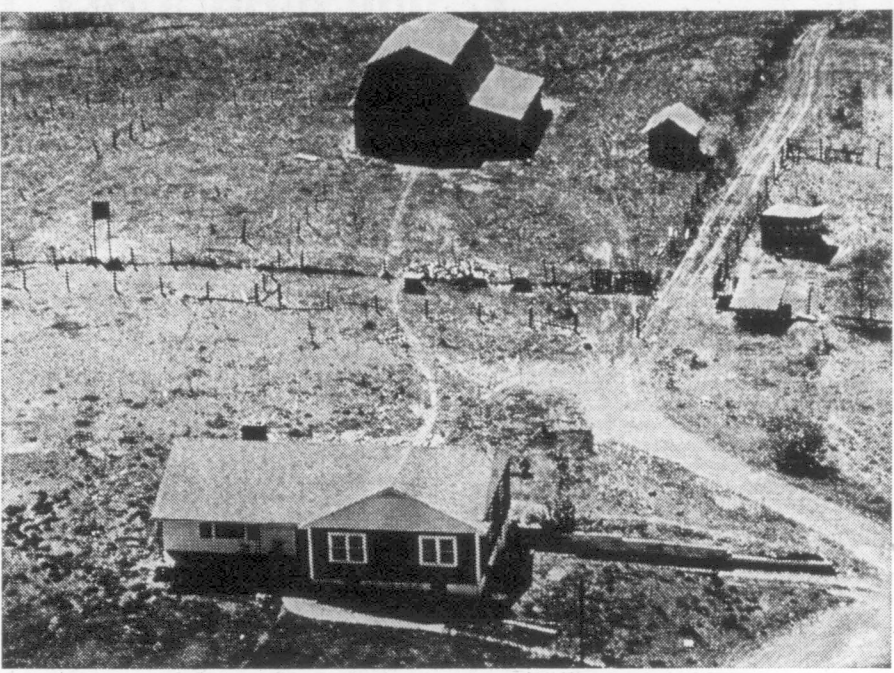

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ASC News & Facts

BY ROBERT RUDOLPH

The time to sign up again in the Agricultural Conservation Program, says Renée Rudolph, Chairman of the Marshall County ASC Committee. Farmers of Marshall County have an opportunity again to cooperate with the farmers of other counties and states in strengthening the Nation by improving the country's ability to produce food and fiber. He said that the following conservation practices have been approved for Marshall County for 1960:

A-1 — Establishing a permanent vegetative cover of grasses and legumes. This practice requires soil test, and is for land which should be established in permanent cover to protect against erosion.

A-2 — Establishing additional acres of cover in crop rotation to slow down erosion and improve soil structure. Reduction of tillage crops will be considered in approving this practice. Soil test is required.

A-3 — Initial treatment of farmland with liming materials or rock phosphate. Soil tests required.

A-4 — Initial establishment of contour strip cropping to prevent erosion.

A-5 — Initial establishment of stand of trees on farmland for forestry purposes. Planting must be protected from fire and grazing.

A-6 — Initial establishment of a stand of trees on farmland to prevent erosion. Plantings must be protected from fire and grazing.

B-1 — Improvement of establishment of vegetative cover for soil or watershed protection. Soil test required.

B-2 — Constructing wells for livestock water. Wells must be at locations which will bring about desired protection of vegetative cover and proper distribution of livestock, rotation grazing and farmstead management.

B-3 — Developing springs for livestock water similar to well practice.

B-4 — Constructing or enlarging dams, pits or ponds for livestock water to protect vegetation cover or make practical use of land for vegetative cover.

B-5 — Installing pipelines and permanent water storage facilities for livestock water, distributed to various fields from existing ponds, springs or wells.

B-6 — Improvement of stand of forest trees including timber stand improvement, erosion control and fire prevention.

C-1 — Establishment of sod waterway to remove excess water without causing erosion. Cost-share based on size of waterway on sq. ft. basis.

C-2 — Establishment of permanent vegetation to stabilize and protect water impounding dams, gulches and field borders,

according to county specifications.

C-4 — Constructing terraces to detain or control flow of water and check soil erosion.

C-5 — Constructing diversion channels to divert excess water to protected outlets.

C-6 — Construction or enlarging permanent open drainage ditches for which proper outlets are provided, includes earth moving and clearing minimum width right of way.

D-1 — Establishment of vegetative cover from winter protection from erosion. Minimum fertilizer required according to specifications, except on tobacco land. Lime will be applied under A-4 practice.

E-1 — Initial establishment of contour farming operations on non-terraced land to protect soil from erosion where slope is 2 to 12%, and is to be grown in row crops.

F-1 — Control of Johnson Grass. Cost-share approved on acreage inspection of County Committee representative, by summer fallow or chemical means or both.

The 1960 Program is open to all farmers, and any farmer of Marshall County who would like to use the ACP to help conserve the soil on his farm and improve the productivity of his land should contact his local ASC committeeman or call at the county ASC office.

Apple Magic

Apples are plentiful this year, writes a reader who is a tree salesman. Everyone knows some apple desserts. Here are some other uses for this healthful fruit.

HAM APPLE PIE is an excellent main dish. Use center slices of ham cut 1/4 inch thick. Cut in serving pieces. Peel and slice 4 or 5 tart apples. Place layer of ham in baking dish, cover with apple slices, sprinkle with brown sugar. Repeat layers, ending with a layer of apples. Sprinkle lemon juice over the top, using juice of 1/2 a lemon. Cover dish. Bake in moderate oven 45 minutes. Keep dish covered until apples begin to cook. Then remove cover to brown apples and let juice cook down.

Add ground breadcrumbs to apple sauce and serve with roast pork.

BARBECUED APPLES are delicious with pork and other meats. Core apples without cutting through the bottom. Fill hollow of each apple with mixture of finely chopped seedless raisins and nuts, packing the mixture in firmly. Place apples in a baking dish. In a saucepan, melt 1/2 cup butter or margarine. Add 2 Tbsp. brown sugar, 1 up. Lea & Perrins Worcestershire sauce, and the juice of 1 lemon to the melted butter and stir until thoroughly blended. Spoon the mixture over the apples. Bake in moderate (350°) oven until tender.

FARMERS MUST PAY SOCIAL SECURITY TAX

Any farmer who pays a farm-worker \$150 or more in cash wages in a year is required by law to pay a social security tax on these wages. The farm employer is also required to make reports on farmhands who work on 20 or more days in a year

for cash wages figured on a time basis regardless of how much the wages were.

Reports are due for agricultural wages on January 31, of each year. For example, if a farmhand was paid \$150 in June, 1959, his employer must report these wages by January 31, 1960, to the Director of Internal Revenue.
