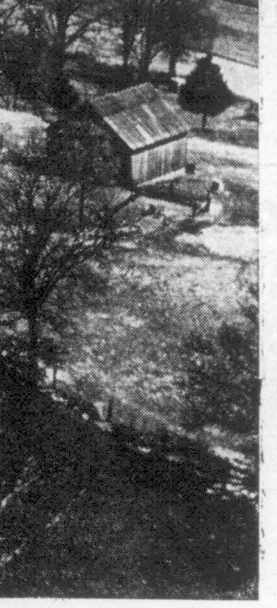

Starbrite Is Moving To Illinois

Starbrite Industries apparently will not operate a luminaire chair factory in Benton this winter.

As a matter of fact, the company has moved much of its major machinery out of the Benton factory building and taken it to Granite City, Ill., which is across the river from St. Louis.

Starbrite's parent company, the Ashby Metal Forming Co., operates a factory in St. Louis.

Rumors here say that Starbrite already has signed a three-year contract with union labor in Granite City, and will operate its chair factory there. But there has been no public announcement here to that effect.

The company's lease on the Benton factory building has about five more years to run, but what the company intends to do with the property is not known here. There are reports that the company may try to sub-let the Benton property.

The rent is being paid regularly to the property owners—the Bank of Benton and the estate of the late Floyd Roberts.

Starbrite employed about 200 persons during peak production periods during its two-year stay in Benton.

Swim Pool Will Be Built In City Park
