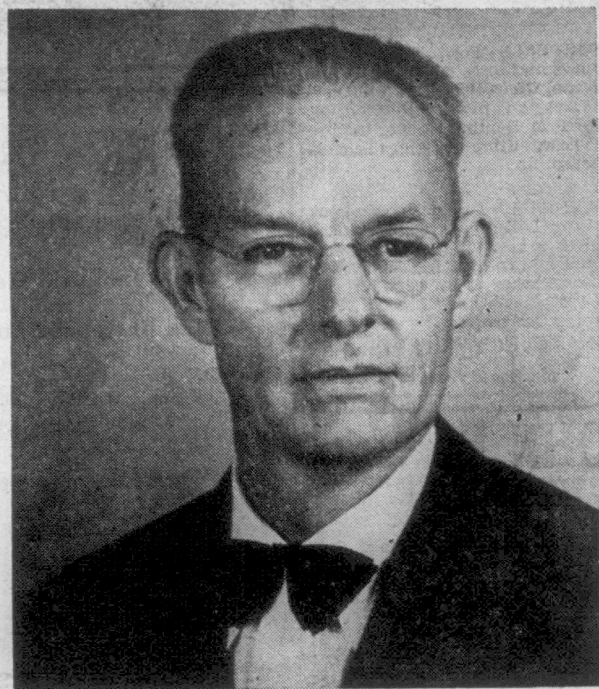

Whipple Walker Has Formal Announcement

City Park Gets Funds To Operate

Affairs of the Park Board occupied much of the session Monday night of the Benton City Council. Members of the Park Board present for the meeting were Jack Perlman, Clay Holmes, Jack Proctor and Chester R. Powell.

The Council voted to give the Park Board \$500 for operational expenses until July 1, when both the City Council and the Park Board will set up new budgets.

Out of the \$500, the Park Board will pay all of its expenses, including electric bills and labor.

City Council instructed the city attorney to draw up an ordinance requiring the Park Board to charge a 10 per cent park rental fee on all events charging admission. This ordinance will NOT include events and organizations now holding Park Board leases.

The Council struck out at permitting carnivals to use the City Park, and instructed the city attorney to draw up an ordinance to ban all carnivals from showing within the city limits of Benton.

The Park Board submitted a tentative budget for the new fiscal year beginning July 1, and also outlined plans for the operation this summer of the park swimming pool.

There will be a field meeting on the Wavel Joseph farm five miles southwest of Benton on Highway 409, Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock, April 12. Mr. Joseph has Kentucky fescue, orchard grass, lespedeza, ladino and red clover. The fields have been treated to give maximum forage production. Mr. Joseph has been using liquid plant food on his entire farm.

He is now milking about 30 dairy cows. Quality forage is essential for both dairy and beef cattle. Come on out and get the latest recommendation on pasture production and management. Warren Thompson, field agent in agronomy from the University of Kentucky, will be present.

Tater Day Crowd Biggest In Years Despite Weather

Approximately 2,000 persons attended the 19th annual Tater Day program held Monday in Benton. It was the largest crowd in several years.

Bad weather, a cold damp wind, probably reduced the size of the crowd.

The parade was held at noon

after having been cancelled at one time during the morning because of the weather. It was a good parade and the crowd enjoyed it.

The Marshall County School Band provided music for the parade, which was led by Police Chief Carrell in the Benton police car. Quite a few horses and riders took part in the parade. Scottie Henson and his dad, James, drove a one-horse wagon. There also was a buggy or two in the line of march. Auxiliary police rode horseback in the event.

Several horse contests scheduled at City Park in the afternoon had to be cancelled. Rain the night before made the ground too soft for the contests.

Nevertheless, Tater Day was above the average. And Benton merchants reported that trade was brisk all day.

Several hucksters were on the Court Square selling products ranging from artificial flowers to potato peelers. But there was not a single "seed potato" to be seen anywhere. Oldtimers said it was the first time in the history of Tater Day that there were no "sweet taters" for sale. Tater Day got its name from the sale of seed sweet potatoes.

City Park, which is used as a "swapping ring" on trade days, was crowded most of the day.

Next year, with better weather and a better organized program, Tater Day may be restored to its old time fame as one of West Kentucky's big events.
