A large tree in the yard of the Methodist Parsonage at Briensburg was uprooted, as was a large tree in Charles Hatcher yard in Benton.

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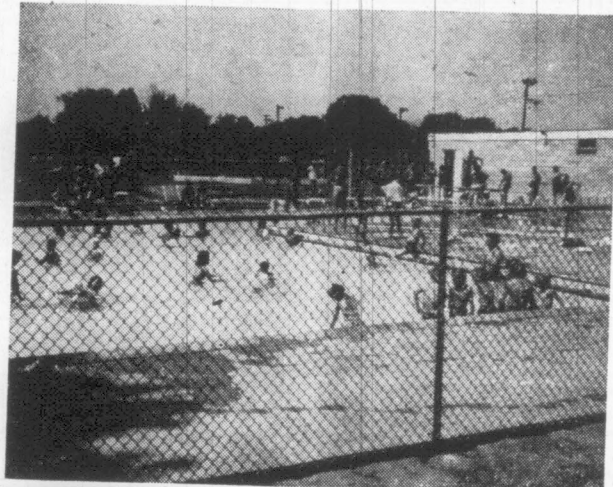
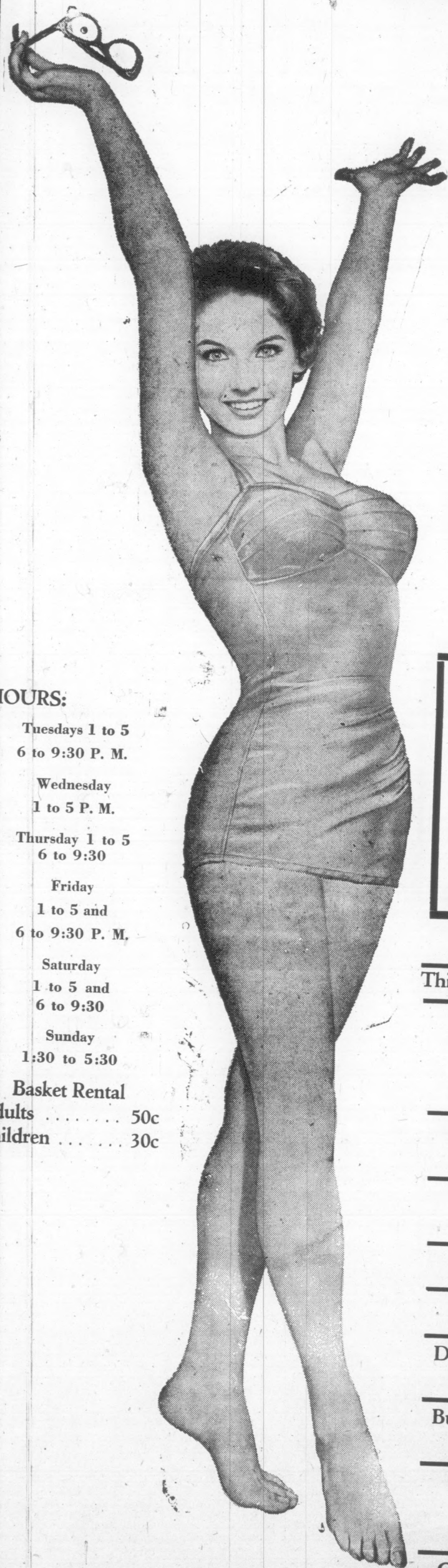

Kentucky Lake Biggest Attraction for TVA

Kentucky has \$12,698,083 of the \$100.6 million total estimated value of recreation improvements on all TVA property.

Marshall County has the highest value of facilities of any county, with \$8,742,223. Other counties included in the estimated value of facilities are Calloway County, \$1,529,950; Lyon County, \$1,067,000; Livingston County, \$880,000; Trigg County, \$478,910.

Kentucky Lake, including the area in Tennessee, values at over a fourth of all the TVA lakes and lake frontage property.

Included in the total \$100.6 million is the value of boats, private cottages, improvements in boat docks and resorts, public parks, club sites, and group camps.

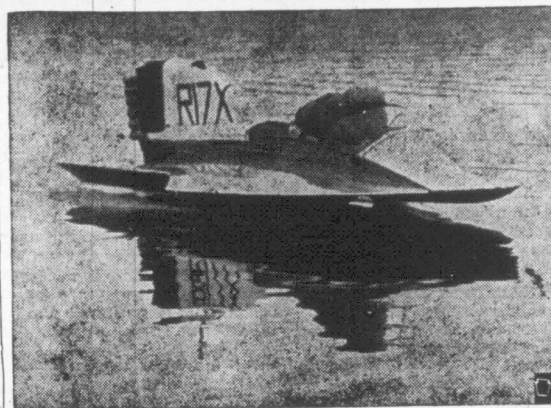

The value of boats and private cottages alone constitutes about 63 per cent of the sum value.

Recreation facilities and equipment with an estimated worth of \$18.3 million were placed on TVA lakes and lakeshores during 1959. This represents a 22 per cent increase over the value of the previous year.

Of the 40.4 million person-day visits to TVA lakes for recreation purposes, Kentucky visits comprise 4,587,200 persons of the sum. The total visits were a 10 1/2 per cent increase over last year.

Kentucky Lake, plus the lakes at Gunterville and Wheeler, have over 10,000 boats each. The number is more than was on all the TVA lakes in 1947.

