Classwork Underway In Schools

Classwork got underway this week at Benton High School. A total of 185 students are enrolled in the high school, and 545 pupils in the graded school for a grand total of 730. Benton school as well as all the county schools will be dismissed for Labor Day next Monday.

A total of 2914 students have enrolled in the schools of Marshall County this year. This is an increase of 167 students over last year. There are 727 students enrolled in North and South Marshall High Schools. Most of the increased enrollment in the elementary schools was at Calvert City, Hardin, Sharpe and Gilbertville. The Board has employed six additional teachers to take care of the increased enrollment.

North and South Marshall High Schools have expanded their programs this year to include trigonometry, solid geometry, French, band and additional classes in music.

French will be offered to the seventh and eighth grade students at Sharpe, Calvert City, Hardin and Brewers.

Samuel Orr has been employed as band director for Marshall County Schools. Mr. Orr taught music in Silver Springs, New Mexico, last year. He is a native of South Carolina and a graduate of Murry State College.

Fiscal Court Writes Letter On Commission Proposal

Marshall Countians will vote Nov. 3 on whether they want to change from the magisterial to the commission form of government.

A petition was filed last Saturday with County Judge Artelle Halton requesting a vote on the proposal. The petition was signed by 190 citizens of the county. Legally, the petition needed only 100 signatures.

After the petition was filed, it became mandatory for Judge Halton to certify the proposal for the Nov. 3 election ballots. The petition was filed by A. Joe Asher, local attorney, who acted as spokesman for the group seeking the change in government.

The commission form of government calls for a body of three commissioners and the county judge to operate affairs of the county. Each commissioner would draw a minimum salary of \$1,800 a year. Maximum salary for a commissioner would be \$2,800 a year.

Under the commission form of government, the county would be divided into three districts and each district would have as nearly the same population as the other district. Candidates would file from each district, but the entire county would vote on each candidate. In other words, each district would not elect its own commissioner to serve ONLY that district. All of the voters in the county would ballot on each candidate for the commission.

Under the present magisterial form of government, Marshall County is divided into five districts. And there are five magistrates, each man serving ONLY his own district. Each man also is elected solely by voters in his own district.

We think the Pugh Schoolhouse Road and the Griggs Schoolhouse Roads are important ones. And that the Palma Cut-off from Palma to North Marshall is important.

We have been led to believe that the people along the Palma-Tatumsville Road and the Lakeview Baptist Church Road consider their roads important.

People on the Dykes Barn Road and the Brisenburg Tatumsville Road thought their roads important enough to seek a survey of them. We sympathize with their views.

We think the Charley Franklin-Herbert Noles Road, the Clay Pit Road, and the Oak Valley Church Road are important to the people who live on them.

We would not wish to tell the people of the Hamlet-Olive Road that they are not entitled to the survey and grading and draining of their road as they now wish it.

The people on the Maple Springs Road which recently has been paved consider their road important and we believe they still consider it so.

We do not consider the Olive-Mouth-of-the-Creek Road relatively unimportant. We believe the people there would disagree with anyone who said it was.

The Union Ridge Road has a Masonic Lodge, a grade school, a Baptist Church, a Methodist Church, a cemetery, and 25 houses located within 12 miles of each other; we consider that road an important one and it has been paved.

Is the Old Unity Schoolhouse Road and the Glen Rudolph-Frank Thorn Road relatively unimportant? Tell the congregation of the Union Hill Church of Christ that their road should not have been paved? not us.

We doubt that you know where the Staples Road is, but everyone who lives on it considers it important.

The people who live on the Solon Hendricks-Calloway County Line Road and who are anxious to give the right-of-way in order to have their road improved consider it very important.

The people on the Hale Springs-Vanzora Church-Oak Level Road thing it is important and have expressed themselves to this Court as considering it to be important; we do not have the courage to disagree with them.

We consider the Riley Road, the Tom Canup Road, and the south end of the Slickback Road to be important roads because the people who reside on those roads and use them daily consider them as such.

