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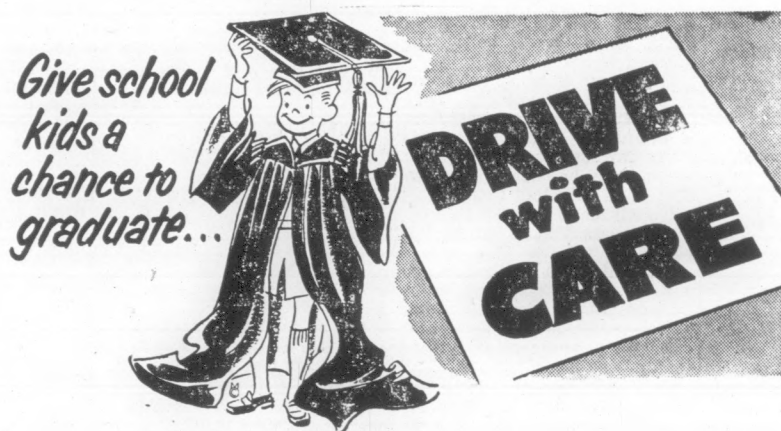

## Civil War Cannon to Be Displayed at Fair

Civil War cannons from the Perryville battlefield will be on display at the 1960 Kentucky State Fair, Sept. 9-17. The famous Civil War relics will be mounted in front of the Fair and Exposition Center's huge Coliseum as part of the fair Civil War Centennial theme. Opening day has been designated "Civil War Centennial Day." Blue and Gray carpets will be rolled out to welcome visiting members of State Civil War Centennial Commissions, members of Civil War Round-Tables from surrounding states and the many other dignitaries connected with the Centennial celebration. Dignitaries attending the ceremonies scheduled for 11:30 a. m. on "Civil War Centennial Day" will include Paul S. Betts, executive secretary of the National Civil War Centennial Commission in Washington, Dr. Hambleton Tapp, chairman of the Kentucky commission and Chloe Gifford, who is in charge of women's activities for the National commission. There will be contingents of both North and South Skirmish Associations on hand, as well as a fife and drum band, probably the only one of its kind in the nation. Members of the group, from Salem, Indiana, range in age from 70 to 90 years. There will also be a Civil War pageant at 6:30 p. m. that same day, with all Civil War groups participating. The highlight of the morning ceremony will be the introduction of several surviving widows of Confederate veterans still living in the state. The Louisville Male High School band of 100 marching R. O. T. C. members will play Civil War marching and battle tunes. Dr. Homer C. Carpenter, Louisville, will give the invocation. Mrs. Willie Glisson of Route 5 was a shopper in town Saturday. S. P. 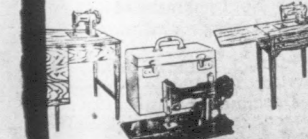

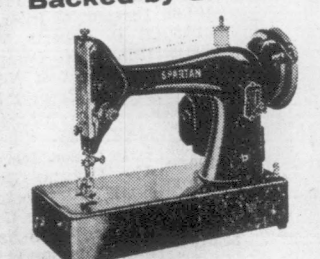

## Sun-car May be Made For Use Only in Town

The world's first sun-powered car was demonstrated in England recently. It was a 1912 Baker electric automobile, similar to the one driven by the late Thomas Edison. On top of the antique automobile is a twenty-six-square-foot panel of solar cells, which receive the sun's rays and charge batteries, as a result. It takes about two days of exposure to sunlight for the automobile to develop enough power to propel the car at twenty miles an hour for several hours. However, these solar cells are the primitive type, and more advanced cells are available today. It is possible, so scientists say, for an automobile to be developed which will utilize the sun's energy, for city or town use. It would probably be impossible to

## Kentucky Site Of Last Battle Of The Revolutionary War

Frankfort—The last battle of the American Revolution was fought in Kentucky.

At Blue Licks on U.S. 68 between Paris and Maysville, 182 pioneers engaged 500 Indians and Canadians on Aug. 18, 1782, and were routed.

In the spring of that year, British Capt. William Caldwell had collected nearly 1,000 Indians and whites in southern Ohio and raided the weak settlements in the Kentucky Blue Grass. With him was the notorious renegade, Girty.

After his forces were reduced somewhat by guerrillas, Caldwell struck the little outpost of Bryan Station near Lexington. But he was delayed by the stout opposition of the men, women and children inside the fort. As volunteers gathered to help the small stockade, Caldwell's army lost heart and retreated towards the Ohio River.

At Blue Licks, the reinforced garrison from Bryan Station under Maj. Todd overtook Caldwell. Hot-headed Major Hugh McGary spurred his horse and dared the Kentuckians to follow him in an attack on the Indians and Canadians. Outnumbered about three to one, the Kentuckians were ambushed and cut down, losing sixty men in about 15 minutes. Todd and Daniel Boone's son, Israel, were among those killed. Boone escaped by swimming the river.

