Farm Bureau In Membership Drive

Plans have been announced for one of the most intensive membership drives for Farm Bureau ever held in this county, according to Raymond Powell, who is chairman of the Marshall County Farm Bureau membership committee.

The drive will get underway Feb. 20, which is the first day of Farm Bureau Week. County Judge Annette Haltom has proclaimed Feb. 20-25 as Farm Bureau Week in Marshall County. Governor Bert Combs has proclaimed the same dates as Farm Bureau Week throughout the state.

The official membership for this county has been set at 566 for 1961; but local Farm Bureau leaders have indicated they will not be satisfied with reaching this figure.

Says Powell: "We feel we will have no trouble at all in reaching the state quota; but we will not be satisfied with that. We intend to reach at least the total we reached in 1960 and if possible, show a gain over that."

This is the first year of the

Farm Bureau's expanded program; with the dues now set at \$10 a year. But according to Powell, Farm Bureau dues is a better buy than ever before.

At the state level, Farm Bureau has received most of the credit for getting a number of items that farmers must buy exempted from the state sales tax. Based on figures from the University of Kentucky on what farmers spend for such items as feed, fertilizer, limestone, seed, baling twine and wire, livestock, crop spraying materials, and others, this will save Kentucky farmers nearly \$5 million in taxes each year.

G. W. Lofton, president of the local Farm Bureau, has asked all farm people in this county to respond to the membership drive. Says Lofton: "We want to give every rural and farm family a chance to be a part of Farm Bureau. We are out to create the strongest and most effective organization we have ever had, and we know that farmers need an organization to speak and act for them more than ever."

Last November the annual convention of the state-wide group voted in favor of the tax on all items, including food, clothing and medicine at the retail level.