One of the oldest roads in the county is the road from Highway 80 to Smith and Overbey's Store, which road is also known as the Old Wadesboro Road, and it is important to the people who live along that road that it has been recently improved and paved.

Will you tell the people on the Corbett Tucker Road which leads from Hardin to Wadesboro that their road is relatively unimportant?

We do not have the courage to tell the people on the John Smith Road, the Tom Jones Road, and the Houser Store Road that their roads are relatively unimportant.

From the early history of Marshall County, the people along the Oak Level Road have considered their road very important. If you think it is not, you tell them so.

We gather from your statement that you do not consider the Middle Fork Road and the Edmond Sield Road to be important. The people who live on those roads would, we believe, disagree with you.

We cannot tell the Benton Board of Education and the

These magistrates and the county judge form what we know as Fiscal Court and this body operates the affairs of Marshall County.

Under a new law, each magistrate now is empowered to try certain cases of law violations. And the pay of each magistrate has been raised, effective Aug. 1, to \$100 per month. Previous pay was \$60 per month. That was before magistrates were requested to try cases of law.

Fiscal Court held a session Monday morning at the courthouse and discussed the proposed change in government. Newspapers were invited to attend the session.

Fiscal Court members prepared a statement in regard to the change of government and gave the statement to the newspapers. Here is that statement in full:

Mr. A. Joe Asher
Benton, Kentucky
Dear Mr. Asher:
We note with interest an article appearing in the August 30th issue of the Paducah Sun-Democrat in which you are quoted as follows:
"Asher said some of the agitation for changing the form of government stemmed from a strong, widespread belief that too much money was being spent on RELATIVELY UNIMPORTANT roads which would help while roads which would help the county grow industrially were being neglected or going unimproved."
You presume to speak for the group seeking a change in government in our county, your answer is directed to you. You have stated that this Court has spent money upon relatively unimportant roads; the people who live on the Lackey Road consider it important. So do we.

It has never occurred to us that the Old Calvert City Road is unimportant. No one would like to tell the good people on the Mt. Moriah Road that their road should not have been paved. It seems to us that the Sharpe Schoolhouse Road which serves the Sharpe Graded School and which has recently been paved is an important road.

It is our opinion that the people who live on the Little Cypress Road and the Old Paducah and Calvert City Road consider their roads important; and we agree.

When we improved the Worm Ranch Road, we graded and drained it, we thought it to be important to those people. The Bottom Road leading from Scale to Sharpe is important to those people who live along it.

