FARM BUREAU AGAIN SETS RECORD IN DRIVE

The Fulton Chamber of Commerce held its regular meeting on Monday night in the Rainbow Room with approximately twenty-five present. A report was made by Ford Lansen on plans for a Sequi-Centennial celebration to be held next spring, marking the 150th anniversary of the state of Kentucky. Fulton has been asked to participate with Mayfield, Paducah, Princeton and Murray in presenting a pageant, with each town being responsible for a portion of the program and a share in the expenses. Officials at Murray State Teachers College have proposed that the school furnish the cast and the costumes. One day will be given over to each town. Members of the Chamber of Commerce voted to endorse this movement.

B. A. Ross stated that the Farm Bureau wished to secure an assistant county agent for Fulton county and asked for the support of this group, which was promptly given.

J. O. Lewis, superintendent of City Schools, reported that work is going along nicely on clearing the fairgrounds property. He stated that some of the lumber, salvaged from old buildings on this property, is being used to build temporary class rooms in the Science Hall. He also stated that work of tearing down old Carr Institute building would begin the first of November. Mr. Lewis urged that anyone knowing of WPA laborers who would be eligible for this work should notify the laborers of the need for more men.

Blue Ribbon Students To March October 29

The annual Obion County Blue Ribbon day parade and program will be held Wednesday, October 29, in Union City. Some 1,200 children of the first four grades from the twenty-two white and seven colored schools of the county will march presenting a very colorful appearance. Eight bands have been invited to participate in the parade.

Three prizes will be awarded to winning floats in each of the following classes: Class A, high school centers; Class B, three and four teacher school; Class C, one and two-teacher schools; and two prizes will be awarded to floats in the Class D colored schools.

The parade will begin at one o'clock. This event is sponsored by the American Legion.

QUARTET CONCERT TO BE HELD HERE NOV. 10

A quartet concert, sponsored by J. Wesley Richardson, will be held at the Science Hall on Monday night, November 10, featuring the Daniel Quartet of WSM, Nashville. In connection with this program, a quartet contest will be held for talent in this vicinity.

This is an annual event which was started last year when the featured singers were the Dixie Four Quartet of WMC, Memphis. This was a very successful affair last year and it is believed that an even better program has been arranged for the second year.

The Daniel Quartet is a very popular group heard daily at 6:15 a. m. over WSM. These singers present concert programs over an area ranging from Detroit to points in northern Florida.

Part of the proceeds will go to the school. The public is cordially invited to attend this program.

FARLOW IS SPEAKER AT ROTARY CLUB

Paul Farlow, agricultural agent for the Illinois Central System, was the guest speaker at the Rotary Club meeting Tuesday and made an interesting talk on the work of the railroad company along its Southern lines. Mr. Farlow stated that he had been agricultural agent for twenty-one years and had seen more progress in dairying in the past few years than ever before, since there was formerly more good dairy cattle than good pasture, and now there is more good pasture than cattle with plenty of room for expansion.

Mr. Farlow stated that the company is now placing Montana sheep in Kentucky and fourteen cars have already been brought into the territory between Fulton and Louisville.

He also stated that Kentucky is now second in the practice of liming soil. The state has climbed from twenty-eighth place in ten years and is now headed only by Illinois. In comparison of acres cultivated Kentucky uses twice as much limestone as Illinois.

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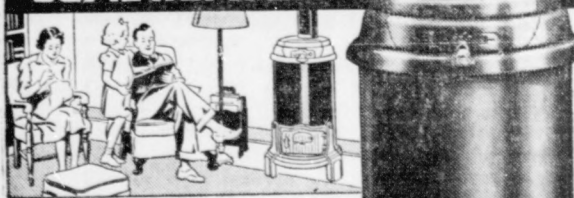