But the invaders, although winning the battle, left Kentucky and were later faced by George Rogers Clark who laid waste many Indian villages.

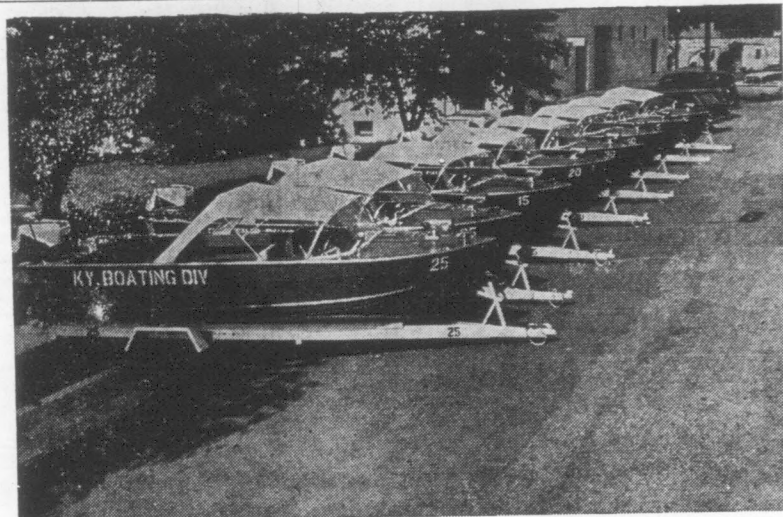

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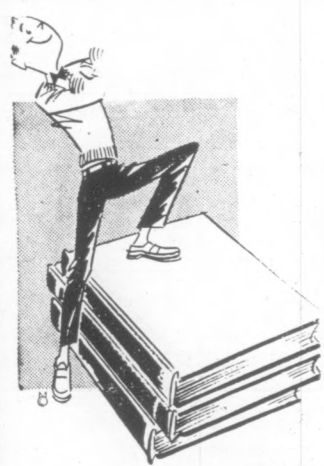

## LETTER

The Marshall Courier, Benton, Ky.

Dear Sir:

There is quite a bit of rumor around Calvert City about the road job and school job that I have there. I would like for the people at Calvert City to know the following about the school:

There have been rumors about what is wrong because the school has not been finished. I would like to point out that the school bid was made the latter part of April of this year, and we started to work on our own, with out a contract, and before the school bonds were even sold, in order to get as far along as possible.

There has been some delay on account of the plumbing, with the State Health Department getting the drawings approved, and by the time they were distributed to each one. But we are supposed to have the school completed in January, without asking for any extra time for these delays, and we feel at the present time that we will meet this date.

We are under a clause that will cost us so much each day, therefore it is to our interest that this job be completed. We would like to call to the attention of the people that we only build the unit, and do not design it. In the modern school of this day, we have many items that take shop drawings. By the time a job is let, we get shop drawings from supplier, get them approved, by the engineer, sent back to supplier, they fabricate it and ship to us. It takes as much as 4 or 5 months. The people should understand that they are getting a nice modern school building that is not constructed with 2x4 wood deck shingles, wood windows, floors, etc., but a building of concrete, masonry, structural steel, gypsum deck, aluminum curtain walls, modern toilet and shower rooms, cafeteria and many other nice items. And such material cannot be bought by ordering from a catalog or by going to a hardware store and picking it up.

We also have under construction Highway 95. We realize it is causing many people of that area a lot of inconvenience, and we are very sorry that this is happening. But we would like to state that lots of times we have to put up with this sort of thing in order to get better roads. We are in any way trying to prolong completion of this job. We are under contract with the State of Ky., to build this road, and have it completed by a certain date, and after that date we will be charged a penalty of \$50 per day until it is completed. So for that reason, the job will be built as soon as possible.

This job was let last year just before the change in administrations. I feel that the job was not in a position to be let at that time. There were many things that should have been taken care of before work was started. We do not have any thing to do with the utilities on this job, and they were all supposed to have been moved by March of this year. Here it is Sept. 7 and there is still pipe to be removed, and probably will be for some time. This we cannot control. Of course, if there is someone who can, we will be glad for you to help out. I am sure.

I am not taking the position of blaming the City of Calvert. The maintenance people and their contractor have done a wonderful job trying to get everything moved as soon as possible, after it has been determined that they will have to be moved. Again we state we did not design this job, or put the utilities there in the past years, and do not feel that it is in any way our fault because we are running into this problem.

We would appreciate very much if the people hearing such rumors would take a little time and investigate before they make statements that have been made in the last few weeks. I am a native of Marshall County, born and raised here, and truly it hurts me for these rumors to be going around.
