City Ordinances

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY PARK BOARD TO LEVY A RENTAL FEE OF TEN PER CENT (10%) OF THE GROSS PROFITS OF ALL PROFIT MAKING ENTERPRISES CONDUCTING BUSINESS WITHIN THE CITY PARK.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BENTON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I

That the City Park Board be and they are hereby authorized to levy a fee of ten per cent (10%) of the gross receipts of any profit making organization or enterprise conducting said business within the City Park of Benton, Kentucky, which 10% fee will be in lieu of any and all other rental charge for the use of space or privilege of the City Park.

SECTION II

Nothing contained in this Ordinance shall be construed to affect any organization or enterprise which have heretofore negotiated with the City Park Board and are now conducting their businesses under terms of lease executed prior to the adoption of this Ordinance.

SECTION III

This Ordinance is not intended to supplement any city license that may be required by any enterprise doing business in the City of Benton but is to be a rental charge in addition to any license fees imposed, said rental charge to cover the use of the park and its facilities.

SECTION IV

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and publication.

Passed by the City Council of the City of Benton, Ky., this 17th day of April, 1961.

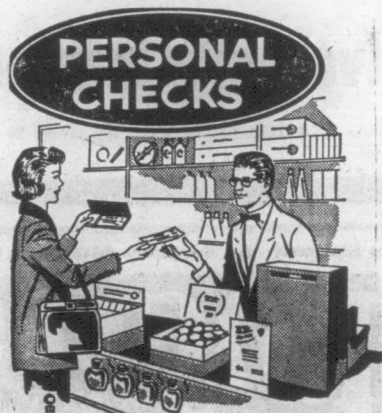

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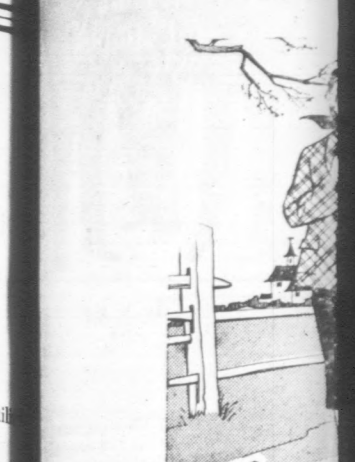

ASC News & Facts

Each cooperating farm under the 1961 feed grain program will have a "permitted acreage" for corn and grain sorghum, according to Renloe Rudolph, chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

This "permitted acreage" will be the largest acreage of corn and grain sorghum that may be produced on the farm in 1961 in order for the farm to continue as a cooperating farm.

Under the feed grain program, the producer of corn or grain sorghum agrees to divert acreage formerly planted to these crops to a conservation use. For this diversion, he receives a special payment, and he qualifies for price support on the normal production of his 1961-crop corn and grain sorghum acreage. He also becomes eligible for support on other 1961-crop feed grains—barley, oats and rye.

Chairman Rudolph explained that the program calls for diversion of at least 20 per cent of the "farm base" to an approved conservation use. (The farm base is established by the county ASC committee from the acreage on the farm used for the production of corn and grain sorghum in 1959 and 1960.) The farmer may also divert additional acreage under the program up to a farm maximum, which depends upon the size of the farm base.

Payments under the program will also vary according to the size of the farm base and the relative productivity of the farm acreage.

Farmers who wish further information about the 1961 feed grain program are urged to get in touch with the county ASC office.

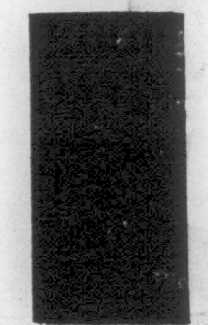

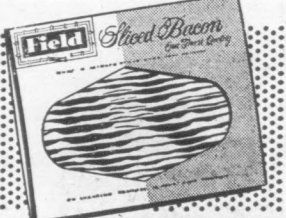

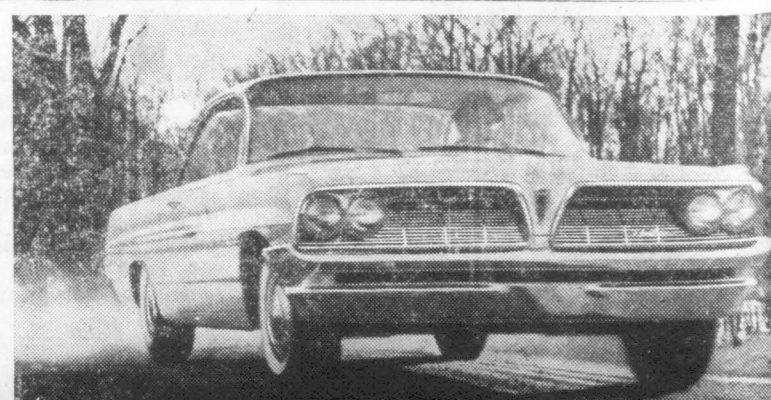
