\$65,000 SCHOOL BUILDING REVENUE BONDS, CITY OF BENTON, MARSHALL COUNTY, KENTUCKY.

Public Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received at the office of the City Clerk of the City of Benton, Marshall County, Kentucky, until 7:00 P. M., C. S. T. on August 8, 1966 for the purchase of \$65,000 School Building Revenue Bonds of the City of Benton, Marshall County, Kentucky, pursuant to and provided by an Ordinance duly enacted and adopted by the City Council of the City of Benton, Marshall County, Kentucky, on the 18th day of July, 1966 for the purpose of providing funds for school building improvements and constructions thereto in said city. Reference is hereby made to said Ordinance for more complete description of the bonds and the surety for the payment of same.

Said bonds will be dated June 1, 1966 and in the denomination of \$1,000 each and maturing serially on December 1 of the respective years as follows:

Bonds maturing on or after December 1, 1965 are to be optional for redemption on any interest payment date thereafter in whole or from time to time in part in inverse numerical order of their maturities upon terms of par and accrued interest plus a redemption premium of 1% of the interest thereof. Both principal and semi-annual interest are to be payable at the Bank of Benton in the City of Benton, Marshall County, Kentucky.

The City will agree to furnish the prepared bonds and the unqualified approving opinion of Lovett, Lovett & Lovett, Attorneys, Lovett Building, Benton, Kentucky, together with the customary closing certificates dated as of the date of delivery of and payment for the bonds including a statement that there is no litigation pending or, to the knowledge of the signers thereof, threatened, affecting the validity of the bonds and all bids may be conditioned to that extent. Delivery of the bonds will be made at any bank in the City of Louisville, Kentucky or the City of Cincinnati, Ohio, or the City of Paducah, Kentucky, or the City of Benton, Kentucky, as may be designated in the successful bid.

All bidders should specify the interest rate or rates for said bonds, not exceeding the maximum statutory rate of six per cent, which must be in multiples of one-fourth of one per cent and no bid less than par and the accrued interest will be accepted. Each bid must be accompanied by certified cashiers check on a state or national bank in the sum of \$1300.00 payable to the order of "City Treasurer, Marshall County, Kentucky." Such checks of any unsuccessful bidder shall be returned after the opening of said bids but the check of the successful bidder will be held uncashed until delivery of the bonds and payment therefor and the amount of said check shall be considered liquidated damages in the event the successful bidder fails or refuses to perform in accordance with the accepted bid.

In the event that prior to the delivery of said bonds the income therefrom becomes taxable under the income tax laws of the United States or the State of Kentucky, the successful bidder may be relieved of its obligation to purchase said bonds and in such case the good faith check shall be refunded.

The City shall reserve the right to determine the best bid and to reject any or all bids for said bonds.







Burley Crop in Kentucky To be Smaller This Year

Washington—Kentucky's burley-tobacco crop will be 20,130,000 pounds, or 7 per cent less than last year's. That was the forecast this week of the United States Department of Agriculture.

In its first estimate of the 1960 crop, the Department predicted production would total 302,250,000 pounds in Kentucky. Altogether, the Department said, only 195,000 acres, 4,000 fewer than last year, were being planted to burley.

The Department forecast a total burley-tobacco crop in all states of 468,000,000 pounds. It would be the second-lowest total since 1943.

The Department also estimated that total production of all types of tobacco this year would be about 1,843,000,000 pounds. This is substantially 1959, but 11 per cent below average.

The July crop-report predictions put production of flue-cured tobacco at 1,170,000,000 pounds. This is substantially more than the 1,081,000,000 pounds produced during each of the two previous seasons and the 975,000,000 pounds in 1957, yet is 8 per cent smaller than the 10-year average.

A total flue-cured crop of 47,900,000 pounds was indicated, 10 per cent below 1959 and 19 per cent below the average. Except for the 43,300,000 pounds in 1958, this is the smallest on record.

Acres of flue-cured set this season was placed at 34,400. This is 3 per cent below 1959, 27 per cent below average, and, excepting 1958, the lowest in more than four decades.

The dark air-cured crop was estimated at 20,400,000 pounds—5 per cent below last season, 31 per cent below average and second only to 1958 as the lowest on record.

The dark air-cured crop will be produced on about 14,800 acres. This is about 3 per cent below 1959, 39 per cent below average and second only to 1958 as the lowest acreage in 42 years.
