## Homemakers To Hold International Day This Friday

## Tobacco Allotment To Be Same

Notices of individual farm acreage allotments are now being mailed to operators on farms where fire-cured or dark air-cured tobacco was grown during the past five years, Renée Rudolph, chairman of the Marshall County ASC Committee, has announced.

The notices are sent in advance of the dark and fire-cured marketing quota referendums so that farmers will know how the quotas they are voting on would affect their individual farming operations for 1961.

For the 1961 crop of fire-cured tobacco, the Department of Agriculture has announced a total of 502.29 acres available for allotment in Marshall County, the same as for 1960. For 1961, air-cured, 174-0 acres will be available for 1961, the same as for 1960.

Separate marketing quota referendums are being held on the same day for fire-cured and dark air-cured tobacco.

Growers voting in the referendums may approve or disapprove marketing quotas for the 1961, 1962 and 1963 crops of fire-cured or dark air-cured tobacco. All growers who were engaged in the production of fire-cured or dark air-cured tobacco in 1960 are eligible to vote on the quotas for that particular kind of tobacco.

If at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendums approve quotas, the law provides that quotas and acreage allotments will be in effect for the 1961, 1962 and 1963 crops of that kind of tobacco. Penalties for marketing "excess" tobacco will also be in effect, and price support will be available to eligible growers who comply with their farm acreage allotments.

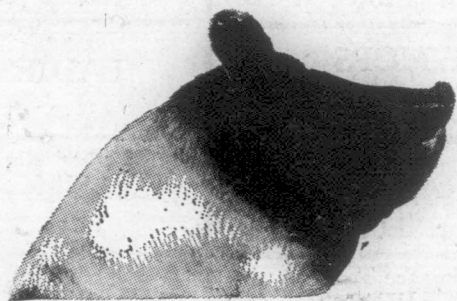

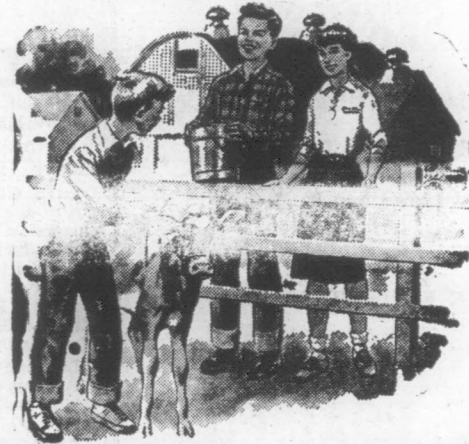

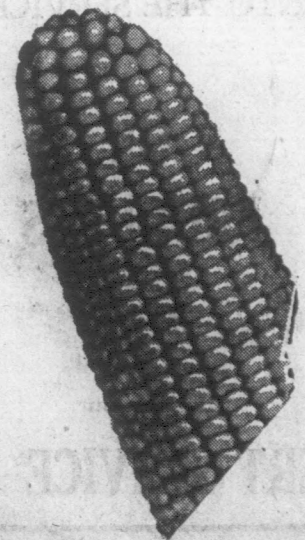

## FARM PROFIT



### Corn Can Tell What Soil Needs

The easy way to check the fertility of your soil is to examine the ears of corn in your crib. They're Nature's own "Geiger counter" and can tell you if soil is lacking in certain major nutrients.

Are rows of kernels missing? Are tips twisted and nubbins small and chaffy? These are some of the signs that indicate deficiencies, Massey-Ferguson researchers say.

Phosphate shortage is to be suspected when ears are small and entire rows or parts of rows of kernels aren't there. Lack of phosphate not only interferes with normal kernel development but is also frequently responsible for improper pollination and barren stalks.

Kernels that are loose on the cob, nubbins that are chaffy, and tips that don't fill out as they should, are usually the results of potash deficiency. Small ears with unfilled tips could indicate low nitrogen content, although dry weather might also have contributed to poorly filled ears.

If any of these irregularities show up in your corn, have a soil sample taken for analysis. That's the best way to learn how much and what types of plant feed are needed to step up corn yield and produce ears that have that healthy look.

Small ears are the tip-off to one or more of three things: low fertility, too thick a stand, or not enough moisture.

What if the ears are big, weighing half a pound or more at harvest? They're much too large, of course, for best yields. To bring them down to paying size, try planting more kernels per acre.

Circle No. 1 of Benton's First Baptist Church met Monday night with Mrs. Rudy Cox. Mrs. Chester Powell had charge of the program.

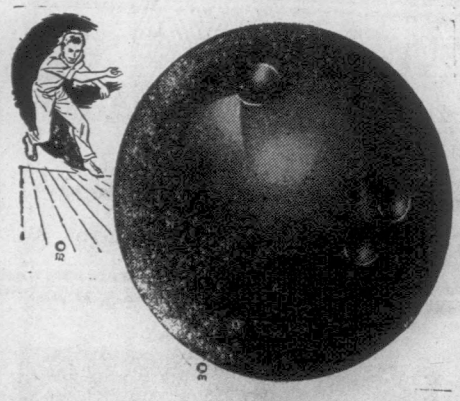
