Marshall County has had a total of from 25 to 30 inches of snow this winter, a record of many years.

EDITOR'S NOTE — If the weatherman should come to trial, we hope he will be convicted and sentenced to remain in jail until June 21, when summer is scheduled to arrive.

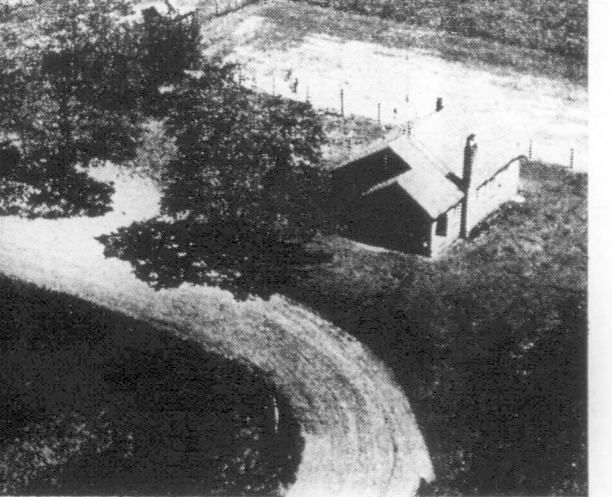

Sightseers Can't Visit Fort Knox Gold Vault

Frankfort—One place in Kentucky — the hospitable state—is noted for its lack of hospitality. This is the United States Bullion Depository at Fort Knox. Almost 12½ billion dollars worth of the nation's gold stock, valued at 19½ billion, is stored there. The regulation forbidding visitors is rigidly enforced.

Every aspect of the two-story granite, steel and concrete building is forbidding to sightseers. And the two-level and concrete vault is a discouragement to casual roaming among the gold bars inside. The vault door weighs 20 tons and its combination is entrusted to no one person.

The vault casing is constructed of steel plates, steel I-beams and steel cylinders laced with hoop hands and encased in concrete. The vault roof is of similar construction and is independent of the Depository roof.

The outer wall of the Depository is of granite, lined with concrete.

In fact, there's not a soft spot in the entire shebang for a weary tourist to rest his feet.

The gold in the depository is in standard mint bars, somewhat smaller than a standard building brick. Each bar contains about 400 troy ounces of gold, worth \$14,000. Avoiding weight is about 27½ pounds. When they are handled, great care is exercised to avoid abrasion of the soft metal.

Outside the structure, at each corner is a guard box. A steel fence bounds the site, at the gate of which are sentry boxes. The building is protected with the most modern devices. A nearby

U. S. Army post gives additional protection.

Have you gotten the polite hint? The Depository, which is under the supervision of the Director of the Mint, is not open for guests.

Johnson Grass Control: The Marshall ASC County Committee, in cooperation with SCS, Extension, Farm Bureau and other interested groups, made a recent survey and determined there are

4,890 acres partially infested with Johnson grass on 300 Marshall County farms, and 625 acres solidly infested on 125 farms. A county Johnson grass control committee was set up, composed of the following: J. Homer Miller, chairman, representing Extension; Morgan Hill, vice-chairman, representing Vocational Agriculture; Roy Vasseur, representing Farm Bureau; Aaron Ivey, Fiscal Court; Woodrow Hill, Soil Improvement Association; Sam Gold, Soil Conservation District; Corbett Tucker, State Highway Department, and A. E. Denham, SCS.

The ASC committee has received notice that requirements have been met and that cost-share may be approved for carrying out control practices on Johnson grass.

Wool Marketing: Year ends March 31: The 1959 wool marketing year, which began on April 1, 1959, ends on March 31, 1960, for the 1959 shorn wool and unshorn lambs program. Applications for payment for all 1959 sales made up to and including March 31, must be filed in the county ASC office within 30 days following the close of the marketing year, or April 30th.

Any sheep producer is eligible to file for these payments. Producers who have not filed for payments on their 1959 sales should bring sales bills for shorn wool and unshorn lambs to the county office and file with application for payment.

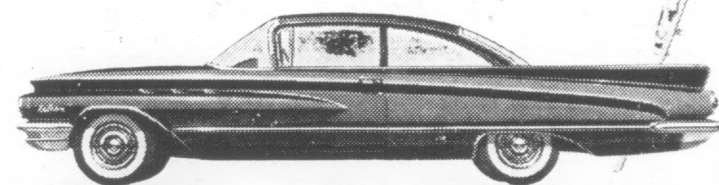

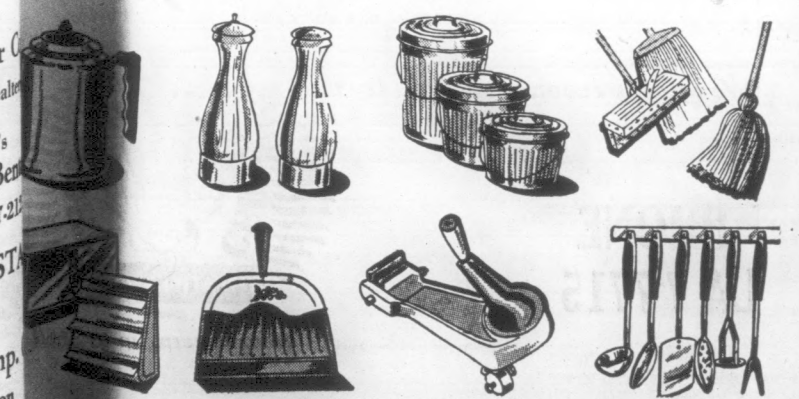

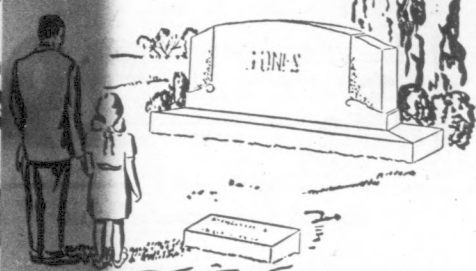

Kentucky's First Wild Turkey Hunt in April

Frankfort—The first wild turkey hunt in modern times will be held in Kentucky on April 27, 28 and 29 this year, or until 50 turkey gobblers are killed, on a designated tract in the Kentucky Woodlands National Wildlife Refuge.

