In defense of the magisterial form of government Mr. Prince said in effect that any of the services which could be offered by the commission form of government could be provided under the existing magisterial form of government.

Mr. Lents agreed but said in effect that only under a commission form of government would we have a unified, progressive county government — that magistrates are elected by and represent only their individual districts whereas commissioners would be elected by and represent wholly all of the people of Marshall County.

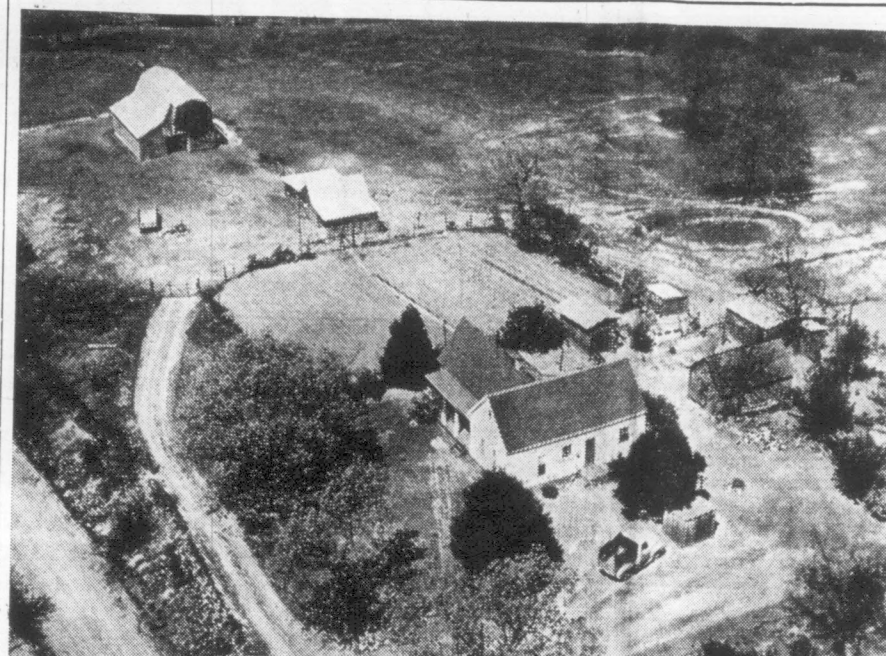

The young men were Ray Henderson Jr., of Alto Route 1 and Vernon Lee Jones of Charleston, Mo. They were buddies in the Army.

They were arrested by State Trooper Thurteill and Sowell, who said the two men were driving 85 to 100 miles per hour along the highway. Each was driving a white 1959 Ford convertible.

Later, the two young men were charged with assault and battery against Reggie Cathey, operator of the 4-Way Cafe at Hardin. Cathey reported he was beaten after the men accused him of reporting their car-racing to officers. Cathey said he didn't report the racers, and his statement was confirmed by the state troopers.

After the fight at the 4-Way Cafe, an alarm was broadcast for the arrest of the pair and they were picked up by State Police near Cairo. ## Young Man Seeks Protection of 4th, 5th Amendments

A young man in his 20s appeared before City Judge Harvey Riley on a charge of driving a car without a proper muffler, without driver licenses on his person and failure to appear at a previous hearing.

The young man brought a duplicate drivers license to court. Judge Riley said he would drop the charges of not having a driver's license and of failing to appear for a previous hearing, and then assessed a fine of \$5 on the muffler charge.

Whereupon the young man said he believed he would plead "the 4th and 5th amendments."

It was explained to him that the 4th amendment protects a citizen from search and seizure, and that the 5th Amendment protects a witness from incriminating himself.

So the young man, who apparently had been hearing a lot about the 5th Amendment but did not know exactly how to use it, decided he would pay the \$5 fine on the muffler charge.

# DISEASE

Most household insects travel between likely sources of human disease germs (such as privies, sewers, and garbage) and food destined for human consumption.

They carry disease germs on their feet, body hairs, mouth-parts and in the contents of their intestinal tracts. Human diseases transmitted mechanically by household insects include TYPHOID, BACILLARY DYSENTERY, AMEBIC DYSENTERY, DIARRHEAS, CHOLERA, RAT TAPEWORM, DEWARF TAPE- WORM and TULAREMIA.

BIOLOGICAL TRANSMISSION OF DISEASE

In some cases the insect plays an essential part in the life cycle of the parasite and biological transmission occurs. Human disease transmitted biologically by household insects include PLAQUE, MURINE TYPHUS, RICKETTSIALPOX, RELAPSING FEVER, CHAGAS DISEASE and DOG TAPEWORM.

COCKROACHES

Cockroaches are ancient creatures which were probably the most abundant of all insects seventy or eighty million years ago. They have adapted themselves to the abode of man and are potential vectors of disease. They are becoming a more difficult problem in our homes and restaurants. Cockroaches have been reported nibbling on the eyelashes, finger nails and toe nails of sleeping children. They impart an unsavory odor and taste into food they infest.

They carry the organisms causing enteric diseases from sewers and garbage cans to the food of man. The American cockroach (waterbug) is especially dangerous. Many disease organisms remain viable when passed through their digestive tracts and others may be transported on their mouth-parts, legs and bodies. Cholera and salmonellosis appear to be the most common disease transmitted in this way. Cockroaches are thought to be possible vectors of leprosy and have been considered vectors of poliomyelitis.