MRS. EMMA ROSE IRVAN DIES AT CINCINNATI

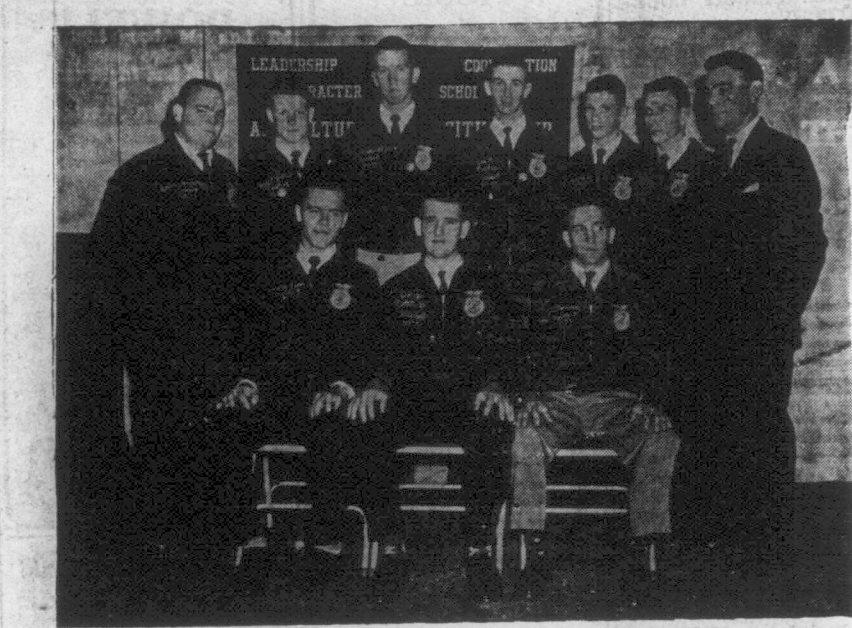

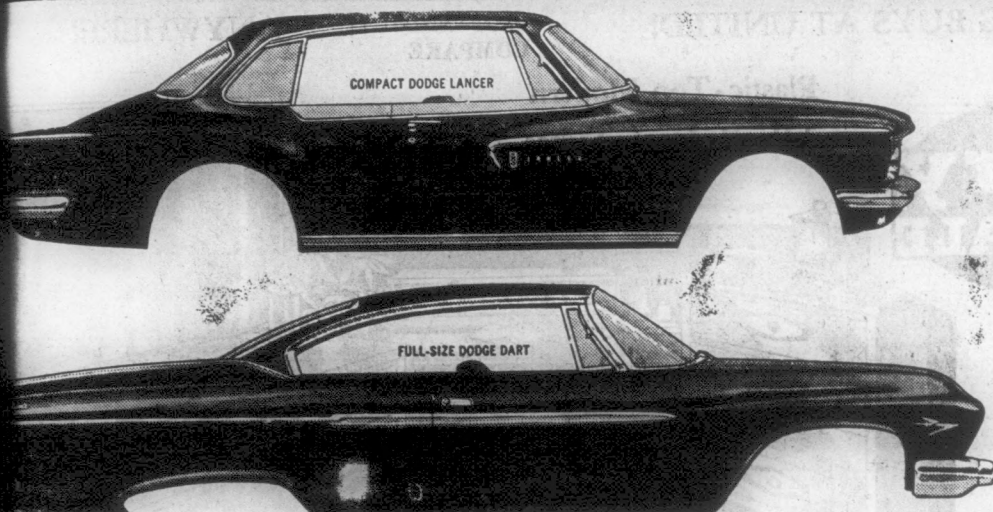

Scholarship Tests at So. Marshall March 7

Fifteen students at South Marshall High School plan to take the national merit scholarship qualifying test, Reed Conder, principal, announced this week. The test will be administered at the high school, Tuesday, March 7. All students who wish to be considered for merit scholarships to be awarded in 1962 must take the test at that time.

The qualifying test is a three-hour examination of educational development, and is the first step in the seventh annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations, associations, and individuals.

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends upon the extent of sponsor participation. In 1960, 831 scholarships were awarded.

The scores of students who take the test on March 7 will be reported to their schools before the end of the spring semester in time for use by class advisers. The scores are used in many high schools to help students make decisions about college attendance and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

Some 10,000 semifinalists, the highest scorers in each state, will be named early next fall. Names of semifinalists are published in a booklet which is distributed to all colleges and to other sources of financial aid for undergraduates.

Further, their names and test scores are sent on cards to the colleges they express an interest in attending as their first or second choice.

Each semifinalist will be asked to take a second examination. Those who repeat their high performance will become final-

ists in the merit program. Winners of merit scholarships will be selected from the finalist group on the basis of school records and recommendations, test scores, extracurricular activities, leadership ability, and accomplishments outside the classroom. Each finalist is awarded

a Certificate of Merit attesting to his outstanding performance. The scholarship stipends are based upon financial need. The minimum award is \$100 and the maximum is \$1,500.

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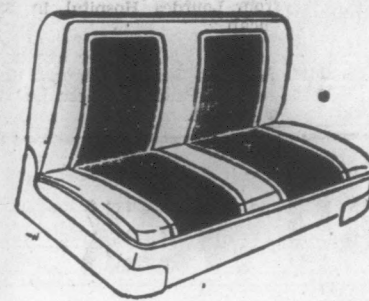
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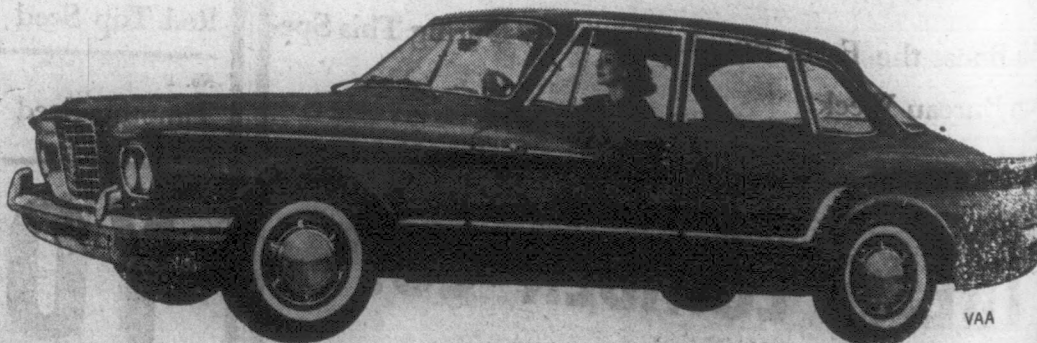
