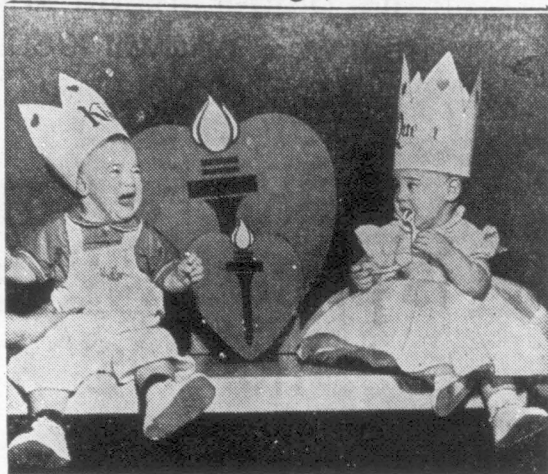

ASC News & Facts

Chairman William O. Gilreath of the Kentucky Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee reminds wool growers that the marketing year for purposes of the 1959 wool program will end March 31.

The wool program is conducted under the National Wool Act of 1954. Payments under the 1959 program will be made this summer when payment rates are determined on the basis of the national average price received by producers for shorn wool during the 1959 marketing year.

For a completed sale, Gilreath said, title must have passed to the buyer, the wool must have been delivered to the buyer (either physically or through documents), and the last of the factors (price per pound, yield, etc.) needed to determine the total purchase price must be available. If any condition concerning the sale is not settled by March 31, the sale will not be considered as complete.

Applications for payment under the 1959 program must be filed with the county ASC Office not later than April 30.

The amount of 1959-crop corn placed under price support in Kentucky had reached a total of 2,300,000 bushels as of the end of December, W. O. Gilreath said today. This compares with 1,450,000 bushels of 1958-crop corn placed under support as of the same date a year earlier.

Nationally, Gilreath said, there was a seasonal increase in December in the amount of corn placed under support, but all other grains are moving under support in smaller quantities now than they were a year earlier.

Through Dec. 31, farmers throughout the country had put 122 million bushels of corn under price support loans and purchase agreements, a slight increase over the 108.5 million bushels at the same date in 1958. Support on the 1959 crop will continue to be available until May 31, 1960.

The total quantity of 1959-crop wheat under support at the end of the year was 275.7 million bushels—only slightly more than half the amount at the end of 1958. More than 22 million bushels of 1959-crop wheat had been redeemed through loan repayment.

In the case of barley, oats, rye, soybeans, and grain sorghums, quantities of the 1959-crop placed under support through the end of December were sharply below quantities of a year earlier.

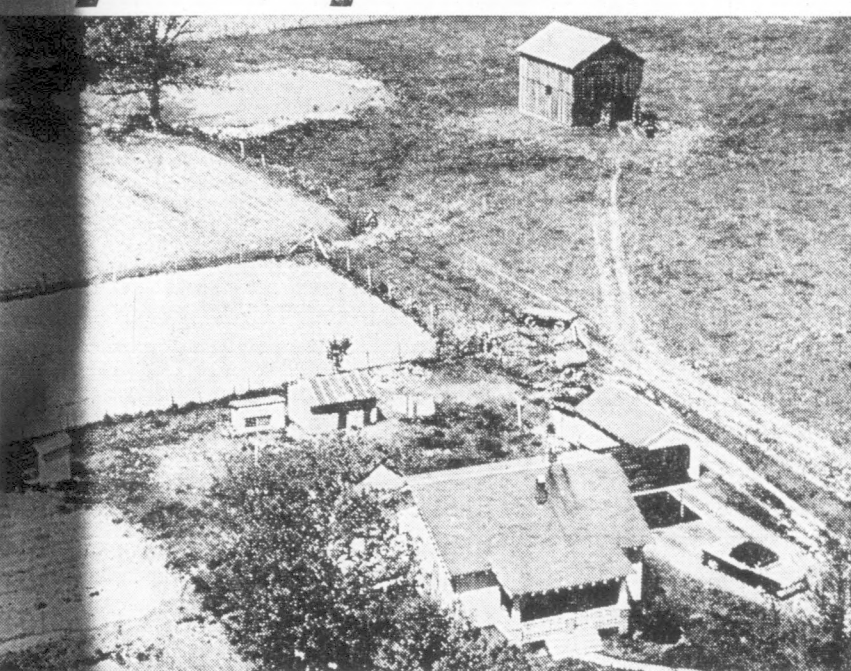