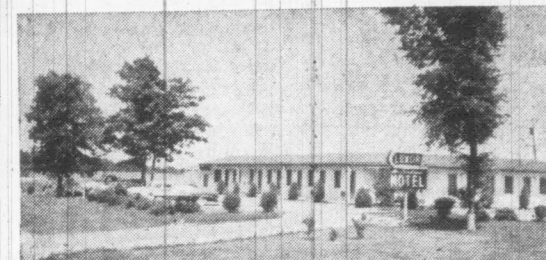

2 Trees Figured Prominently In Kentucky History

Frankfort—Two trees on the south lawn of the Old Capitol here have figured prominently in the history of Kentucky.

One is known as the Inauguration Elm. For more than 100 years the governors of Kentucky took the oath of office under it. The other is a hackberry. It received the bullet that passed through and killed Gov. William Goebel on Jan. 30, 1900.

Elm trees have become symbolic of American public life. Indians used them as council trees. William Penn and Daniel Boone made treaties with Indian tribes under these trees. George Washington took command of the Continental Armies under an elm tree.

The Inauguration Elm has a limb spread of 90 feet and is more than 80 feet tall. Its circumference is more than 10 feet.

The death bullet entered Goebel's body near the right breast, broke a rib and exited through his back with enough force to lodge in the hackberry tree about three feet up its trunk. The Marlin 38-caliber rifle bullet was taken from the tree and admitted as evidence at the trial.

The hackberry, which bears a sugary purple fruit, is in much better condition than the elm. Both are tourist attractions.

Speakers For God

Lesson for July 3, 1960

TOMORROW is almost a magic word. It is the wonder of our dreams are going to be true. It can also be the day of dread, the day when what is coming to us, the when we have to pay for our sins. Sometimes we dream of a better life, but we do not know how to get it. Of course we shall have a better life, but the trouble is, we'd like to get an inside peek before we see it.

Crystal ball
There have been men and women who profess to have that peek. Sometimes they do it by tea-leaves, sometimes with a crystal ball, sometimes they claim to have a friend on the "other side" who gives them just "see" tomorrow's news by shutting their eyes. But it is seldom that such people are respected. They are regarded as rather comic characters. Crystal ball men for example, Crystal ball people don't take them seriously - for the good reason that forecasters make too many mistakes. If the latest reader could tell you which stock was going to go up, she would be much richer than she ever will be by telling fortunes.

A large part of the Bible was written by "prophets," and they were rated by many who ought to be better acquainted with them, as low-rated because the word "prophet" suggests crystal balls, palm-reading and all that. As a matter of fact, the Bible "prophet" did not mean fortune-teller. It meant spokesman, a person who has the authority to speak for God. The other for whom the Bible prophets spoke, of course was God.

One of the greatest prophets, Isaiah, once drew a clear line between a genuine prophet and a fake. If a man has a dream, he let him tell it if he likes; but if he says he has a message from God, he must be able to tell what God wants him to say. When he says what God wants him to say, especially if no one has had the thought before, we call it Revelation. And if a man has had a revelation, he is to write it or to preach it, that is, to tell the truth as it is. Revelation has to do with the truth as it is. It grows quietly within a man's mind. Inspiration has to do with passing on God's truth to men. The point is, the prophets of the Bible never said "I think," "I guess," "The probabilities are," "The Lord," or "Thus saith the Lord." Of course the words of the Lord are full of people saying, "Thus saith the Lord," and it was pretty common at the time. Who knew who was right, or whether any of them were? But history, which is the handwriting of God, has told us true from false prophets. It has shown us the heads of men and nations that paid no attention, found out in time who were the real spokesmen for God.

Isaiah and people
The Sunday School lessons, as given by the more than 80 denominations using the "Uniform Lessons," are going to be looking at the outstanding Old Testament lessons for the next three months. We should try to get it straight in our minds that a prophet and a seer were two different things. A prophet had an official position. A seer had none. Priests were well paid, but prophets drew their salaries from the people. Priests were born into their positions; only men of certain families could be priests at all. Prophets might be distinguished by their wealth; most of them were poor. At the time, Priests were supposed to teach. They were supposed to do this. Prophets were not supposed to teach. They were supposed to give them something to say. Isaiah once said that when he was like a fire in his mouth, these men had to speak.

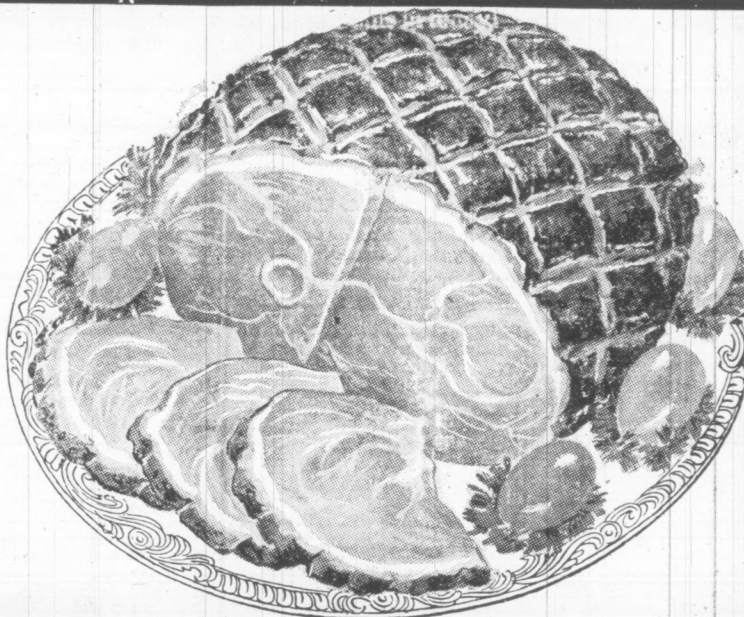
