North Soil Team Will Go to State

The North Marshall Soil Judging team again will represent this 13-school area in the state FFA soil judging contest to be held at Hardinsburg June 17. The North Marshall team defeated the South Marshall and Benton teams in the county contest sponsored by the Marshall County Soil Conservation District. Having won the county championship, they proceeded to the area contest at Mayfield, where they defeated all competition by a comfortable margin. The team's score in the area contest was 936 points. Second place score was 839 points.

The team consisted of three members and one alternate. Members are William Wilson, Doyle Barrett and Paul Darnell. Charles Lofton serves as alternate and will judge in case one of the members cannot participate.

Not only did this team win the area contest, but brought in the three highest individual scores as well.

Gordon Chester, vocational agriculture teacher and the team's coach, has piled up an outstanding record with his teams since they have been competing in these contests. In 1958 his team was county and area winner, and placed third in the state contest. Also in 1958, a member of Chester's team, Jerry Wyatt, won the state soil contest.

In 1960, Chester's team lost the county contest and was runner-up in the area contest. In 1960, his team lost the county contest to Benton, but won the area and the right to compete in the state.

This year the team has high hopes of winning at the state contest.

Three Rules For Carpet Care

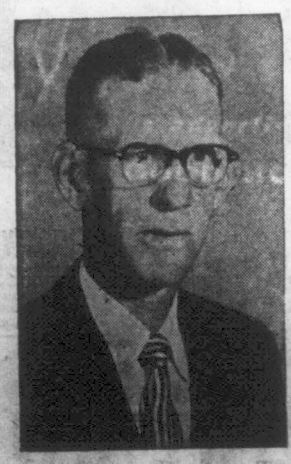

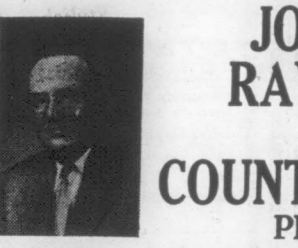

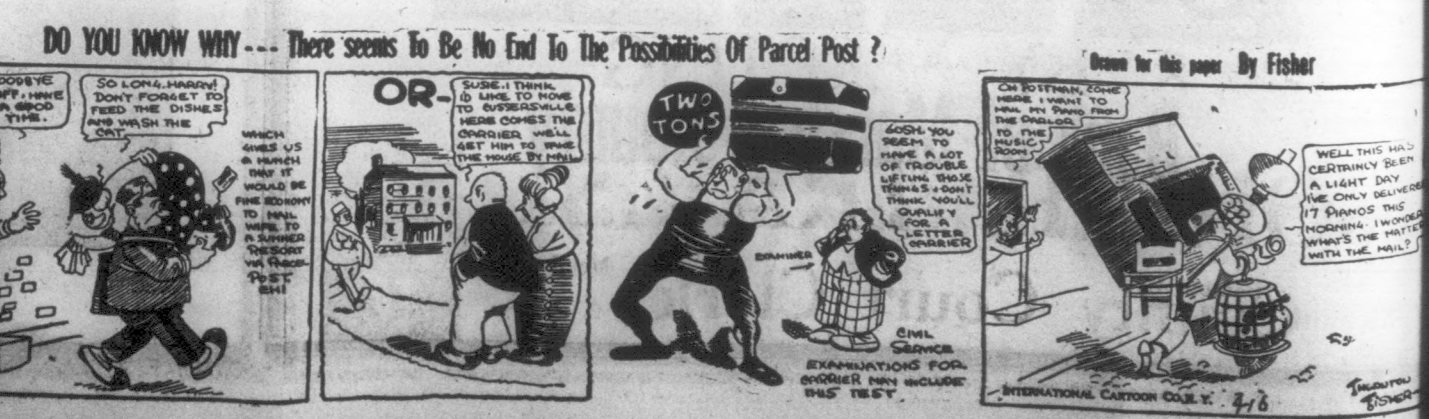

We have heard rumblings that
 the Benton theatre may close its
 doors in the very near future.

This possibility may not come
 as a shock to many of you—but,
 have you actually given much
 thought to the possibility of liv-
 ing in a town in which the pleas-
 ure of the screen were suddenly
 and totally cut off? Yes, the
 community would continue to
 function. However, some of the
 joys and zest of life would be
 gone. The loss would be felt by
 young and old alike.

Merchants and shopkeepers
 don't have to be ardent movie

 industry in the world that offers