Hunting on the designated tract will be by permit only, with only 200 hunters permitted each day, with "first come" applicants being served first. Also a valid state hunting license must be held by the hunter. Applications for permits will be received by mail or in person at Kentucky Woodlands National Wildlife Refuge office, Route 2, Golden Pond, Ky., two weeks prior to the opening of the season.

A person who has hunted one day will not be permitted a second or third day of hunting unless the total number of hunters for those days is less than 200 and a hunter will be allowed only one gobbler during the entire hunt. There is no cost for the permits which are non-transferable.

Further rules governing the hunt includes: Turkey may be taken with a shotgun no larger than a 12 gauge; a successful hunter may not assist another in obtaining a turkey; no side-arms will be permitted; the use of dogs is barred; no camping or fires permitted; hunters must check in and out of the refuge; hunting will be permitted from daylight until 12 o'clock noon, but check-in time will start at 4:30 a. m. on the day of the hunt.

There was a wave of applause when the great conductor, Dimitri Mitropoulos, took his place in the orchestra. The lights were dimmed and we were transported to a square in Genoa in the 14th century. It was a superb cast,

their costumes stunning, and their effectiveness vastly enhanced by magnificent staging and all of the leading roles in the million dollar cast were sung by Americans.

At the intermission, we went upstairs to the Metropolitan Opera Club where we joined Lauder Greenway, who is chairman of the board and also a cousin of Mrs. F. H. Wright of Lexington. Mr. Greenway gave a large supper party, where I met Lawrence Tibbett, Giovanni and other former operatic stars.

The next act took place in a garden outside of Genoa overlooking the sea. We saw the

council chamber in the Palace, and later these sets were of such authenticity and beauty that we have no words to describe them. At the final curtain, over by the rear of the stage, I read in the paper that "Boccanegra" was one of the season's exciting artistic triumphs you could have been there.

Shipwreck
Lesson for March 20, 1960

These things are against me," said a down-hearted man once. Even that certain day of things are against them. It is more or less. When bad things set in; when people won't take advice; when we see our coming; when we are alone in the midst of things; when we are in jail; when we are in the pole;—we are these things. We seldom think of them as open doors to opportunity.

When we are riding the situation, we are speaking, when we are in the driver's seat and we are every well in hand; when things are happening because we ordered arranged things that way, we are sing that everything is our way. But when the situation is not in hand, when things about the situation is unexpected or unwanted and when God can be said about it, we groan that everything is against us. Nothing is more dangerous than a situation out of hand.

There was a remarkable Christian whose story is told in the book of Acts, who has admitted that everything was against him. He always knew God for him, and that was the point. Situations might get of his hands but not out of God's hands. Consider Paul, one of the prisoners aboard a ship on a grey November day bound across the Mediterranean to the emperor's capital. He had been two years in jail, was then actually shackled with chains, he was probably not in health, he had only one or two friends with him, the crew were all prisoners, soldiers and a pretty rough crowd for a ship. Not only that, but he given good advice (Don't sail in this season is starting), but when turned down. Paul was of Mediterranean hand, he saw the weather signs. But he paid him any mind. Then the storm and the shipwreck. Read all about it in Acts and a narrow squeak.

Man to Big Man
The point is, Paul never spent a minute wishing he were in a better position. He never put in a complaint that all these things were against him. He used the opportunity all these disasters gave him. He did not use it for himself, he used it for others. To be sure, he did not resist saying in effect, "I am a man." But he did not stop at that. He became the most useful and most respected man on the ship. When they started to land, he was the first to get ashore. In every sense, when the ship came he was the big man. For one thing, he brought courage to the others by his own faith. He said language they could not understand. Get something to eat, read. And don't let anybody steal a lifeboat.

Ways A Witness
Paul did preach, though. He was a man to let a chance go by. He preached by his very attitude. He also gave witness in words. He said just why it was that he was so confident. His faith was not in himself nor in the ship's captain. It was in God. Now it is in us that men pray in hurricane. It is news when men in hurricane do not pray mostly for themselves. There is a lovely touch in that Paul said to the other seamen on the stormy deck. The captain of his dream had said to him, "I have granted you all that you ask with you." Paul thinks of the fellow-passengers—even of the crew, everybody—thinks of them as his own because God has them to him. A man who does not ask special favors for himself, a man who, if he is going to be saved, wants others to be saved with him—a man like that gets a hearing when he speaks. God word for the God to whom he belongs and whom he serves.

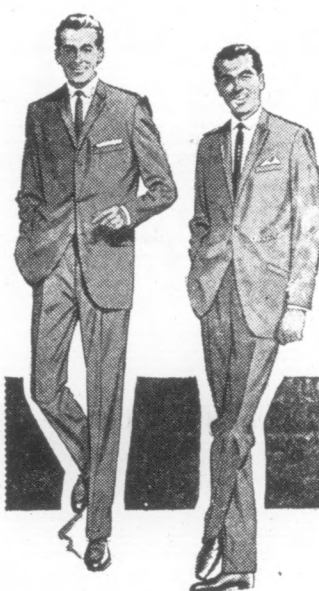
