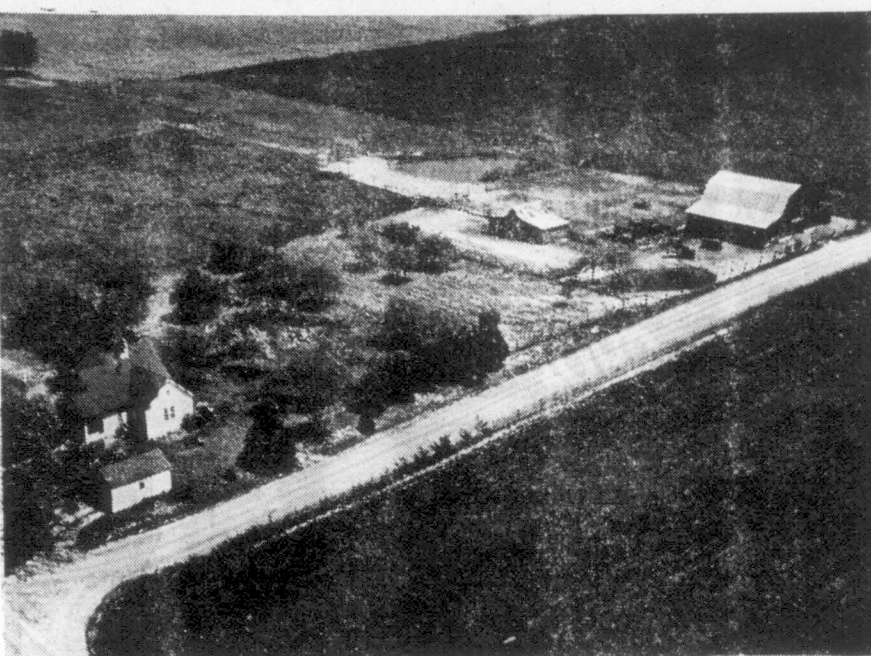

Pairings Made for Tournaments

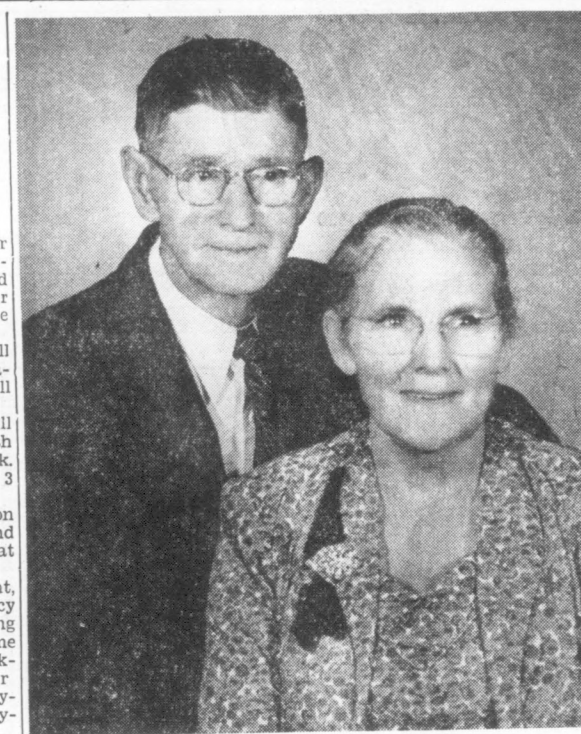

Postal authorities in Washington estimate the current Christmas mail on a nationwide basis will be the highest on record both for greeting cards and parcels. Postmaster Mattie L. Riley announced today.

There conclusions are based on samplings of postal receipts made in several major cities across the country which show anticipated increases of 2 to 5 per cent over last year.

Postmaster Riley called attention to the recent action of the Civil Aeronautics Board which approved Postmaster General Summerfield's plan to make use of surplus space on commercial planes to speed the movement by air of first class mail during the Christmas rush.

Local mailing conditions, Postmaster Riley stated, show an anticipated increase through the Benton office of some 8 per cent. The Post Office Department once again plans to deliver all Christmas mail prior to Christmas day as it has for the past several seasons. Postmaster Riley noted, urging mailers to co-operate with the Post Office Department by mailing Christmas cards and packages early and often.
