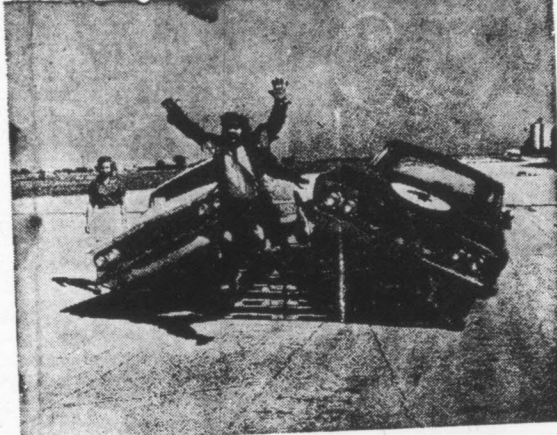
Bookmobile Service To Be Larger

The Marshall County Library Board met Monday night with the Calloway Library Board at Murray to arrive at agreements and terms of a forthcoming contract between the two counties to operate a new bookmobile service.

Mr. Mays, Kentucky Library director of this district, gave suggestions and answered questions relative to the procedures other counties have used. Specific terms of cost and service were agreed on and action of each board will be taken as soon as a legal contract is drawn up.

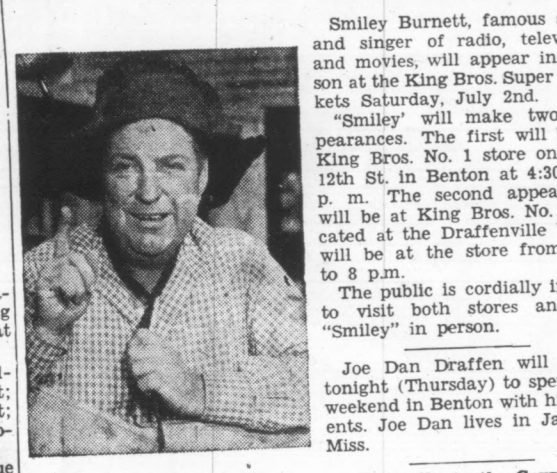
This means our county will soon have the services of a new bookmobile, lending service from the regional library station being established at Murray, or in extended library service.

Schools are Open; Enrollment Gains

Benton and Marshall County school children went back to their reading and writing and arithmetic this week.

Public schools opened their fall term with slight increases in enrollment at most of the institutions.

Benton city schools had a first-day enrollment of 765 students. This is a slight increase over last fall's enrollment of 750.

County schools had a first-day enrollment of 3,069 students. On the first day of enrollment last fall (1960) the county school enrollment was 3,002. The increase over last year thus far is 67 students.

Here is the breakdown on enrollment in the various county schools:

North Marshall High School, 441.

South Marshall High, 351.

Aurora 104, Briensburg 177, Brewers 250, Calvert City 569, Fairdealing 184, Gilbertsville 173, Hardin 253, Sharpe 427, West Marshall 102, and Gilbertsville Boys Camp 30.

As the figures show, Calvert City and Sharpe have the largest enrollment of any of the county grade schools.

There is only one parochial school in Marshall County—St. Pius the Tenth, a Catholic school at Calvert City.

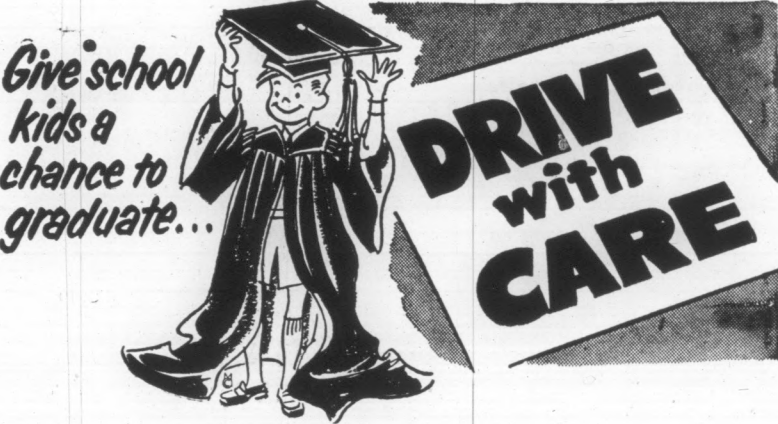
Each team member was given a gold baseball inscribed TRILL Champions 1961.

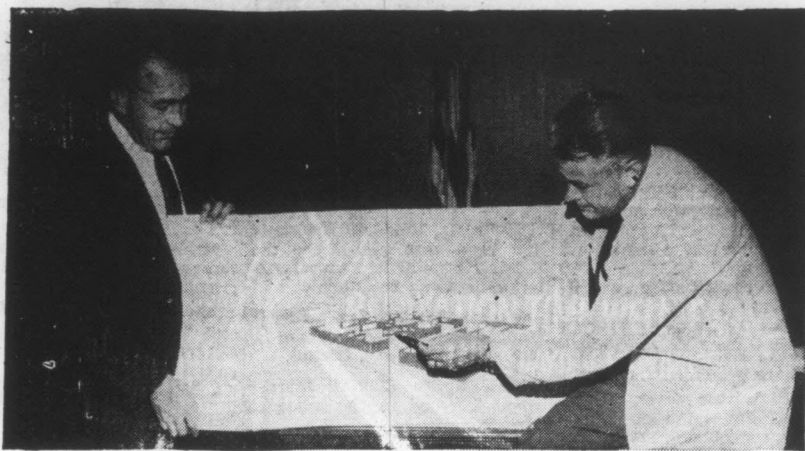

The Farm Front

Seeding grasses and legumes for pasture and meadow can be successful if certain practices are followed. A new leaflet, "Tips on Establishing a Good Pasture," may be very helpful to you. Pick up your copy at the county agent's office.

Priming burley tobacco can increase income on small allotment farms. Two primings can increase income as much as \$300 per acre. Per hour income can amount to over \$3. Tobacco primed could be completely lost if left in the field.