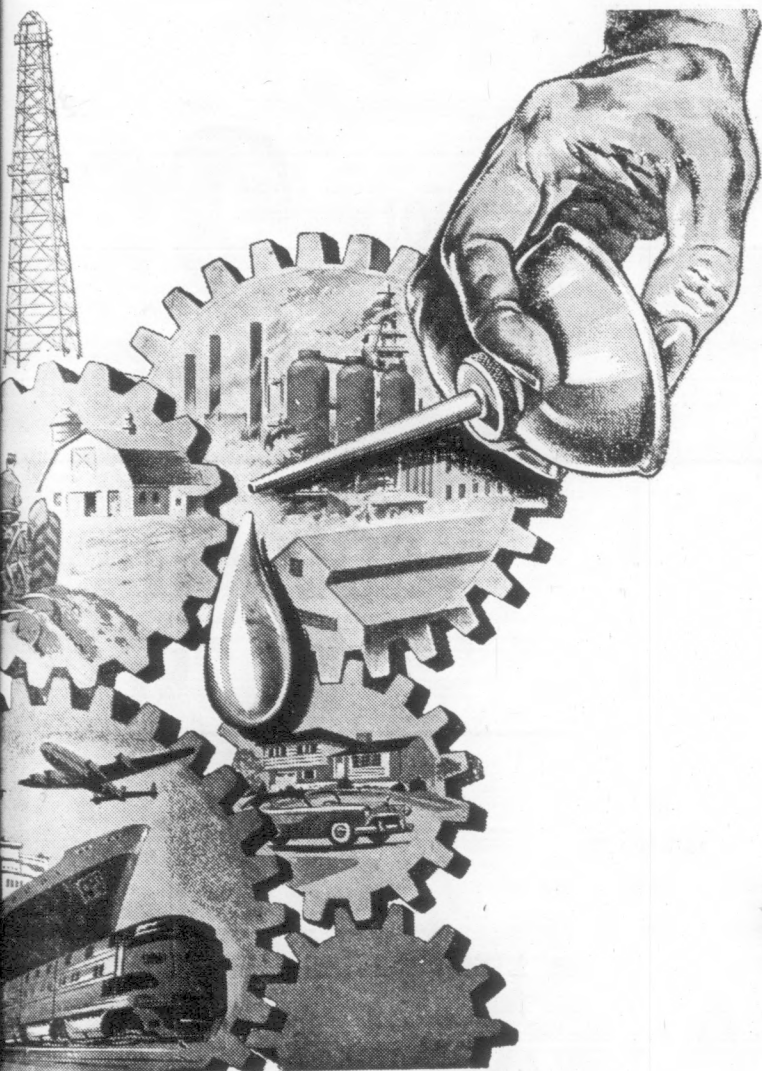

The Farm FRONT

It is good to be back with you after an absence of about a month. Many things happen in a short time. We have good rains for high crop yields and soil moisture is excellent for fall seeding.

Brucellosis testing of cattle has made nice progress. Most of districts 4 and 5 have been completed. Some work has been done in district 2. Your cooperation has been appreciated. This can mean much to our county. All cattle of the county are to be tested to be able to certify our county. This disease cost cattle-men millions of dollars. Let us all cooperate for a greater cattle industry in the county.

The area feeder calf sale will

be held in Livingston County Oct. 7. Any producer of quality calves in the county is eligible to sell calves in the sale. However, you must make application and the cattle must be inspected. If you are interested, contact your county agent now.

Another feeder pig sale will be held Oct. 21. Prices of hogs have dropped. However, there should

be good demand for feeder pigs. Pigs should weigh 30 to 100 pounds. If you are interested let me know. The more pigs we have consigned the better buyers we should get.

Continued rains and high humidity make it difficult to cure burley without artificial heat. Don't let your tobacco crop burn in the barn. You

lose quality and weight. A few dollars spent for Cope could save your crop. Don't let it rot.

Now is the proper time to seed oats barley, rye, crimson clover, vetch, grasses and legumes. Proper seeding dates are important. Crops should be seeded early enough to get a good start before winter begins.

Have you made plans for stor-

ing corn that would normally be sold in the fall? There may be some advantage in storing provided you have the facilities. The low price is about 1.16. Get the greatest return possible from your crops.

Seed blue grass on your lawn this month. On an established lawn use 1/2 pound of seed per 1000 square feet. Don not fertilize

until November.

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

When that feller Tommy Manville got married the ninth time he was quoted as saying it was a victory for hope over experience. That's the way I feel about ole Khrushchev coming to visit us. I'm hoping but I ain't expecting much.

I recall once when they claimed they was growing corn on the cob in bunches. Why they didn't claim it was already buttered, I'll never know.

Then they fixed up a 14-volume history proving they won World War II all by themselves. I went along with that, hoping they'd rest on their laurels fer 50 year.

When they come up with a two-headed cabbage I didn't say a word, and when they claimed a feller Mozhaisky built the first airplane in 1885 and kept it in the air 26 minute, I didn't argue. They said it was in the Russian archives, which was also invented by the Russians.

As long as they're just talking they ain't hurting nothing.

One reporter summed up this visit as a opportunity to git Khrushchev cured of his "gross ignorance" about America. I figger "gross" ignorance is 144 times worse than plain ignorance, so I hecken we got our job cut out fer us while he is here.

