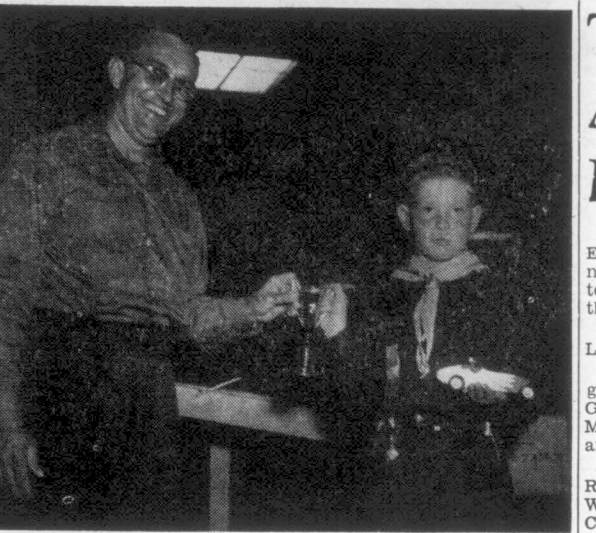

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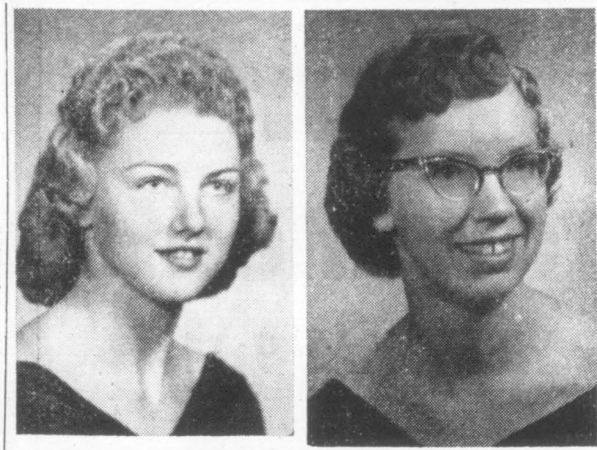

City to Purchase Group Insurance For Its Workers

The Benton Council voted Monday night at its bi-weekly meeting in City Hall to purchase hospitalization insurance for all city employees.

The group insurance plan, which will involve 19 city workers, will be purchased from the BMA Insurance Co. of Kansas City, Mo.

The action marks the first time that the City of Benton has offered such benefits to its employees.

Midnight Curfew

City Council also instructed City Attorney Pal Howard to draw up the necessary legal papers for a 12 o'clock midnight closing time on all places of entertainment in Benton.

The action will include such places as pool halls, skating rinks and other places of entertainment.

Complaints had been made to the Council that a pool hall was being operated all night in Benton. The action to close all entertainment places at midnight resulted from those complaints.

Traffic Action

City Council also voted to purchase from Jackson Jones, who now lives in Tennessee, the small frame lunch stand located at the corner of Poplar and 12th Sts.

Jones operated the stand several years before moving to Tennessee. He will be paid \$100 for the building.

The city will move the building to the city dump, where it will be used as an office by the keeper of the dump.

Councilmen long have contended that the building caused a hazardous traffic condition at the corner of Poplar and 12th, and when Jackson Jones decided to sell it for \$100 the city decided to buy it and move it off the corner.

Mr. Asher, a Benton attorney, is a member of First Missionary Baptist Church, Benton.

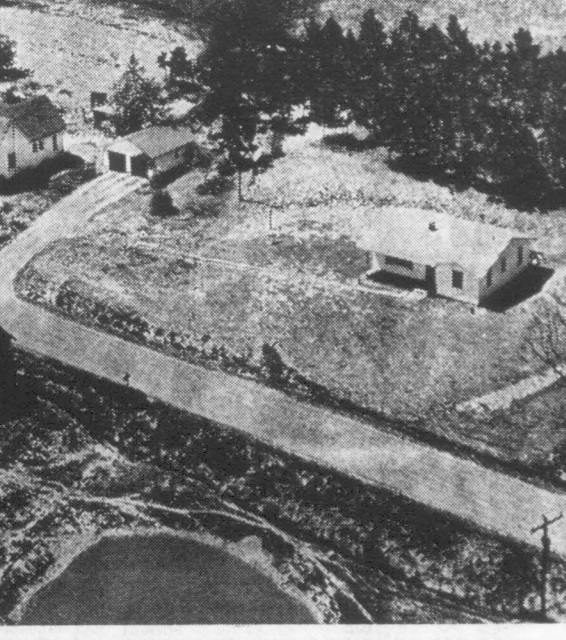

The marriage was solemnized at nine o'clock at the First Christian Church of Brookport with the church minister officiating.

