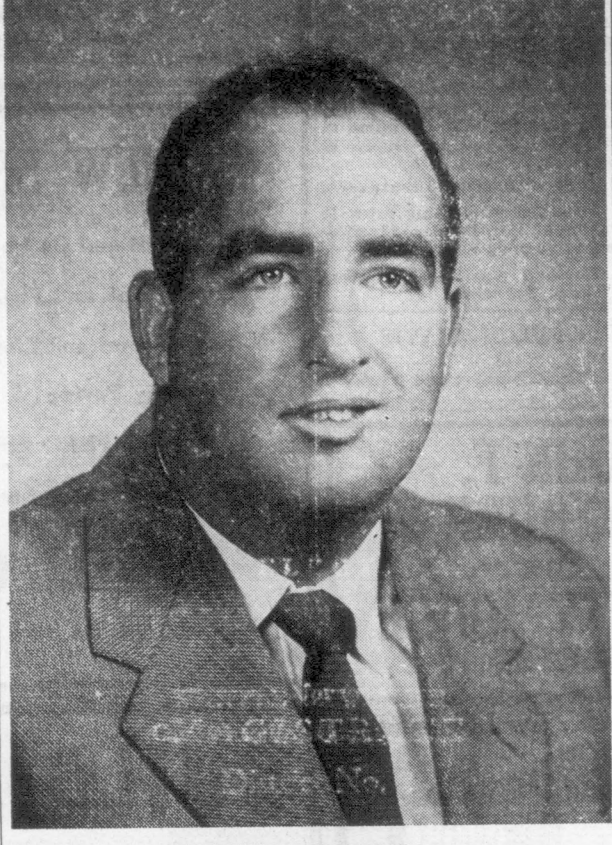

Three persons were injured in a three-way traffic crash at 9:15 a. m. Tuesday at the old Sharpe School Road and U. S. 62. Injured were Mrs. Myrtle Ricks and 5-year-old Gloria Jane Barrett, both of Route 6, who were riding in a 1950 Chevrolet, and Stanley Bloodworth of Paducah, who was driving a 1957 Ford. Mrs. Ricks suffered serious back injuries. The Barrett child and Mr. Bloodworth received minor injuries.

The third vehicle in the crash was a Dr. Pepper bottling truck driven by J. L. Holmes of Mayfield. The truck was entering U. S. 62 from the school road. The Bloodworth car was traveling east and the Ricks car was going west. The three-way collision knocked the Ricks car 130 feet, according to State Trooper Walter Thurlitt.

The injured persons were hospitalized at Paducah.

New Farm Telephone Service Now Available

A new telephone system that was designed and engineered to meet the specific needs of the farmer is now available from the Southern Bell Telephone Company, according to Harold Wiley, manager of the telephone company here.

Mr. Wiley stated that the telephone company has the equipment and is ready to install the new system, which the Bell

Company calls the "Farm Interphone."

"With Farm Interphone," Mr. Wiley said, "a wife can talk with her husband in the barn and outdoor work areas without leaving the house. He can answer without stopping work or lifting a receiver." The new system works through standard telephones and handles outside calls as well as around-the-farm communications, he explained.

The usual installation will consist of a telephone set with a small speaker-microphone in the house and the barn, or other work area, and a special outdoor loudspeaker microphone in the barnyard. "Additional equipment is available if needed," Wiley said.

To speak with her husband in the barn or yard, the wife simply picks up the telephone receiver in the house and turns a button to an intercom line. At the farmer's location, the two-way conversation is carried over the speaker-microphone — completely "hands free."

"Farm Interphone has been thoroughly tested on farms and is now available to all Southern Bell customers," Wiley said.

Corn Growers Are Urged To Sign Up For 1961 Program

What happens to the corn and grain-sorghum producer who doesn't sign up for the 1961 feed grain program?

"The non-cooperator will miss out on quite a few benefits," says J. Homer Miller, county agricultural Extension agent, in fact, He points out that the non-cooperator will not be eligible for price support on corn, grain, sorghums, oats, barley, or rye of the 1961 crop. "And this could be a pretty important factor, considering the present huge surplus of feed grains," Mr. Miller says.

Mr. Miller warns that it will be risky for a farmer to count on any increase in market prices of feed grains this year. The market price may, in fact, be lower, for the following reason—as cooperative growers receive payments which represent grain from Commodity Credit Corporation stocks, this grain becomes available for market and farm use, and will compete with other feed grain on the market.
