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Bids Opened For New Calvert and Aurora Schools

Bids were opened and tabulated Wednesday by the Marshall County Board of Education on two new school buildings, one at Calvert City and the other at Aurora.

Charles E. Story was low bidder with a combination bid of \$210,980 for both schools. The

board awarded him a temporary contract for the work.

Hal Perry's combination bid of \$213,000 was second low. Two other bids were received. They were from the Crawford Construction Co., with a bid of \$224,900; and the Seth E. Gien Co., of Memphis, \$230,731.

The proposed new Calvert City Elementary School building will contain approximately 11,000 square feet of floor space and will be modern in every respect. The Aurora building will be an addition to the present school.

Work on the projects will start as soon as feasible.

Fiscal Court met with the Board of Education for the tabulation of the bids. The court voted to issue approximately \$240,000 in revenue bonds to finance the new school buildings. No public approval is required for the issuance of the bonds.

The bonds must be sold, however, before any construction work is started because the bond money will be needed to finance the buildings.

The bids were considered too high by Fiscal Court and School Board members, but they go ahead and try to sell the bonds. If the bonds cannot be sold, the amount involved was not learned.

All of the suits were filed by property owners against the State Highway Department. The court will wind up its work this week and will adjourn. It has been in session since March 14.

ASC News & Facts

BY ROBERT L. RUDOLPH

At a recent meeting of the Marshall County ASC Committee with directors of East and West Fork, Clark's River Watershed Districts, SCD supervisor, extension, SCS, and C. H. Allen, state ACP specialist, plans were worked out on anticipated activities for conservation work in these watersheds in 1960.

These figures will be used by the State ASC Committee in determining how much additional ASP funds can be allocated to Marshall County under Public Law 566.

In making the study, it was found that the ACP program cost-shared about \$35,000 on completing conservation practices in East Fork, Clark's River, about 1959, and the group at the meeting determined that approximately \$40,000 would be cost-shared in 1960. For West

Fork, Clark's River, in Marshall County, approximately \$9,000 was cost-shared in 1959, and the group determined that approximately \$15,000 should be cost-shared in 1960.

The state committee has these plans and it is hoped that additional funds will be allocated by April 15.

Census Supervisor Asks Residents To Mail 'Blue' Forms

E. G. Adams, district supervisor for the 1960 Census of population and housing, has urged area residents who have received "sample" questionnaires to fill out the forms and mail them to the Census district office at Hopkinsville promptly.

The sample questionnaires, printed on blue paper, were left at every fourth household during the first stage of the census. These questionnaires contained the detailed population and housing questions which are asked of a 25 percent sample of the population. By using only a sample of the population, the Census Bureau is able to collect important information about the nation's people at a fraction of a complete canvass.

The success of the Census depends upon the cooperation of local residents in filling out these forms and mailing them promptly, the district supervisor said. He pointed out that all information furnished to the Census Bureau is kept in strict confidence under Federal law and cannot be used for taxation, regulation, or investigation.