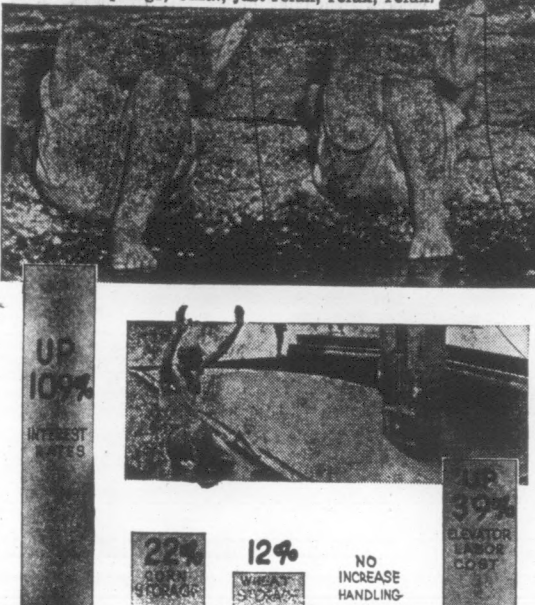

FARM PROFIT



Corn May Be The Cheapest Feed This Year

The farmer who pastures his cattle during spring and summer
to cut the cost of grain should take another look at his feeding plan
this year. In 1960, it may pay to really push corn, milo or other
grains to cattle. With a gradual decline in prices likely during the
year, it will pay to rush feeders for the early market. The savings
from cheap grains on roughage or pasture could be wiped out by
lower markets next fall, according to a Massey-Ferguson research
report on the cattle situation.

Bill Zmolek, Iowa State animal husbandryman observes, "Cheap-
ening the ration with roughage is less important with corn around
\$1 per bushel. Considering the rate of gain, the finish and the
savings in time, corn probably is one of the lowest cost feeds you
can use. We certainly are discouraging long-range programs that
involve a heavy roughage use."

"Feed is relatively cheap while cattle prices still are quite
high," says Lot Taylor, Kansas animal husbandryman. He advises,
"A farmer whose normal program is to get cheap winter gains on
roughage, then go to grass for a full season, should consider push-
ing cattle. He could winter on a higher level and put them direct-
ly into the feed lot at the end of winter."

G. R. Carlisle, Illinois animal husbandryman says, "Low grade
roughage such as corn cobs may have a place during times of high
corn prices or during a shortage of other rations." But with an
abundance of grain, such as we have now, Carlisle believes, "Cheap
roughages better be used as bedding. Best way to fatten cattle on
cobs is to let them sleep on them."

Looking at USDA predictions, it seems probable that 1960 will
see a big increase in marketings of both fed cattle and non-fed
cattle. These increased marketings will put pressure on the market.

Livestock forecasters are predicting some strength in fat cattle
markets this spring. Prices should hold up during most of the sum-
mer, but by fall they are expected to drop 10% to 15% below the
spring high.

Summing it up—this looks like the year to put your sights on
early markets, the report concludes.

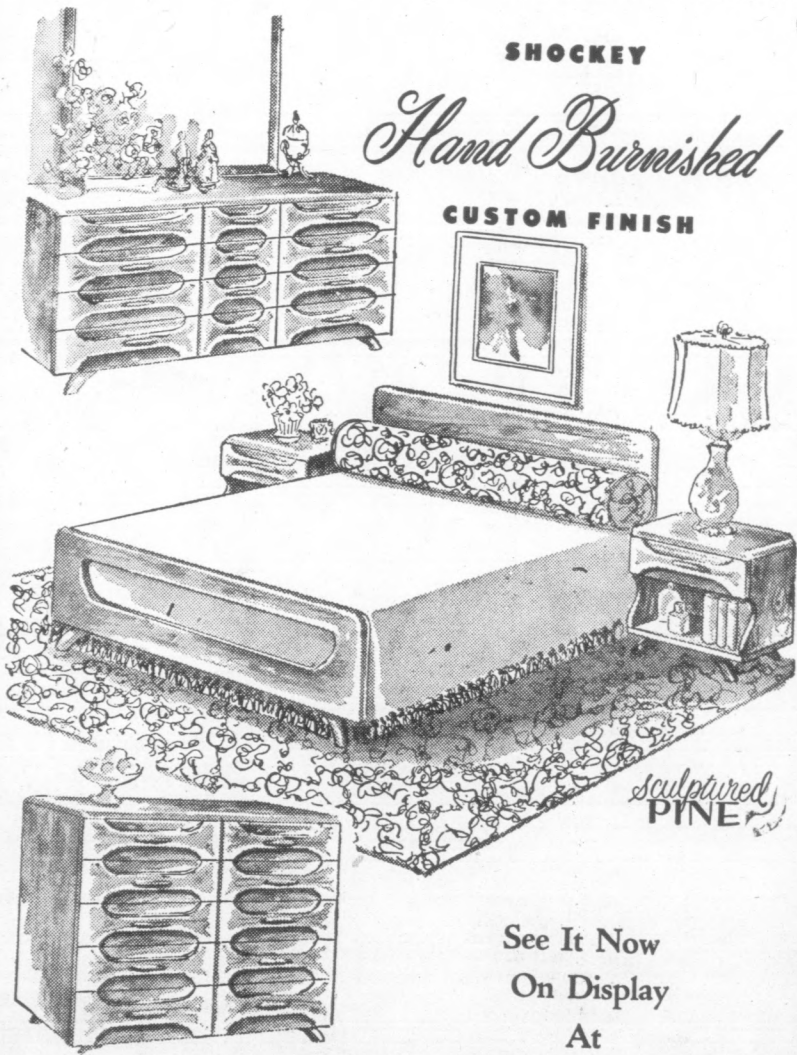

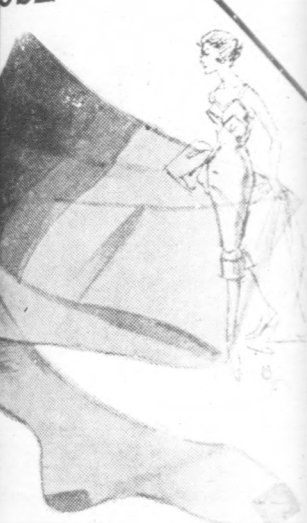
