He was a friend of mankind. He was a brave soldier of the cross.

Ministers used those sentences in paying final tribute to Paul Darnall, executive vice-president of the Bank of Benton, at funeral services held Monday afternoon at the Benton Methodist Church.

The church was filled to capacity by friends from all parts of the county. Rev. Marcus Gurley, pastor of the Benton Methodist Church, officiated.

Mr. Darnall, 56, died late Saturday afternoon after a long and futile fight against cancer. He was a native of Benton, and spent all of his life in Benton and Hardin. It often was said of him that he knew more people in Marshall County than any other man.

He was active in political and civic affairs of Marshall County all of his adult life. He headed the Red Cross drive for several years, and provided leadership when necessary in many other phases of community life.

He was an active member of the Benton Lions Club and the Benton Methodist Church. He also was a member of the Benton Masonic Lodge.

He had been with the Bank of Benton 14 years. Previous to that, he had served two terms as county tax commissioner, and one term as county clerk. He also had served as a deputy sheriff many years ago under his father, the late Joe Darnall.

Born at Filbeck-Cann, was in Benton Cemetery. Active pallbearers were Myrvin Mohler, Bob Ross, James Gay, Joe Brooks, Phillips, Jack Jennings and Joe Williams. Honorary bearers were Perry J. M. 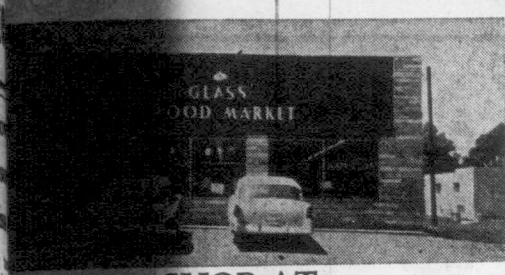

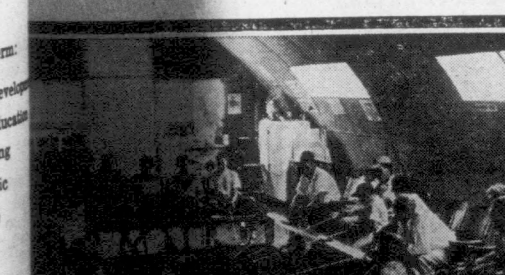

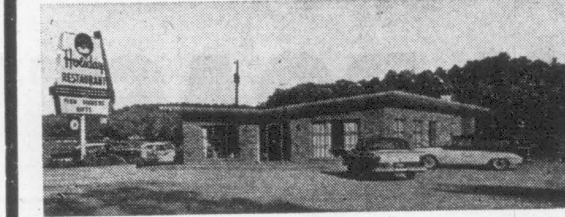
Fish, Any Kind, Are Where You Find 'Em

Nighttime fishermen still are catching stripes, but not in such great numbers as earlier in the season. Bluegill and catfish also are fairly plentiful this month. And a few late summer anglers are catching some largemouth bass.