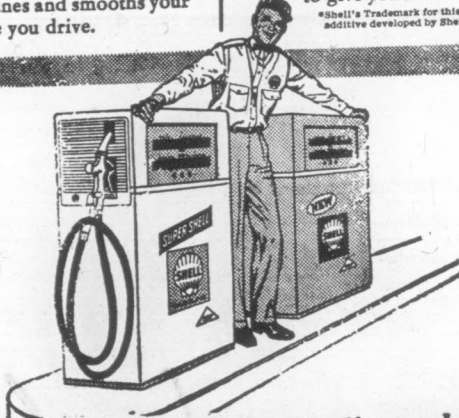

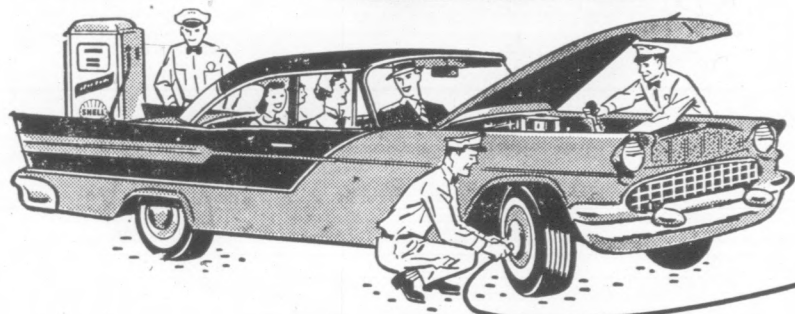

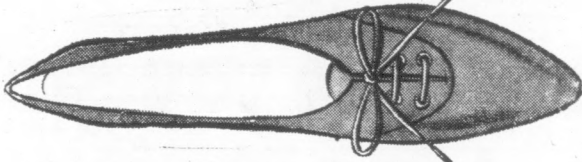

Shorter Duck Season Scheduled This Year

A shorter duck season with a bag limit of four and a possession limit of eight after two or more days of hunting has been announced for Kentucky hunters.

Kentucky had a choice, under the framework of the waterfowl seasons as set up by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, of a 40-day season with the same bag and possession limits of last year or a 50-day season with a reduction of the bag limit to three per

day and a possession limit of six after two or more days of hunting. The shorter season was decided on after Kentucky hunters and the wildlife commissioners expressed their desire for such a season.

One of the main factors in deciding on the shorter season was the fact that usually warm weather prevails in the late days of November and for that reason few ducks are on Kentucky waters, and duck hunting is not good. It is the general opinion that had the longer season with the smaller bag limit been agreed on, duck hunters would have been penalized. Hunting dates for the Ballard County Waterfowl Management Area have not been announced.

The season this year will open at noon on Nov. 30 and continue through Jan. 8. Shooting hours for all days other than the first will be from sunrise to sunset, and the bag and possession limit may include one woodcock and one hooded merganser and one either of the canvasback, ruddy duck or red head. The season for coots is the same as for ducks and the bag and possession limits also are four and eight.

The goose season this year will open on Oct. 31 and con-

tinue 70 days through Jan. 8. The bag and possession limit also is unchanged this year, five per day or in possession which may not include more than two Canadas or two whitefronted, or one of each.

The squirrel season opens Aug. 29 and will continue through the dove season opened Sept. 1 and continue through Nov. 4 with half day hunting only.

Marshall County Board of Education, which operate 39 school busses on the roads of our county to transport children of all ages to and from their classrooms, that the roads over which

the busses travel are relatively unimportant. Mr. Asher, all of the above named roads, in addition to others, have been worked on, repaired, or in the process of being surveyed, since January 6, 1958 and all the work has been done with either the 2c gasoline tax money or with state and county

tax money. Every time representatives of industry have appeared before us we have heard them and attempted to understand their problems and in almost every instance their requests have been granted. However, we do not believe that the roads which serve as school bus routes, mail routes, and farm to market roads for the citizens of Marshall County are of any less importance than the roads which serve industries.

It is our belief that the people of our county should have an opportunity to vote on this issue. But we further believe that they should be told the truth so that they may be better able to choose the form of government which will best serve their interests.

When all the people on the above named roads, and the people on other roads who have

dreams of improving them, learn the truth of what will happen to them under the system you propose, we do not believe they will be willing to vote for such a change.
