ASC News & Facts

Farmers in Marshall County who are considering leaving strips of idle or fallow land in an alternate row arrangement with tobacco rows were reminded by Renoe Rudolph, chairman of the County ASC Committee, that the strips of idle or fallow land must be as wide as, or wider, than four normal rows of tobacco to be deducted from the tobacco acreage.

A "normal row" is described by Mr. Rudolph as being at least 36 inches wide or the actual distance between the rows of tobacco on the farm whichever is wider. Mr. Rudolph said that anyone planning to leave idle or fallow strips of ground in the tobacco field should contact the county ASC office before setting tobacco.

Partial rows of tomatoes, beans or other crops within the area of the planted tobacco must be measured as tobacco. However, if there is excess tobacco to be destroyed the tomatoes or other crops may be counted as part of excess.

Wheat Exemption

Several factors affecting wheat producers who have wheat allotments of less than 15 acres for 1960 were called to the attention of farmers by Mr. Rudolph.

The law that authorizes marketing quotas provides that in commercial wheat - producing states as much as 15 acres of wheat may be produced on any farm without being subject to marketing quota penalties. This provision applies to farms with no wheat allotments as well as to farms with wheat acreage allotments of less than 15 acres.

However, wheat on such farms is subject to marketing quota penalties when more than 15 acres of wheat is produced. When the 15-acre limitation is exceeded, the excess bushelage of wheat is determined by multiplying the normal yield for the farm by the number of acres of wheat above the farm allotment.

Mr. Rudolph cited the following as an example: A farmer with a wheat allotment of 12 acres for 1960 produces 20 acres of wheat. The difference between the allotment and the wheat acreage producer - 8 acres - would be considered excess acres. The 8 acres would be used in determining the amount of wheat subject to the marketing quota penalty. However, if the acreage over 15 is disposed of the wheat would not be subject to marketing quotas.

Farmers who have applied for the feed wheat provision under which they may produce as much as 30 acres of wheat for use on the farm are not subject to marketing quota penalties unless they produce more than 30 acres.

The deadline for adjusting wheat acreage into compliance with the farm wheat allotment is June 1, in Marshall County.

Businesses Affected By The State Sales Tax on July 1

A 3 percent statewide sales tax will go into effect in Kentucky July 1. Here are some of the areas in which the new tax will apply:

In general, persons engaged in the business of rendering service are consumers, not retailers, of the tangible property they use incidentally in rendering the service.

The tax, accordingly, applies to sales of the property to them. Examples of this group are banks, advertising agencies, commercial artists, laundries, cleaners, linen services, barbers, beauticians, tire retreaders, taxidermists, shoe repairmen, bootblacks, and the like.

Also regarded as consumers are persons rendering professional services. Examples are lawyers, architects, engineers, and accountants.

Can Become Retailers
If any of those service enterprises regularly sell property to consumers, they also become retailers, and they must obtain State permits and file returns and pay sales taxes on such sales.

Labor and service charges for installing and applying property sold are taxable unless the seller, by separately stating labor and materials on his bill, makes only the property subject to the tax.

Sales taxes will apply to users of coin telephones. These are to be computed to the nearest multiple of 5 cents.

Morticians classified

Morticians and undertakers are classified as consumers of the various items they use. They are primarily engaged in rendering personal services which are not taxable. The sales tax applies at the time they purchase their supplies.

Florists and nurseries must pay sales taxes on their sales of flowers, plants, shrubs, and the like. In the case of telegraphed orders for flowers, the tax applies to the sending florist where both the order and delivery are in Kentucky.

When a Kentucky florist telegraphs a flower order outside the state for delivery to a point out of state, the sending florist is liable for the tax on his receipts from the customer who placed the order.

Flower Orders Regulated

On flower orders to Kentucky

without the state, the receiving florist is not liable for any tax on any receipts from the transaction.

If nurserymen fail to state separately the cost of trees, shrubs, and the like from the most of planting, sales taxes apply to the entire transaction.

The sales or use tax is not applicable to rentals or leases of motion-picture film to theaters or other exhibitors where admissions to the showings are subject to the sales tax.

The sales tax also applies to charges for producing, fabricating, processing, printing, or imprinting tangible personal property for consumers who furnish the materials used, either directly or indirectly.

Printing Business Taxable

The tax applies to virtually all phases of the printing business regardless of whether or not the customer furnishes the materials.

The tax applies to retail sales of signs, show cards, and posters, and to charges for painting such signs whether or not materials are furnished by the painter or customer. The tax does not apply, however, to charges for painting or lettering on real property.

House painters are regarded as consumers and the tax does not apply to their charges, but does apply when they purchase paint.

Repair Rates Given

Persons engaged in the business of painting or finishing tangible personal property are sellers, and must obtain permits and remit sales taxes on their gross receipts from charges for these services.

Repairmen are retailers of parts and materials furnished in connection with repair work where the value of the materials is substantial. Examples would be repairers of automobiles, airplanes, bicycles, machinery, farm implements, musical instruments, radios, television, boats, and furniture.

Repairmen should segregate on their invoices charges for materials and labor to avoid having the sales tax imposed on the whole bill.

Cars Are Exempt

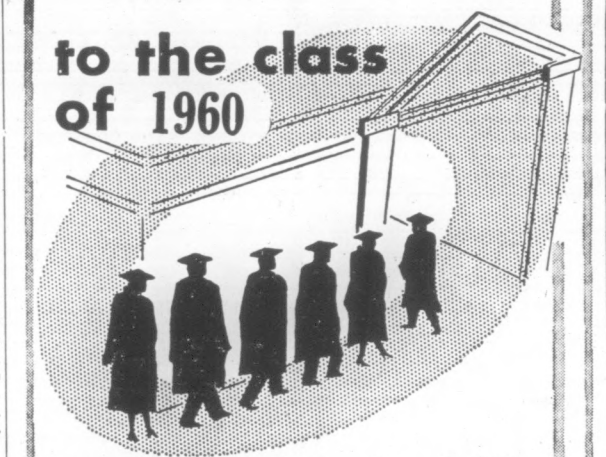
