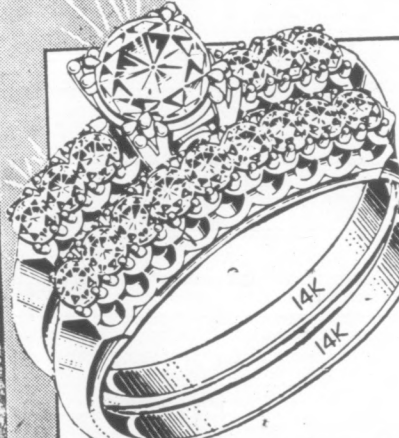

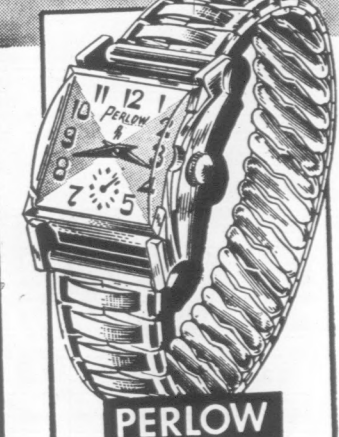

Tradition of Yule Log Has Almost Vanished in World

An old and honored Christmas tradition—the Yule log—has almost vanished from our holiday celebration. Logs and fireplaces are not as common as they were once, but the tradition of the Yule log was carried on in England with great pomp and ceremony, the very best log that could be found was brought into the house and placed in the land for centuries.

It was introduced into Great Britain by the Vikings who burned it to honor the God Thor. The custom was adopted by the English as part of the Christmas festivities.

The fire was lit and the servants of the house gathered with the master and there was much singing and celebrating the coming of the Christmas holiday.

According to the custom of those days the holiday season lasted twelve full days and the log burned during the entire time. At the end of the holiday, any fragments of the log that remained were carefully collected to be used again the following year to kindle the new Yule log. Celebrating today does not last for twelve days, but the superstition that all decorations should be removed by the twelfth night to prevent bad luck in the New Year still survives.

Legion Post No. 85 News

Attention Korean veterans: Effective Jan. 1, 1959, Korean conflict veterans issued nonparticipating, non-convertible NSLI under section 621, may exchange such insurance for a new 5-year term, and/or convert to any of the six permanent plans.

The existing insurance is prefixed by letters "RS" and was issued upon application within 120 days after separation from the service to those persons who served between the dates April 25, 1951, and Dec. 31, 1956.

There are about 13,700 Kentucky veterans who now carry this type of insurance who will have three (3) choices on and after Jan. 1. They may (1) continue on and after Jan. 1. They may (1) continue the existing premium rate; (2) exchange for a limited convertible term contract with lowered premium; or (3) convert to any of the six (6) permanent plans with premium based upon the new mortality table.

The new insurance will be identified by the letter prefix "W." The new limited term contract must be converted to one of the six (6) permanent plans by the end of the term period expiring after the insured's 50th birthday, or Sept. 1, 1960, whichever is later.

Veterans Administration regulations permit term policyholders to convert as little as \$1000.00 the first time and then any amount they wish thereafter, in multiples of \$5000.00 — It's a good deal!

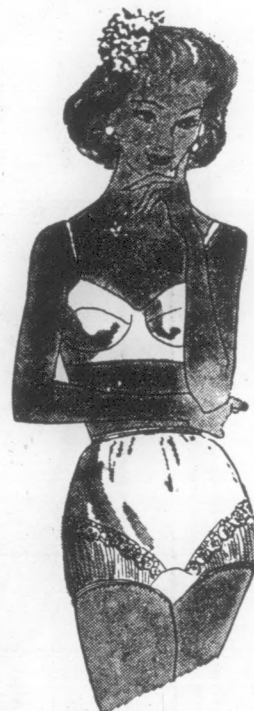

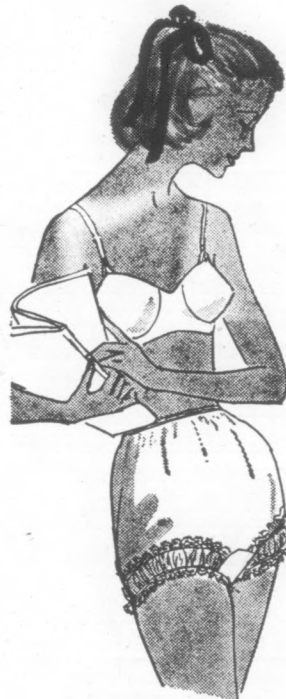
