Durant Is Blanche Lamont's Murderer.

SO THE JURY DECLARES.

Special to the New Era. St. Francis, Nov. 2.—Theodore Durant, Assistant Superintendent of Emanuel Church Sunday-school, was today convicted of the murder of Blanche Lamont, after he had been on trial since July 22 last. The jury was out twenty minutes, and arrived at the verdict on the first ballot. As there was no recommendation of mercy, the punishment was fixed at death.

As the last words of the verdict were uttered Durant made a spasmodic effort to arise to his feet, but before he could do so he was seized by a half-dozen half-women, threw him around his neck and sunk back into his chair. His mother's grief seemed to make Durant forget his own position, and for the next few minutes he sat with his arms around her neck, sobbing and crying.

Durant received his old time comrade as soon as he left his mother and proceeded to return to the county jail. With his overcoat around his neck, he walked leisurely out of the room, twirling his slight moustache with apparently as little concern as if he were merely a spectator instead of the principal figure in the exciting scene.
