## Graduation At Brewers To Be May 23

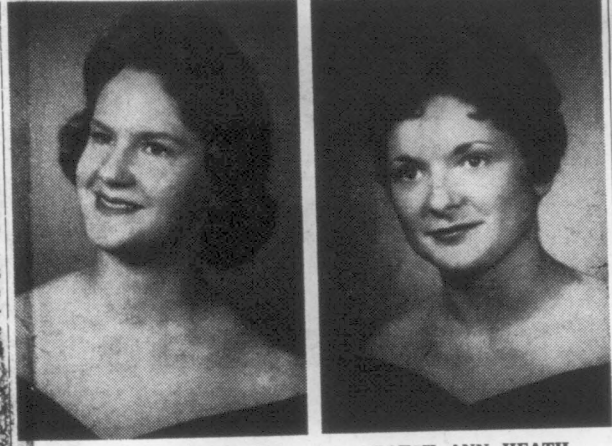
The Brewers Eighth Grade graduation exercises will be held Tuesday night, May 23, at 7:30 p. m.

## Big Vote Likely Next Tuesday in County Primary

A big vote is expected to be cast in next Tuesday's primary election in Marshall County. Political observers say the vote will total between 6,500 and 7,000.

Interest in the countywide election has been lukewarm until the last month when it began to increase considerably.

The magisterial races are at:

Results of the county primary election will be broadcast next Tuesday night, May 23, over radio station WCBL. The daytime station is on the air until 7 p. m. and will give all the results available up to that time. Election polls will close at 5 p. m., and the vote count will start immediately.

The county has three election commissioners. The other two are Luther Cole, the Republican commissioner, and Sheriff George Little. The sheriff automatically is chairman of the commission.

At a meeting last week of county candidates it was decided to change the listing of the candidates on the election machines and the ballots from a vertical to a horizontal position.

It also was decided to leave a blank space on the ballots and on the machines between each race. For instance, the first race listed on the machines is state representative and the second race is county judge. A blank line will appear between the two races, as well as all other races on the machines.

This was done, officials said, to prevent confusing the voters. In voting horizontal, a voter might pull the wrong key and vote for a candidate he did not intend to vote for.

Most of the candidates were present for the meeting, and a majority of them voted in favor of leaving the blank line between the races.

## Youth Shot in Legs at Odom's Filling Station

Michael Dougherty of Paducah was shot in the legs and seriously injured at 2 o'clock last Saturday morning by Lonnie Odom, operator of a filling station at the intersection of U.S. 68 and Ky. 408.

Odom shot the youth as he fled after being caught breaking into the filling station with the help of three other youths.

The injured youth was taken in a Collier ambulance to a Paducah hospital. He was charged in Marshall Circuit Court with breaking and entering, and is under a \$1,000 bond.

The three other youths also were charged with breaking and entering. Two of the youths were from Chicago, and their parents posted \$500 cash bonds for them. The third youth was from Paducah, and his father posted a \$1,000 credit bond.

All of the youths were from nice families and what prompted them to break into the filling station is a puzzle to local law enforcement officials.

The Dougherty boy's father is a small carrier at Paducah.

### 1,500 Citizens Of County Are Getting Social Security

By the end of 1960, more than 1,500 people in Marshall County were receiving monthly old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits. Benefits paid to these people for December 1960

were \$80,589, according to Charles M. Whitaker, manager of the Paducah Social Security district office.

Nationally, almost 15 million people were receiving about a billion dollars a month in old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits at the close of 1960.

Payments to a retired worker with no dependents receiving

benefits averaged \$70 in December, 1960; to a retired couple, both receiving benefits, the average payment was \$124. The average for an aged widow was about \$58.

1960 was the 20th year that social security benefits were payable, and the 25th anniversary of the Social Security Act, which became law in 1935. Changes in the law since 1935 have brought

more than nine out of every ten people in the United States protection by old-age, survivors, and disability insurance.
