1 DAY RECORD IS KEPT TO SHOW UP DIET DEFICIENCIES

The Benton City school children received their "Pupil Food Record" forms here Wednesday as a part of the diet deficiency program now underway in the Marshall county school system.

The forms, have been found through experimental research to be fairly accurate in recording a picture of the school child's eating practices. The record is kept from Sunday through Tuesday and is supposed to be very similar record of a seven day test.

According to Dr. Sam L. Henyon, county health officer, between 30 and 40 per cent of the school children in Marshall county are underweight and suffer from inadequate diet.

These forms are filled out by children between the 4th and 12th grades and are studied and analyzed by the state nutrition Division under the direction of Miss Katherine Adams.
