MORROW SURRENDERS

Threats of Mob Violence Heard in Todd County.

ANOTHER SCENE IN AN AWFUL TRAGEDY

The New Era received a telephonic communication from Elkton last Friday conveying the news of the death of Dr. Charles D. Lee, who died at 5:15 o'clock from blood poisoning, caused by gun-shot wounds.

This death ends another scene in one of the most deplorable tragedies ever enacted in Todd county. New Era readers are familiar with details of the preceding scene. It was the bloody culmination of a feud which had existed for some time between Jeff Morrow, a well-known young Todd county farmer, and Dr. Lee, a physician of prominence. It is said that this was not the first time that the mutual hatred of the men had shown itself in open hostilities. The trouble was the outgrowth of a domestic affair involving the name of Morrow's sister.

On the afternoon of Saturday, May 1st, Dr. Lee and his brother, Ben Lee, were quietly riding along in a buggy, and when about a mile and a half from Elkton they were met by Morrow. The latter opened fire with a double barreled shotgun, both barrels of which were emptied at the occupants of the vehicle. The physician received the contents of the gun, which was loaded with turkey shot, in his back. His brother was struck by a few scattering shot. All the shots were intended for Dr. Lee whom Morrow charges with ruining his sister.

It was thought at first that Dr. Lee's injuries would prove almost immediately fatal, as he was paralyzed from the effects of the wounds, but after receiving careful surgical attention he began to improve. Morrow was arrested but was released on bond.

Thursday Dr. Lee became worse and began rapidly sinking and died Friday morning in great agony.

As soon as Morrow heard of his victim's death he went to Elkton and surrendered himself to the proper authorities.

According to the New Era's informant Morrow's present action was largely prompted by the fear that Lee's brothers would attempt to wreak vengeance on him. It is also said that there is a strong undercurrent of feeling among scores of Todd county citizens against Morrow and all sorts of mob rumors are afloat.

CLARA MOSELEY'S LIFE ENDS SUDDENLY.

The Corner was Summoned and an Inquest Held. The Jury Decided that the Death was Due to Heart Disease. The Remains were Conveyed to this City and Given to Richard Harrison, a Son-in-law of the Deceased. Burial Services will be Held this Afternoon. EVERYBODY KNEW HER

Nearly All Colored People Regarded Her With Superstitious Awe.

LEFT HERE TO PREACH BUT DROPPED DEAD

The colored people of Hopkinsville are mourning the loss of a prophet. Clara Moseley, notorious throughout this region on account of her alleged ability to read the future, died suddenly Sunday.

Sunday morning Clara left the city and went to the Blooming Grove Baptist Church, two miles North of the city, where a large crowd had gathered to hear her preach. She went to the home of a friend and while conversing with the family she fell from her chair and expired almost instantly.

The coroner was summoned and an inquest held. The jury decided that the death was due to heart disease. The remains were conveyed to this city and given to Richard Harrison, a son-in-law of the deceased. Burial services will be held this afternoon. The funeral will be one of the largest that the colored people have taken part in for a long time.

Clara Moseley was regarded with superstitious awe by hundreds of negroes and many white people. Many of her predictions are said to have come true. Several days before the awful St. Louis cyclone of last year Clara predicted that on May 20th Hopkinsville would be destroyed. She claimed to have had a vision in which she saw the city in ruins. She prophesied that a big whirlwind would suddenly pounce down upon the town, annihilate the property and kill the inhabitants; that when the wind got through with its work, nothing would be left of the town but a hole in the ground.

Two nights previous to the date designated by the woman for the storm to sweep the St. Louis cyclone occurred, and hundreds of negroes and many superstitious white persons looked upon it as a fulfillment of the storm predicted by Clara, and, led by her, scores of her people fled from the city to a hill-top East of town. Here they prayed so fervently and sang praises so loudly that the prophesied destruction (as they thought) averted on account of their faith.

Clardy Will Not Run.

Hon. J. F. Dempsey, of Madisonville, who has been in the city a day or two in the interest of his candidacy for Congress, visited Haverhill yesterday returning last night and to-day will go back to Madisonville. Mr. Dempsey's early candidacy will probably disconcert some others in the district who have been intending to make the race and start some of them out to interview the voters, too. The Messenger can state on the highest authority that Dr. Clardy will not be a candidate again. He made up his mind to that effect some time ago - Owensboro Messenger.

Camp Meetings.

The Kentucky camp-meeting season is open, and the glorious old hymn "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," will soon be floating out on the breezes from under more than an arbor shed in the home place, says the Post. The first meeting such year to inaugurate the season is the Aaron's campgrounds near Russellville, in Logan county, and it will lead in the good work again this year. It is announced that the first service will be held this year on the 23d of July and the Rev. J. P. Lowry, of Little Rock, Ark., will conduct the services daily. He will be assisted by the local ministers and it is probable that still other celebrated preachers will be on hand to "tell the old, old story of how Jesus died for you."

"GALLANT SAM'S" HOPE

CLARY SAYS "NIT" TO RECENT REPORTS

Major Crumbrugh, who is an opponent of E. T. Franks for the Internal Revenue Collector of the Owensboro (Ky.) District, has been given up by the fact he has made against Senator Debo's wishes. Crumbrugh, according to a Washington telegram printed in the Cincinnati Post, it is well known that Crumbrugh, however, they can not disregard Debo's wishes. Crumbrugh would like to be appointed Minister to Uruguay. It is practically settled that Kentucky will get but two foreign missions. Dr. Clay who was disappointed in not being appointed Minister to Switzerland is reported slated for Minister to Denmark. Another Kentucky name, not yet announced, is slated for another foreign mission. This puts out Crumbrugh, who, if he desires, can get some good consular positions. Leslie Combs, who was shut out of the Marshfield by the appointment of Dr. Franks, would be appointed Pension Agent at Louisville if the appointments were made now. But the demand of old soldiers for one of their number may compel Combs to select something else. Sam Roberts' support of Combs insures the latter something good.

On the heels of the foregoing announcement trends the following dispatch to yesterday's Louisville Post: "Major Crumbrugh was also at the White House. The Major's chances for the collection are improving greatly. His dignified bearing and elegant manners are having their effect upon the President and Mr. Debo. Debo, however, is for Franks and is not to be swayed from his endorsement of him."

Proverbs xxi, 1, "When thou stitest to eat with a ruler, consider diligently what is before thee; lest thou be ashamed, and say, I have eaten and have not profit, and have not gotten wisdom, because I have despised his word, and have despised his counsel." I believe more people die of improper eating than of almost any other cause. We must gradually, but none the less fatally. Queen Victoria's habits, say denying herself the least indulgence, and her abstinence, account for her magnificent longevity. 
